

VIENNA, May 14. (P)—Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg's first act today, after removing Prince Ernst von Starhemberg yesterday as vice chan cellor, was to assure Mussolini that Austria remained Italy's loyal friend and ally.

Austria is quiet but tense, the populace recalling apprehensively von Starhemberg's declaration of a fortnight ago that the heimwehr of which he is the head, "would be dissolved or deprived of influence only over my dead body."

Only the customary displays of military forces are noticeable. The Heiliwehr sub-commanders have ordered units to 'keep cool."

Von Starhemberg was dropped from the cabinet while the powers of his precious co-director, Schuschnigg, were increased. Schuschnigg became minister of the defense and also assumed control of foreign affoirs.

British Field Rated Strong In Open Play

LONDON. (U.R)- With the opening of a crowded golf season, the British are looking to one of their stars to keep the major title, the British Open Championship, in this

country.
After 10 successive years of Uni-After 10 successive years of United States' victories, the title was won back in 1934 by Henry Cotton, Alfred Perry kept it there last year.

These two are among the half-dozen who are expected to provide the vanguard of the British defence at Hoylake, Cheshire, June 22-26. Others include Percy Allis, Alfred Padgham, the three Whitcomb brothers, Charles, Ernest and Reginald, and W. J. Cox.

The last time the championship was played at Hoylake was in 1930, when Bobby Jones annexed it as one of the four major titles he acquired that year for an all time record.

Cotton Ranked at Top

Of the seven British players men-

Of the seven British players mentioned, Cotton is given the best chance of winning—as he has been given for the last five years. Cotton is an "automatic" golfer, always trying new swings, styles and stances. He learned his golf by practising for hours in front of a looking class

At Prestwick last year, he spent a month on the course before the tournament, practicing 36 holes a day. When the tournament came along he blew up in the concluding rounds. It was believed that he had over trained.

rounds. It was believed that he had over-trained.
Cotton would not enter any competition last year so that he might concentrate on the Open. This year he has entered every tournament and again has altered his style.
He is said to be a vatsly improved player not only as regards shot production but in the matter of temperament. In the last six months he has lengthened his swing, and effected a radical change in his putting style.

Tries New Swing
Cotton always had a three-quar-

Tries New Swing
Cotton always had a three-quarter swing, and although he still stops before the club is horizontal, he has lengthened the swing appreciably. The effect is more pleasing and produces better results. Hitherto putting has been Cotton's chief weakness. He has experimented with every known dodge, except standing on his head, as Walter Hagen once suggested to Leo Diegel as an alternative to Diegel's fantastic arms akimbo style.

suggested to Leo Diegel as an alternative to Diegel's fantastic arms akimbo style.

Cotton has abandoned the crouch, and the extended elbow method, resembling a windmill, for a more natural style—normal, upright stance, feet fairly close together, and elbows keeping more into the body.

Perry, the "champion nobody expected," is hardly likely to keep his title this year. Yet, despite his unorthodox and rather flamboyant style, he is still producing.

There is no more accurate striker of the ball than Percy Allis, and if only his putting commanded the same respect as the iron shots it would not be necessary to look any further for the 1936 open champion.

"Putting," says Alliss "is purely a question of nerve; if you have the courage to hit the ball straight at the hole, putting is as simple as falling out of a tree."

Alfred Padgham seems to have a better chance of adding his name to the champions roll. Padgham swings so easily, and takes so little out of himself, that he gives the impression of being able to go on





COLLEGE TESTING PROGRAM ON TEXAS COORDINATION IN EDUCATION ENDED

AUSTIN, Texas—Under the direction of Dr. H. T. Manuel, professor of educational psychology, at the University of Texas, a report has been made of the results of the 1935 college testing program of the Texas commission on co-ordination in education. Dr. Manuel is director of research for the commission, and has directed the work of a survey of ten state supported senior colleges of Texas, twelvee municipal and private senior colleges, and 19 junior colloges. Each of these 41 institutions reported to various cooperative tests in English, elementary and intermediate algebra general mathematics, Spanish, and general culture.

The survey was intended to discover which schools endeavor to advance of the curriculm to the needs of students. "Modern baseball lacks strategy," he says. To emphasize his conviction, he has named an all-time, all-star team on which he has placed only one man who is playing today. He is Charlie Gehringer of the Detroit Tigers.

"Inside baseball, as practiced by the old-timers, is missing from the game today," Bresnahan believes.

"In the old days, ball teams always were trying to out-guess and out-smart the opposition. They always were thinking one play ahead of the game. The only time they would get crossed up would be when

the other side pulled a boner, and

did the wrong thing."

Day of Individualism

"But take the game today. Nine times out of ten you know what each batter is going to do. He's going to try to knock the cover off the ball. Players on old-time teams dove-tailed. Today, most teams are just so many individual ball players."

Bresnahan probably is best known as a partner of one of the great batteries of baseball. He caught Christy Mathewson during "Matty's" hey-dey with the Giants, from 1904 to 1908. He began his 20 years of active baseball before the turn of the century. of active baseball before the turn of the century.

Bresnahan was pitching for a Lima, O., team when a scout spotted him, and sent him to Washington. He was a youngster nearing 17 then. He became a catcher more or less by accident, some time later, while he was pitching for Baltimore.

Wilbert Robinson, regular Baltimore catcher had a broken finger. One of his relief men had typhoid fever, and the other a sore arm. One day, when Bresnahan was in the box, the catching became so weak that he left the mound and replaced the catcher.

"I didn't know how well I was going to do, but I knew I could do better than a cripple," he said.

Managed Two Clubs

In the course of his career, Bresnahan managed St. Louis and Chicago clubs, and owned and managed the Toledo Mud Hens of the American association. He finds it impossible to pick out the "biggest moment" of his baseball life, because "there were too many of them."

When Bresnahan started catching, shin guards were unknown. His legs were constantly bruised. So he designed a shin protector. A sporting goods house made a pair for him.

"The first season I used shin guards," he said, "I took an awful razzing, all around the circuit. Fans


