

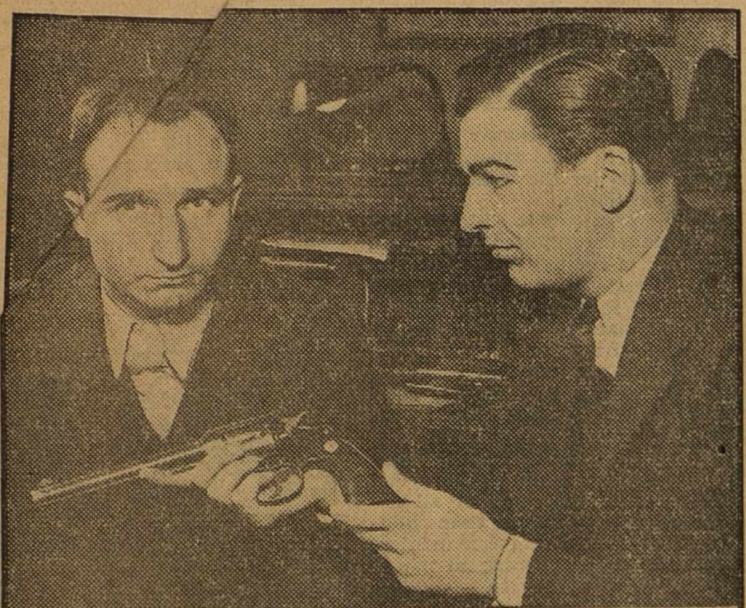

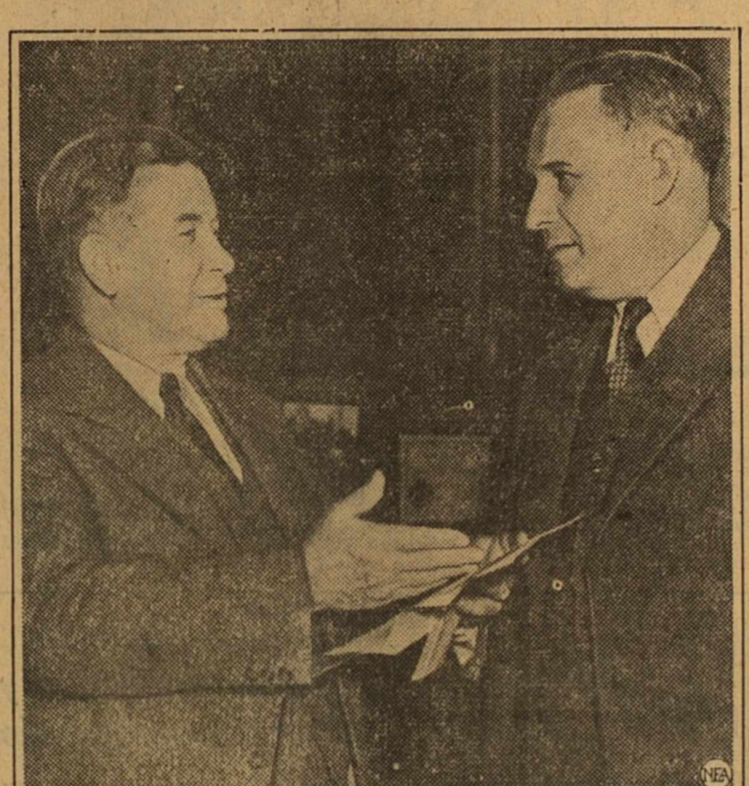

Wife, Fugitive From Oklahoma Caught In Raid

NO SHOTS FIRED Pistol Found On Body But Gangster Fails To Show Fight

CLEVELAND, May 7 (AP).—J. Edgar Hoover, federal bureau investigation chief, today announced that Harry Campbell, last of the Karpis gang, was captured early today by federal agents at Toledo. A woman described as his wife, and Sam Cokar, a minor gangland figure, was also taken.

WASHINGTON, May 7 (AP).—J. Edgar Hoover today announced the capture of William Mahan, called the remaining principal in the \$200,000 Weyerhaeuser kidnaping.

Hoover said that Mahan was taken in San Francisco today. He made the announcement upon returning to the capital after participating in the arrest at Toledo of Harry Campbell, pal of Alvin Karpis. He said that Mahan had 7,300 on his person when federal agents captured him.

woman friend, Karpis was taken to St. Paul where bond was set at \$400,000 for him pending charges and trial in the Bremer kidnaping.

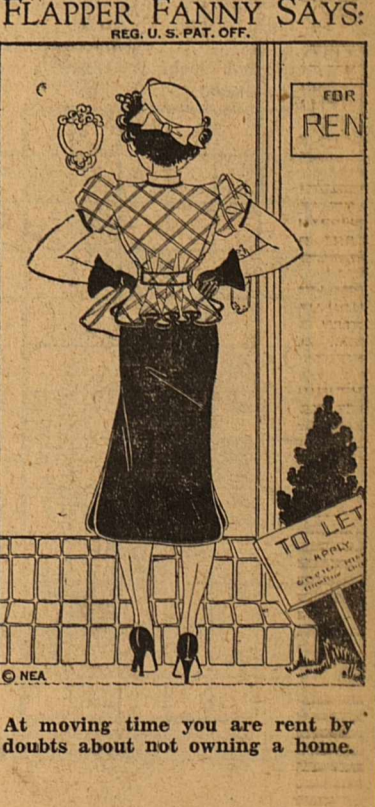

BEHIND THE SCENES

WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The "inalienable constitutional right" of widows to work for \$4, \$5, or \$6 a week to bring up their children is now before the U. S. Supreme Court.

Judge Nathan I. Miller, chief counsel for the United States Steel Corporation, put the issue plop up to the court in his argument against New York state's minimum wage law for women and minors.

This so-called right goes under the name of freedom of contract. Judge Miller argued persuasively that a great abridgement of human liberty would be perpetrated if the court were to uphold the New York law.

Miller did not appear for the U. S. Steel Corporation, and you even had to look behind Mr. Joe Tylard—the Brooklyn laundryman charged with paying female employees less than \$12.41 a week—to learn how Miller got into the case.

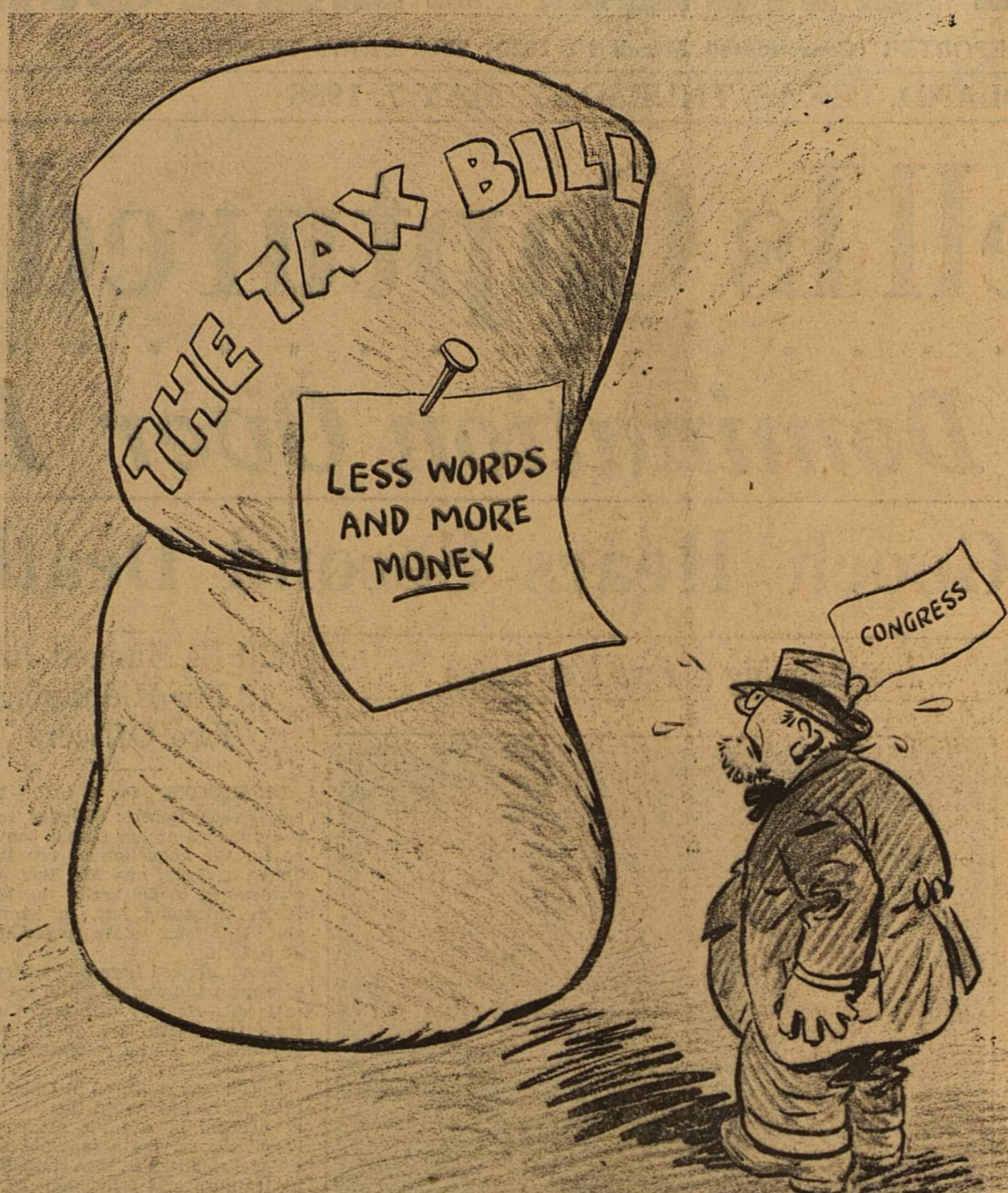

Brief Summary of The Proposed Changes



... will be developed to extend and strengthen work among underprivileged children and will be carried out through the setting up of units in counties where there are active child welfare boards and where there has been and will be active participation in welfare work.

The Grant in Aid to Crippled Children is directed by the State Department of Education, under the Division of Rehabilitation. J. J. Brown is in charge of this Division.

The Grant in Aid to Maternal and Child Health is administered by the Department of Health, under the direction of Dr. H. M. Barnett.

There is still another Grant in Aid available to Texas children—that of Aid to Dependent Children in their own homes.

Since then, all but six or seven counties have discontinued this service. To qualify under the Federal Grant in Aid to Dependent Children in their own home, states must meet the following requirements:

The plan must be state-wide, in effect within every county in the state; it must be mandatory upon each county; it must be administered by a single state agency or department of state government; and it must be available to children who have resided in the state during a period of one year, or who are born in the state during the year.

The term, "dependent child," as defined by the Federal Act, means a child under the age of sixteen who has been deprived of parental support or care by reason of the death, continued absence from the home, or physical or mental incapacity of a parent, and who is living with his father, mother, grandfather, grandmother, brother, sister, step-father, step-mother, step-sister, uncle or aunt, in place of residence maintained by one or more of such relatives as his or her own home.

The Bill further provides that there shall be an appeal board for cases rejected by county committee, and that there shall be proper methods of state and county administration which would guarantee wise use of funds for the welfare of dependent children.

Federal payments to states for Aid to Dependent Children will equal one-third of the total amount spent by such state under its own plan and may include expenditures of a similar nature) with the exception that the Federal government will not match funds in excess of the rate of \$18 for the first child and \$12 for each other child in the family.

Legislative changes can be made in the present State Mothers' Aid Law so as to take care of all dependent children, rather than children of widows; to make mandatory known to be dependent; to reduce the payment of aid to children the present residence requirement of two years in the county to one year within the state; to provide state administration through a state department.

The following states had plans approved by the first of March for this service to children: Washington, Idaho, Wyoming, Nebraska, Arizona, New Mexico, Wisconsin, Maine, New Hampshire, Maryland, Mississippi, and Alabama.

At this time, Texas is sharing in three grants. They are Child Welfare Services in areas predominantly rural, and areas of special need; Aid to Crippled Children; and Aid in Maternal and Child Health Services.

Services to children in rural areas are under the direction of the board of control in the division of Child Welfare, of which Mrs. Violet S. Greenhill is Chief. The plan for this work, as approved March 13 by the United States Children's Bureau.

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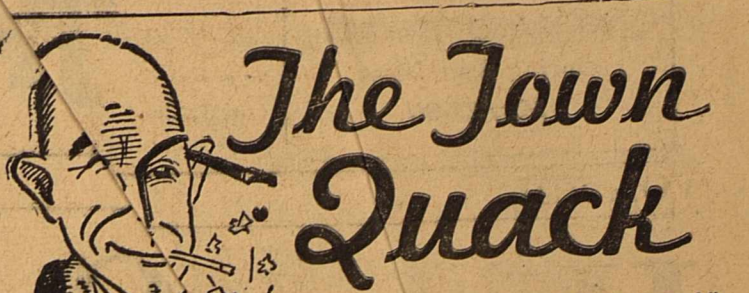

Acheson, undersecretary of the Treasury until he was bounced by Roosevelt because he vigorously opposed phases of the president's gold policy.

This seemed surprising, for ever since he was bounced, Acheson has been with a large corporation law firm here, fighting such New Deal projects as PWA power plants and Resettlement communities. Here he was on the liberal side.

Inquiry develops that Acheson still thinks of himself as a liberal, even though he is outside the New Deal stable and battling some of its pet measures for big fees.

Acheson was a Harvard Law School pupil of Dr. Felix Frankfurter and became a secretary to Justice Louis D. Brandeis, pioneer crusader for minimum wage legislation.

Consumers Join Fight The Consumers League had sought an able conservative lawyer to appear to represent the interests of Massachusetts, Illinois, Connecticut, New Jersey, New Hampshire, and Rhode Island, which also have minimum wage laws.

The leaguers persuaded Thomas D. Thacher, Wall Street lawyer and former solicitor general, to aid them.

Then it appeared that Solicitor General Henry Epstein of New York state, a son-in-law of Max Steuer, preferred to handle the case alone. Thacher thereupon withdrew.

An appeal was made to Acheson, who promptly swung back to his old loyalties and affiliations at the risk of offending some of his important clients. But the New York attorney general refused to give the normal consent for him to appear as amicus curiae (a friend of court).

Acheson had to get consent of the other states and finally a special order from the supreme court itself to appear for the widows and children.

More "Brain Trust" Fun Hardly had your correspondent written that there were certain dangers in attaching a "brain trust" to a political organization before certain parties who meant no good by Chairman Fletcher and the Republican National Committee unearthed a pamphlet from the pen of Dr. Thomas Nixon Carver, head of the Republican brain trust's political economy division, written privately for a group of business men.

Carver has a good word for Hitler and Mussolini and proposes to solve the unemployment problem by drastic curtailment of relief, sterilization of the "palpably unfit," use of birth control to discourage "mere biological urge" limitations of marriage to those who can afford to own and operate automobiles, and organization of property classes to promote such a program.

Senator Joe Guffey of Pennsylvania hopped to it when he heard about the pamphlet, described it as the probable Republican alternative to New Deal policies, and read an article about it into the Record.

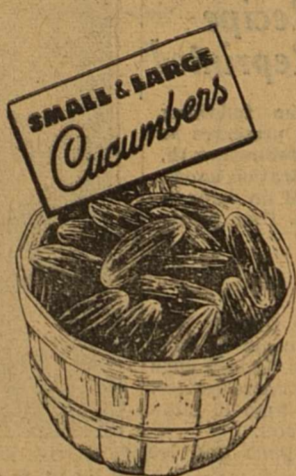

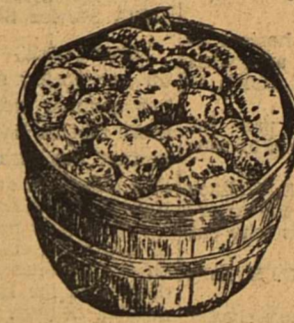

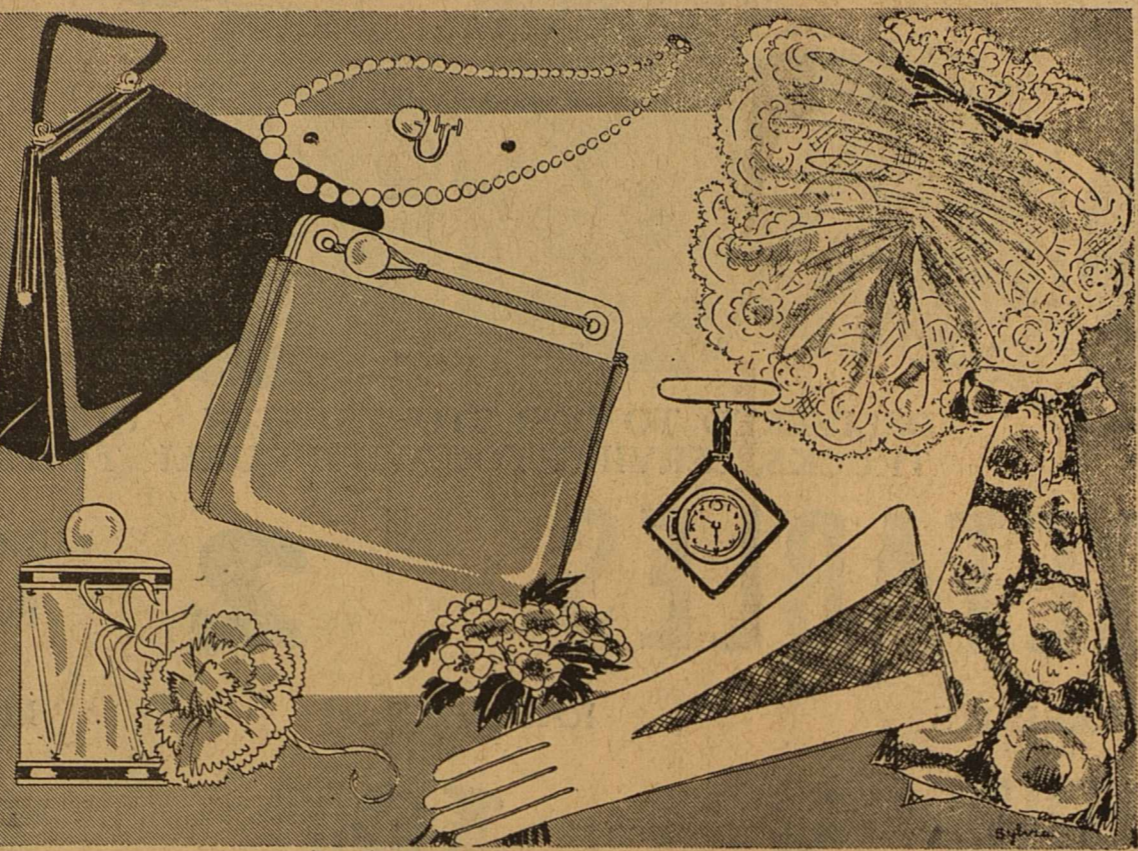

This spring, gloves are so unusual that a trip to any good glove counter should give you real inspiration. 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## Radishes May Be Employed to Bring Variety Into Spring Month Menus

Have I ever told you about creamed radishes? I had them first at a friend's who had kept house for years before discovering the possibilities of radishes cooked.

Custom has established the crisp radish as a raw food to be served with celery and olives and we have completely overlooked the fact that it belongs to the turnip family and lends itself happily to cooking.

The next time you find a three-bunches-for-a-bargain, invest eagerly and try some radishes au gratin or creamed radishes.

Minerals and salts are the radish's contribution to food values, but its chief mission in the raw state is to look pretty on the relish tray and tempt the appetite. The small round red ones are called breakfast radishes, by the way, and the French eat them with butter, did you know that? There are also a long red variety, rather inclined to woodiness; a round white and a long white which can be bity unless plucked while young and tender. A new white variety has been developed which is crisp and delicately flavored.

**Good in Sandwiches, Too**

You've no idea how good radish sandwiches are with a fish salad. Cut crisp firm radishes in thin slices and let stand in very cold salt water for ten minutes. Drain and arrange on thin slices of buttered bread. Sprinkle lightly with salt and cover with another thin slice of buttered bread. Serve soon after making.

Creamed radishes done like creamed carrots are both good and pretty, radishes au gratin are even more so. Women who live in the country and face a vegetable shortage in the late spring and early summer will find these suggestions worth keeping in mind. Creamed radishes are good with ham and radishes au gratin will do for a regular company meal.

**Radishes au Gratin**

Three cups round red radishes, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 3-4 cup milk, 1-4 cup water in which radishes were parboiled, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons grated cheese, 4 tablespoons buttered bread crumbs.

Wash radishes carefully and cut off root and stem. Cook in boiling salt water for fifteen minutes. Drain from water, saving 4 tablespoons for sauce. Put radishes into a buttered baking dish and cover with sauce made with butter and flour cooked together with milk and radish water added. Sprinkle top with crumbs and grated cheese and put into a moderately hot oven to melt cheese and brown the top.

Boil until it spins a thread. Add 2 cups berries. Let come to boil. Boil gently 10 minutes. Add 2 cups more sugar and 2 cups more berries. Let come to boil and time 10 minutes longer at gentle boil.

Pour into shallow pans and let cool.
