Streams were flooding but no damage was reported here Saturday.

MOTHER PRODUCER ADDED

#### ANOTHER PRODUCER ADDED ON SAYRE EAST SIDE

The east side of the Sayre pool of Winkler county added another flowing producer in the Humble No. 4 Howe, in section 12, block 26, public school land. It flowed 956 barrels through casing the first 13 1-2 hours after shooting with 275 quarts from 2,870 to bottom at 2,985. Gas was estimated at 2,000.000 cubic feet. The No. 4 Howe is directly north of the No. 5 well which was completed last week for an initial production of 1,497 barrels per day.

Ttxas-Pacific Coal and Oil Company No. 9 Daugherty, also in the Sayre pool, is cleaning out at 2,900. It was shot with 260 quarts of nitro from 2,785 to the total depth of 2,930.

Landreth Production Company No. 1 Kirk, the only wildcat now drilling in Gaines County and probably the most closely watched test in the West Texas district, is drilling below 3,090 feet in sand and anhydrite. Top of the Yates sand was called by some at around 2,970 feet. Whether the test has encountered most beautiful in the city.

#### A MOTHER'S DAY EDITORIAL

"While we are indulging in public and private recognition of Mother's Day, it would be well if we refreshed our memories with certain important facts having to do with thousands of mothers and children in this country,' says Clara Savage Littledale, editor of a popular magazine for parents. "As individuals we are generous and devoted to the welfare of our families. As a nation we are strangely apathetic when it comes to reading such figures and statements as the following, vouched for by the United States government:

'Childbirth is the second most important cause of death among women between the age of twenty-five and forty-five in the United States.

"More than 15,000 mothers die every year in this country in childbirth.

"More than 85,000 babies die each year in this country on the day they are born.

"Among twenty-two nations the maternity death rate in the United States stands highest."

Some of those who read these facts will console themselves with the fact that such figures do not apply to Midland and other small towns, but only to the big cities where there are slums and very bad economic conditions. But they will be fooling themselves, for right here in Midland last year the maternal death rate was 10 per 1000 live births, whereas for the entire nation it was 6.6.

Most of these deaths could have been prevented by adequate maternity care, but unless the family knows the need for securing such care they will not consider it worth the time and expense of asking for it. Many women still consider pregnancy a very private affair and hold it a secret as long as possible, even from their family doctor.

It is in this work of educating the public on the need for adequate maternal care that the state department of health with its public health staff is going to spend a large part of the \$200,000 received from the federal government for carrying out the National Social Security Act.



MADRID. (U.P.)—The "Emperor of the World," Pedro the Pacifier, au-thor of momentous plans that have meen sent by registered mail to the heads of every government in the world, has been found living in this city. He is don Pedro Rod-riguez de Torres y Carranza, aceful law-abiding citizen of Ma-

Pedro the Pacifier's propaganda Pedro the Pacifier's propaganda for a world empire has come from his apartment. He has no elabo-rate headquarters. To date his little home is the center of the new world empire machinery and Pedro is its sole active sponsor. His ac-tivity in behalf of his cause began in 1925, and since that time he has written thousands of manifestos

proclaiming the empire.

Theempire plans he sent to the recognibed heads of every govern-

recognibed heads of every government in the world of which he could find record. To assure the delivery of the documents, Pedro said, they sent them by registered mail.

Sees Idea Accepted

The "emperor" thinks that the Leagueof Nations has accepted some of his ideas. He cites international troops that were sent to the Sarre district as "in a certain manner inspired by my ideas." Pedro always is pleased to explain his plan for a world empire. The possible linguistic difficulties he solves by saying:

"It would be more sensible to adopt a universal language. That universal language of course, shall be Spanish."

Pedro the Pacifier hestiated a moment. "I choose this language becauses 20 nations in America now use it, and also because it is such a heautiful languages."

The "emperor" exhibited a declaration that he will proclaim the first day of the new empire. It reads:

"In accord with my constitution

"In accord with my constitution of the world empire and other related documents. I declare the following: Article 1. Manisfestations shall be formed in all countries at an hour to be fixed by their respective governments. The manisfestations shall pass down the central streets. In the first line there shall be men carrying white flags and each manifestants shall carry in his hand a white hand-kerchief, symbolic of peace. Signed in Madrid by Pedro the Pacifier, the only emperor of the world."

When it was pointed out to Pedro that the proclamation only contained one article he stated that a second article was being prepared and would no doubt be ready in time.
