WASHINGTON.—Regardless of what the House does to the tax bill on the floor, of what the Senate Finance Committee or the Senate itself does to it thereafter, and of how the measure finally works out, it should be noted that the measure will be handled by conservative-minded members of Congress.

Shrieking congressmen who attribute the original plan for tapping corporation surpluses to Dr. Tugwell are squirting so much eyewash. The measure came from the treasury, which is practically the most conservative place in town. Even if it hadn't come from there, no one could say with any accuracy that radicals had any hand in numerous subsequent changes.

The House Ways and Means Com- They inflated numerous "cush-

ions" for the new scheme and did only part of the job, promising that the rest of the tax money asked by Roosevelt could be provided for in a tax bill next year.

The Senate Finance Committee is likely to tear the bill to pieces and may ruin it completely. Nervous business men, if any, may well note that the committee is dominated by conservative Democrats.

Bayley of North Carolina, King of Utah, Gerry of Rhode Island, Walsh of Massachusetts, Byrd of Virginia, George of Georgia, and Gore of Oklahoma are said to be ready to unite with Republican members against the principle of a graduated tax on undivided surpluses.

**Squaring Mr. Minton.**  
Senator Sherman Minton of Indiana has been more or less embarrassed because it appeared in reports of one of his speeches that he admitted by inference that senators were "swine."

Minton was talking about William Randolph Hearst and quoted a Hearst editorial which said Senate leaders had "led the Gadarene swine down the slope of constitutional surrender into the abyss."

Minton was reported as asserting that "we are a better breed of swine than, etc." where as the record shows his words as: "The Scripture does not enlighten us much as to this breed of swine; but I venture the assertion they are a bitter breed of swine than Mr. Hearst and his pusillanimous pen-pusher who wrote that editorial."

**More WPA Grief in Air.**  
Harry Hopkins probably will dismiss two or three more state WPA directors before election day. It all depends on the amount of pressure for such action and the extent to which administrators appear to be political liabilities.

Speculation as to the tenure of Edward Noel Jones, state administrator in Pennsylvania, is uppermost now. Jones is an ardent Democrat, a protégé of Senator Joe Guffey.

Requests received in Washington for his dismissal have contained charges that he used WPA money, power, employees, and the franking privilege to attack political opponents, that wage rates have been boosted in Republican areas to wear votes, and that WPA employees have been consistently propagandized to vote for local and national candidates.

**Clashes With League**  
The charge attracting the most attention is that Jones illegally uses WPA envelopes, under federal

**Revision Movement Curriculum Guide**

AUSTIN, Texas. The April issue of the Curriculum News Bulletin of the Texas Curriculum Revision Movement is given over in its entirety to a study of general principles and patterns of construction in the Texas State curriculum revision program, by Dr. Fred C. Ayer, professor of educational administration, at the University of Texas and curriculum consultant for Texas.

"The Texas State program of curriculum revision for a period of two years has been making progress slowly but significantly toward the original goals set up by the Joint Committee on Organization of the Program for Curriculum of the State Department of Education and the Commission on the Curriculum of the Texas State Teachers Association," Dr. Ayer pointed out.

"These goals were to study impartially and without pre-conceived theories the Texas curriculum from the angle of programs, schedules, courses of study and other aids used to guide teachers, and from the angle of purposeful pupil activities and dynamic experiences which develop under teacher guidance, Dr. Ayer explained.

"In this progress other essential agencies—the State Board of Education, the teacher-training institutions, the administrative authorities in independent and common school districts, the teachers themselves and the supporting public—have shown a degree of interest and cooperation which has been far beyond the expectations of the initiators of the present program," Dr. Ayer said. "The same statement can be made with reference to the successful outcomes of the year especially devoted to preliminary curriculum study by the teachers of Texas. The problems of financing the curriculum program and of setting up the machinery for carrying on the program have occasioned numerous difficulties from time to time, but they have yielded happily when ever the needs of the program have become vitally insistent. With these developmental essentials of the program satisfactorily in hand it now becomes necessary to project in outline more specifically than has been done to date the current and ensuing program of curriculum production.

"It is essential that the various principles utilized in the construction of courses of study conform to the major purposes and guiding principles which have been set up to govern the development of the curriculum revision program as a whole. The six guiding principles follow: 'Individualization'—the development of the individual in harmony with his fundamental needs and best inter-

ests; 'Socialization'—the education of the individual in harmony with the needs and possibilities of his social environment; 'Dynamic Teaching'—the setting up of experimental curriculum units which stimulate purposeful learning and constructive teaching; 'Teacher Guidance'—the curriculum conceived as a program of pupil study and activity subject to teacher guidance; 'Experimentation'—the proposed curriculum conceived as being tentative and subject to experimental tryout; 'Democratic Construction'—advice and aid solicited from all sources with special privilege to none.

"In studying the principles set up to govern the construction of the Texas State Curriculum it will be particularly helpful to keep in mind three overlapping but distinctive aspects of what may be called the total curriculum: The State courses of study—these specify the objectives, materials, procedures, sequences, and references which should be used in whole or in part by teachers throughout the State in planning local teaching units; the local teaching units—these are the class room instructional units developed under teacher guidance which grow out of a combination of the suggestions contained in the State courses of study and those provided by local supervision; the local curriculum programs—these are the various total programs of education set up by the administrative authorities in the different independent and common school districts.

"In setting up State courses of study, it is hoped to provide aids and standards which will be beneficial both to local schools and to the interests of the State as an educational unit. Beyond a reasonable insistence that each school district shall provide the essentials of a democratic education, it is the purpose of State courses of study to encourage rather than hamper the constructive teaching efforts of individual teachers and the enriched curriculum programs sponsored by local school districts.

"The several principles of construction pertain particularly to the preliminary construction of courses of study that will carry the fundamental truths which the principles stand for over into constructive teaching and effectively organized general programs of education. Thus the principles of construction mentioned below have a forward look and ultimately lead into related principles of teaching and administration. Beyond this forward look no attempt is made at this point to cov-

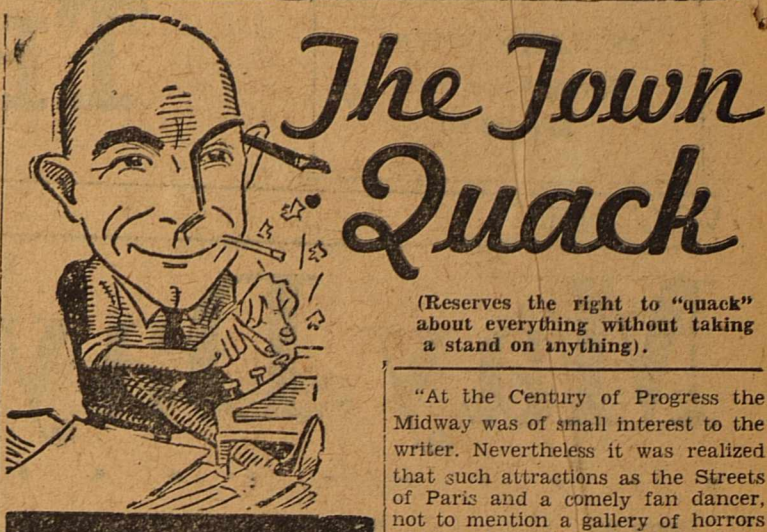
A favorite time for staff reorganization in China is on the third day of the lunar new year. The first day of the new year is usually devoted to clearing accounts and final settlement of outstanding debts. The second day is given over to rest and sleep, but on the third day all the employees are called in to worship the god of prosperity and pray for the firm's prosperity during the new year. On the back wall of the store is usually hung a picture of the god of prosperity and on the floor in front of it is placed a red mat and a sheet of paper listing the names of those who are to remain in the shop's employ. After making three kowtows, employees read the list to learn their fate for the coming year.

If it is desired to discharge an employe at a time other than the new year the pawnbroker's method may be tried. The master of the shop gives a feast and invites his workers. When the cook enters, the master quietly asks how many chicken heads have been cooked that night. For every head cooked, one employe loses his job, but the person does not know of his fate until the food is served. Then the host politely passes a head to one of his guests and says: "Please eat this choice piece of chicken."

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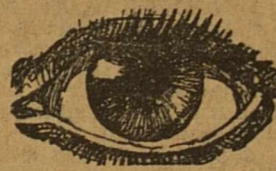

CHICAGO, April 30.—Organization of the Central States Racing Association is the first concerted effort to improve automobile racing on dirt tracks.

It has been formed by the owners of a half dozen ovals in the thickly populated states of Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Indiana. Co-operating with them are the drivers, many of whom are about due for an opportunity in the annual 500-mile grind in Indianapolis on May 30.

To these drivers, the Central

States Racing Association is as important as is the American Automobile Association, which governs the big Hoosier number as well as several other events, is to the big timers. Dirt tracks are the minor leagues of the major wheel, which has Indianapolis as its fountain head.

The main purpose of the Central States group, of which Irvin Snyder of Dayton, O., is president, is to see that each of the six tracks respects the pilots by making racing conditions as safe as possible and protects them from fly-by-night promoters.

#### Central States Loop Expects to Expand

Snyder believes that the Central States loop will spread throughout the country until it includes every independent track of any consequence.

The association aims to keep its drivers busy throughout the spring, summer, and fall by staging a race

each Sunday and on each of the three holidays which come during the season. Purses will be guaranteed and added to as the crowds increase in size. A committee of drivers is to handle all pay-offs and settle any disputes which may arise.

Tracks linked with the association are situated at Dayton and Greenville, O.; Jungle Park, Rockville, Ill.; Sharon, Pa., and Fort Wayne and Winchester, Ind. All of these ovals have been established for several years so that it will be unnecessary for the operators to make any special effort to drum up

business in their districts.

With the exception of the Dayton and Fort Wayne plants, which have five-eighths of a mile strips, the tracks are half-milers. All are well oiled, making them dust proof, and have banked curves.

The best drivers appearing at the six speedways will be eligible to race in events on any of the tracks. Membership is not to be a closed affair, which makes it possible for new pilots to enroll during the season. However, the association will not permit members to participate in outlaw races without special permission.

#### Association Books Its Drivers Until Oct. 11

"The association will encourage the building of better and faster racing jobs," says President Snyder. "It will require each new driver to pass an examination to prove that he is capable of handling a car. This should reduce the number of accidents."

Points are to be awarded in each race and a Central States champion will be named at the close of the season. Thus, through the association, a champion of four states will be selected and recognized.

The season opened at Dayton on April 26 and will continue until Oct. 11. In addition to the schedule at the various member tracks, the association has obtained the Ohio state fair tracks for an all-star event as a closing feature to the annual fair in Columbus.

Dirt track racing has survived since Barney Oldfield's day with little or no supervision at the smaller layouts. A well-handled organization should bring it vastly more popularity than it has enjoyed in recent years.

Accidental Deaths In State Increase

AUSTIN (AP).—Dr. W. A. Davis, registrar of vital statistics, calculated recently that deaths in Texas from accidental causes increased four times that of the total death rate gain from 1931 to 1935.

Death registrations gained 9.9 per cent to 61,684 in 1935. Deaths ascribed to accidents jumped 36.9 per cent to 4,563 in 1935. Automobiles took the heaviest toll. Death of 1,823 persons last year from that cause was 58.7 per cent greater than in 1931.
