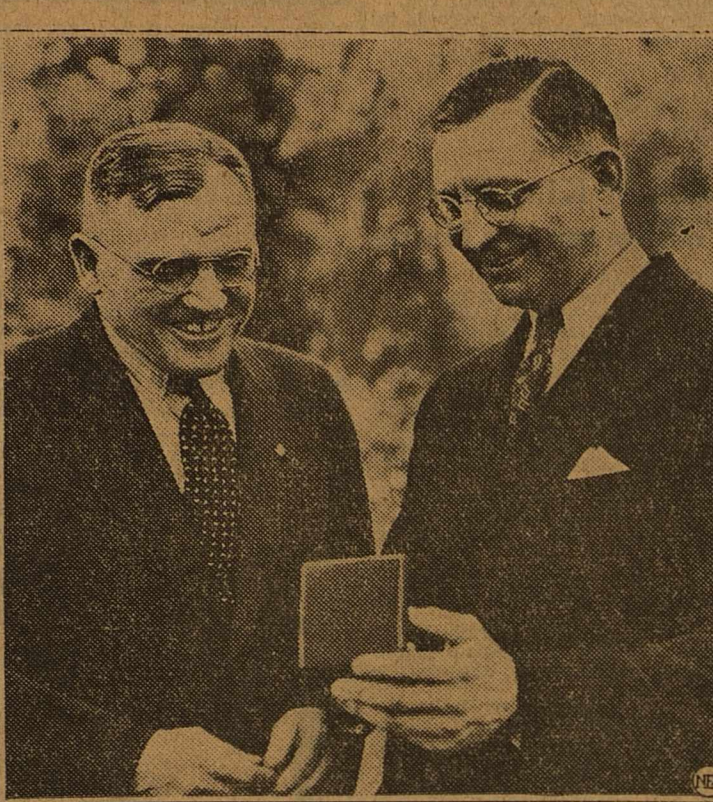
Blount Promoted To Amarillo Post

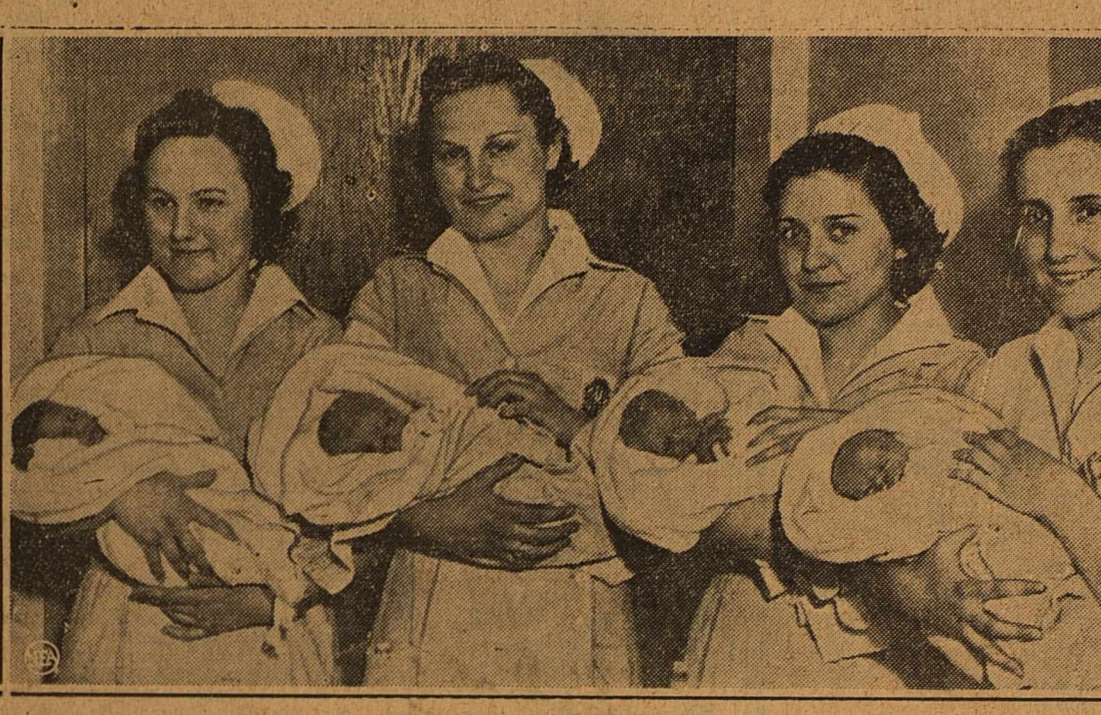
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Little Ferry's Famed 'F's' Faring Finely

Three Others Locked In Room Suffocate From Smoke

DANCE BLAMED

Flames Touch Cloth Decorations And Spread Fire

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13. (AP)—Two men and two women were killed early today when the toe of a torch singer transformed the Shamrock night club into a flaming hall of horrors.

A hat check girl was trampled to death as 50 patrons stamped the lone exit. The other three persons were suffocated in a closed second floor room.

Nine persons were injured, three of them so seriously that they were taken to the emergency hospital.

Betty Blossom, headline performer, dancing around the darkened room with a torch in each hand, kicked one of the flames and it leaped to the flimsy draperies, sweeping quickly through the decorations.

The screaming, shouting crowd dashed for the exit. The hat check girl was in the path of the onrushers and was knocked down and trampled to death. The flames were quickly smothered.

Wildcat Lease Sale Reported In East Winkler

Possibility of oil play in a new area of eastern Winkler county was seen in a lease deal reported here today.

The lease, covering 160 acres, was made under three-quarters of a section, reportedly to a major company. The acreage is about eight miles east of the Keystone produce plant, about 20 miles up the "draw" northwest of Penwell.

Waddell Bros. have reported several inquiries about acreage in the area, which is strictly wildcat territory.

Five More Horses Stabled at Downs

Five more horses had been stabled at Midland Downs this week, with three expected to arrive today.

The Camp stables, Mullen, Tex., had sent three ponies, with Joe Ragdale trainer. A 3-year-old gelding named April 23, half brother to Harry M., will be entered in a number of state representatives to seven per cent.

Directors of the regional body unanimously approved a resolution to provide that no county shall have more than seven members in the house of representatives unless its population shall exceed 700,000 persons and then only in proper ratio for such increase.

The convention went on record as favoring adoption of a proposed amendment to the state constitution, proposed by Representative George Moffett of Chillicothe, which comes up for vote next November.

"Agriculture and stock raising have been and perhaps always will be the predominant occupation in Texas," the resolution said. "Improved modern machinery will likely require fewer and fewer people on farms and cause a decrease in farm population and a definite increase in city population."

## Scion of King Has To Shorten His Name

HONOLULU (U.P.)—Bicentenary observances this year of the birth of King Kamehameha I will be attended by a direct descendant with the longest name in the world, officials of the ceremonies have announced.

King Kamehameha, whose bicentenary is to be celebrated, was the ruler and warrior who first welded the Hawaiian Islands into a kingdom.

The descendant who is to be present at the ceremonies is the great-great-great-great-grand-nephew of the king.

His name, which is declared to be without a parallel in the world, is: "Samuel Albert Friedrich Henry William Crowningshield Apalo Kapikauimamokuoaniani Kamehameha Amalu."

It is a combination of the names of descendants of Hawaii's "Great King" and a princely German family that intermarried.

In actual life the royal descendant does not lay much stress either on his lineage or on the length of his name.

He is known as "Sam Amalu," which corresponds somewhat to the fashion whereby the present King of England, when Prince of Wales, was known as David Windsor.

The desirability of this abbreviation of the name is somewhat heightened by the fact that "Sam Amalu" is merely a freshman at the University of Hawaii and freshmen here are treated about the same way that they are treated all over the world.

However, privately, Sam will admit his identity.

Sam follows the customs of his sires in that he never wears a necktie, but he concedes enough to modern life to wear a blue scarf around his throat and often a blue sash. Sometimes he carries a cane.

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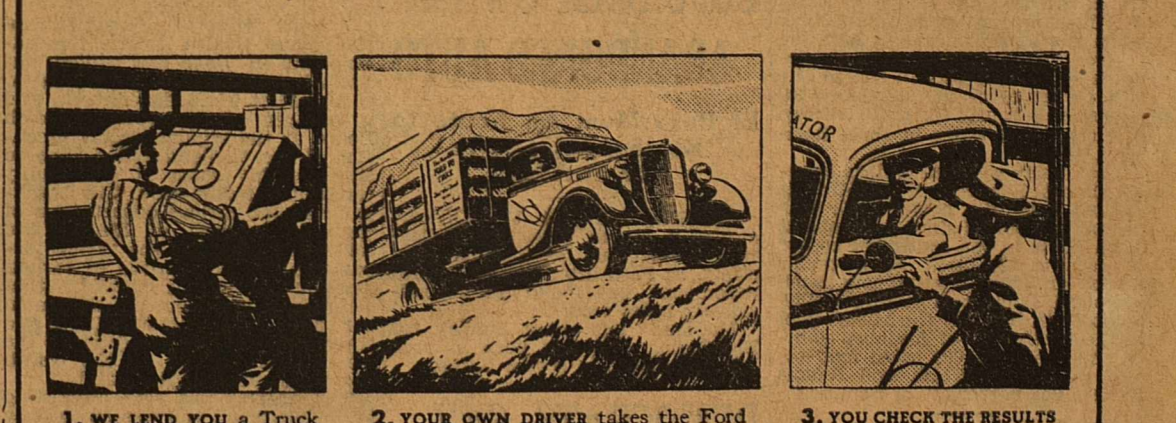

Midwest Gains Place In The Florida Sun

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (U.P.)—An analysis of tourist registration in this Florida resort indicates that mid-westerners are attracted in proportionately greater numbers than easterners, to the near-exclusion of southerners.

Registration by cities for this year, which was a peak tourist year, shows visits by 1,384 Chicagoans with New York's 1,044 ranking second.

The third city, Detroit, sent 929. Philadelphia was fourth with 833. Toronto, Ont., sent more than Brooklyn, N. Y. The figures were 748 and 692, respectively.

Registration by states, however, shows a total of more New Yorkers. During the present season 9,827 visitors were registered from the Empire state. Pennsylvania, Ohio, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Michigan and Illinois ranked next in order. During the season 2,614 Canadian visitors were registered.

The total registration for 1935-36 was 56,220, compared with 53,313 for 1934-35.

Travel statistics show that 41,670 came by automobile, 13,683 by rail, 843 by water and 24 by air. St. Petersburg is not on any regularly scheduled air line.

Deaf Mute Seeking Reelection to Job

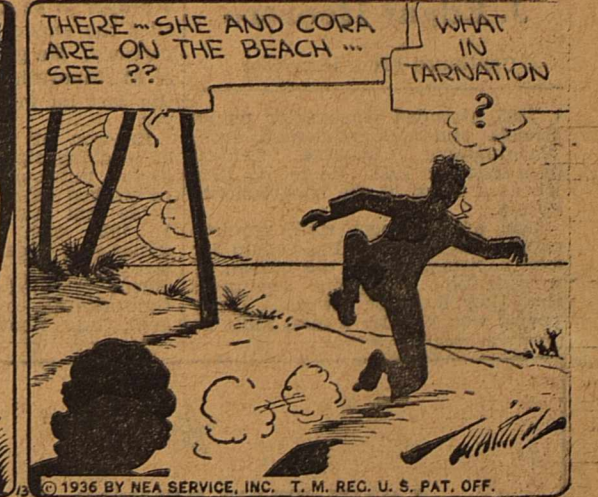
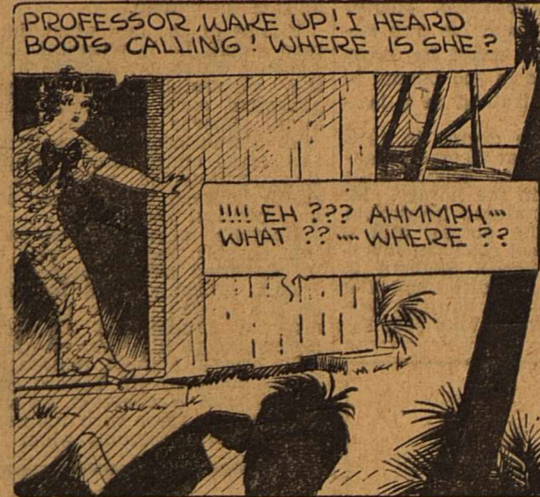
