

# 300 Horses Stabled at Midland Downs

## West Texas Crop Outlook Brightened by Rains

### EXPECTATIONS OF OFFICIALS MORE THAN SURPASSED

Success Is Assured By Large Number of Entries  
NEW BUILDINGS  
New 50-Stall Barn Is Started To Care For Overflow

Three hundred horses! Expectations of Midland Downs officials were more than fulfilled today, they were surpassed! In all early publicity it had been estimated that 250 race horses would be on hand for the meet May 22-30. Today the names of 300 or more had been placed on the books of the secretary's office, being either on the grounds or en route, with stalls reserved.

Driven by necessity and shortage of stalls, directors of Midland Fair, Inc. met yesterday and voted to erect an additional 50-stall barn and work was under way this morning. Meantime, new arrivals were being placed temporarily at the Cowboy Park stables on the south edge of the city.

Names of at least 40 horses, known throughout the nation, were being repeated in stable talk today as possible winners of the \$1,000 added Merchants' Handicap to be run the closing day.

A second rain in 24 hours fell at the track Monday evening, adding to the possibilities for placing the three-quarter oval in top condition. Horses were kept from the track this morning to make possible the proper working of the turf.

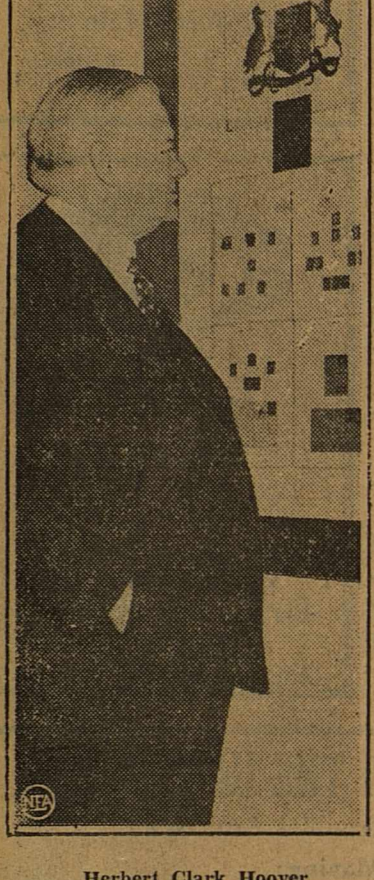

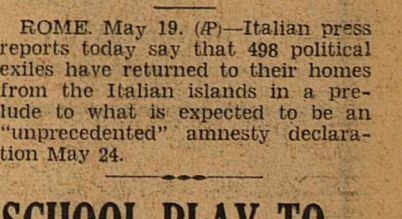

**BOMBAY, (UP)**—The ceremonial "marriage" of a pair of monkeys, with all the ritual of a Hindu wedding, was conducted at Surat by a Sadhu (Hindu ascetic) "in response to inspiration."  
The male monkey is supposed to

be a descendant of the monkey-god Hanuman. Thousands lined the streets to watch the marriage procession.

## Air Condition Units Installed by Ford

DEARBORN, Mich.—A two-year program calling for the air conditioning of the administrative offices of principal branches of the Ford Motor Company in the United States has been embarked upon, it was announced today at the home office of the Ford Motor Company. Installation of air conditioning units in the offices of Ford branches at Edgewater, N. J.; Somerville, Mass.; Chester, Pa.; Chicago, Kansas City and Dallas, Tex. has been ordered carried out at once and is expected to be completed before hot weather sets in. The entire program will require two years to complete. It is estimated at \$260,000.

Ford has been a pioneer in the use of air conditioning not only in its offices but also in key departments of the Rouge plant. The home office, the engineering laboratory and Dearborn Inn, the Ford-owned hostelry close by Greenfield Village, Henry Ford's early American community here, all were air-conditioned in the spring of '35. At the same time air conditioning was installed in key departments of the Rouge plant, particularly in the Foundry Machine Shop, the molding rooms of the giant Rouge plant Foundry as well as in the chemical and metallurgical laboratories, the engineering draughting rooms, the ceramics laboratory and an X-ray room. Air conditioning has been used for longer periods in "constant temperature" rooms where important inspections of manufacturing precision are made.
