



Approval of membership applications from 43 thrift and home-financing associations during April brought the total number of member institutions of the Federal Home Land Bank System to 3,586 on May 1. During the last week of April, the outstanding advances of the 12 district Banks to the members climbed to the record total of \$105,088,000

Through its membership which, together with the Government owns the capital stock of the 12 regional Banks, the System functions as a permanent central reservoir of long-term credit. Its purpose is to serve the liquidity needs of depositors and shareholders in the member associations, and to provide more adequate loan funds at liberal rates in local communities for the purchase, construction and repair of homes and for the refinancing of maturing mortgages.

To take care of future expansion, the Federal Home Loan Bank System may issue debentures secured by the mortgage collateral of its members, thus giving the Home Loan Banks active use of a financial reserve which is estimated on the basis of present member resources to be approximately \$1,-000,000,000,000.

These member institutions, chiefly of the savings, building and loan type making long-term loans on homes, represent resources of over \$3,204.000,000, and hold more than 60 percent of the residential mortages of all building and loan associations in America. They represent the savings of more than 4,000.000 people, and the loans by which more than a million families are buying their homes.

On January 1, 1933, a few months after the System was created as a chedit reservoir for private homefinancing institutions, there were only 115 members with assets of less than \$217,000,000.

Through its membership which, together with the Government owns the capital stock of the 12 regional Banks, the System functions as a permanent creatral reservoir of long-term credit. Its purpose is to serve the liquidity needs of depositors and shareholders in the member associations, and to provide more adequate loan funds at liberal rates in local communities for the purchase, construction and repair of momes and for the refinancing of maturing mortgages.

To take care of future expansion, the Federal Home Loan Bank System may issue debentures secured 076 federally chartered savings and by the mortgage collaters of its.
