OZONA, Texas.—Plans are being made to entertain 30,000 persons in this West Texas community July 2, 3 and 4 on the occasion of the official Texas Centennial Ram sale and celebration.

Thousands of ranchmen who own the 9,000,000 sheep in Texas will be present as will be breeders from Montana, Utah and California.



countries and the construction of a network of new rods to improve Albanian communications. To understand Italy's absorbing interest in Albania it is necessary to recall the bitter rivalry which has

existed between Italy and Jugoslav-ia since the World War. Failing to et possession of that portion of the Dalmatian coast which it desired, Italy immediately made overture o Albania to become a "protector" n case either Jugoslavia or Greec had designs on its territory. In 1931 Italy agreed to lend Albania 100,-000,000 gold francs in 10 yearly installments of 10,000,000 gold francs Italy paid the first two years' installments and then suspended payments because it suspected King Zog was flirting with Jugoslavia. Last year Albania's finances got into such a mess that Italy saw it was time to stop in again. After laborious negotiations, which went on unabated during the Italo-Ethiopian war, nine agreements were

concluded this May. Under these treaties Italy agrees to advance money, in some cases without interest, and in others at 1 per cent a year, to develop Albania's agricul-turd, communications and public works.

Old Loan Cancelled

Under the first treaty the loan 1931 was declared cancelled. Alpania renounced the receipt of further installments from Italy under the previous loans, and Italy cancelled the repapment of all funds advanced until April 1, 1931.

To systematize Albania's fin ances, Italy agreed to cover the en-tire fiscal defict of the year 1934amounting to 9,000,000 francs. In return Albania obligated tself to pay such credits which private and public Italian organizations claim from various Albanian ministries.


A third treaty, grants Albania and "Agrarian Loan" of 10,000,000 gold francs to be paid in five install-ments. The loan will be paid in cash, agricultural implements materials purchased from Italy each year must be equivalent to onefourth of each year's installment. The Albanian government will pay 1 per cent interest on this loan, and will repay the principal over a per-iod of 50 years, beginning 9 years

Oil Royalties Involved

The loan is guaranteed from roy-alties which the Italian official oil agency, AGIP, is obligated to pay to Albania for exploitation of fields


