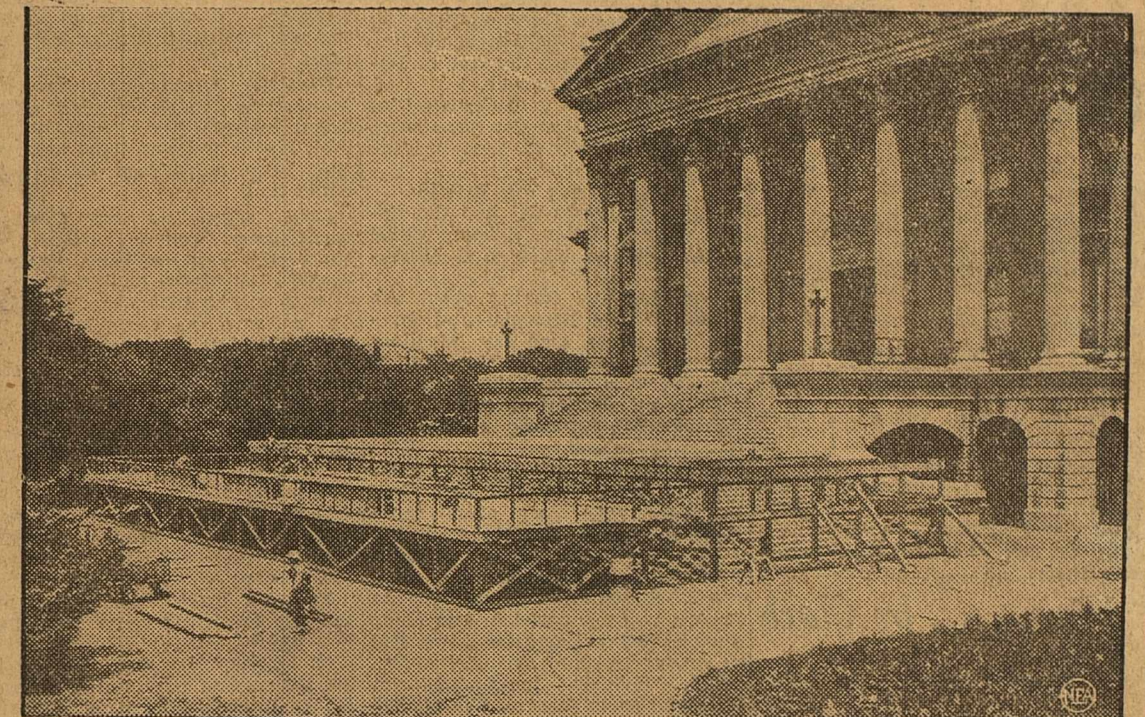

...Night Riders Up 'Tobacco Road'...

CLARENDON, N. C. July 18. — Who are the masked, white-robed night riders who have been taking men and women from their homes, flogging them and cutting their hair (once, at least, in the form of a fantastic cross)? Where and when will the night riders strike again? Clarendon has no answers to these questions.

Germany Spreads Fear
This fight is "catching". All over Europe, Germany is playing it for all it is worth. Her propagandists in Great Britain are warning that Germany is so heavily armed that the only safe course for Britain will be to cooperate with her and acquiesce in her campaign of expansion.

The campaign of terrorization, according to reports here, is a prelude to the day when Germany hopes to move back into the League of Nations and dominate the rest of Europe through its agency.

It is part of the background of the new Austro-German agreement, which temporarily at least has the blessing of Italy.
More Worry For Britain
England already has had the disagreeable sensation of being whipped between Hitler and Mussolini.

Worrying and fussing about the Italian war in Ethiopia—and fearing the while that her Mediterranean fleet might be blown up if she got very tough about it, she was in no position to protest vigorously when Germany marched into the Rhineland.

England now has to worry over the possibility that the next time Germany makes an overt move somewhere in Europe, Italy will pull a fast one which involves Britain's interests somewhere else.

Yugo-Slavia, a nominal ally to France, recently caved in and made a secret political agreement—as well as commercial and financial agreements publicly announced—with Germany as to Austria. She agreed, it is understood, to march into Austria in case of a restoration of the Hapsburg dynasty.

There are reports that Germany, meanwhile, is secretly promoting such restoration and using Yugo-Slavia as a cat's-paw in the hope that after Yugo-Slavia troops enter Austria it will be easy for Austrian Nazis to take over the government.

The agreement between Germany and Italy has been first hot, then cold, for months, and there is plenty of doubt whether it will be permanent because of the rival ambitions of the two countries in Austria.

Danzig Next In Line
Nazis have been debating for some time whether to move next toward Danzig or Austria and recent events indicate they have decided to seize Danzig.

The big question there is whether such action would force Poland, now a German ally, into a possible alliance with Russia, England and France, or whether Poland could be frightened into an acceptance of an act which would bring her virtually under the German guns.

The European picture would be much clearer if England would adopt a fixed and settled foreign policy. German agents have sought to dissuade her from lining up with the Franco-Russian alliance, hinting that Hitler means only to attack Russia, leaving Britain nothing to fear.

Many Britons doubt that. Current British efforts to bring both pacts, even if successful, probably would not postpone for long the European war which all diplomats expect.

District Attorney John J. Burney who is investigating the whippings, hopes to uncover sufficient evidence to bring the base before the next session of the grand jury, convening August 24.

"I am convinced," says Burney, "that not half the deprecations committed have been brought to light. Every man responsible for this outrage is going to be ferreted out and brought to trial."

Burney has a list of names given him by a self-confessed member of the band who insisted his own name be kept secret as he is "under peril of death." The list is said to have included the names of eleven men and one woman.

Fear on the part of the night riders' victims of reprisals if they testify is the chief hindrance in the investigation.

Preacher George Hunt hitched up an overall strap, transferred his "chewin'" to the other cheek and said: "If O' Dad's got to git out on clean up this mess, I'll do it, but I'm not goin' to hide behind no bed sheet."

Preacher Hunt admits he has been accused of leading the night riders, taking men and women from their homes, flogging them and cutting their hair. Says though, he didn't do it.

Called from the corn fields 15 years ago to "exhort the word of the Lord," Preacher Hunt now serves five Missionary Baptist churches—three in the towns of Clarendon, Cedar Grove and Olympic, all in North Carolina, and two across the South Carolina border in Sweet Home and Bethlehem.

He never has asked pay for his services—gets it, though, in the form of an occasional load of hay, a pig, or a piece of meat. Sometimes he gets money.

Week days he farms a 102-acre plot, raising corn, tobacco and straw berries. Until past January he was also justice of the peace.

Preacher Hunt doesn't mind admitting he "hashes up the English bad."
"I reckon," he says, "it's good, 'as we call it here—people wouldn't understand me, 'peases."

"We been insulted and we got a right to be mad about it. I'll tell you, them folks over there (the floggers' victims) has been the cause of more literal hell than anything that ever happened here. We're not goin' to tolerate it!"

When Preacher Hunt is moved to speak out, he will he says, "even if it busts the congregation wide open."
Hear him on a Sunday morning from the pulpit of his Cedar Grove church:

"Brethren, do you know what's the cause of a lot of the crime and wickedness that surrounds us today?
"It's because of triffin' good-for-nothin' church members that might as well be dead (Amen)!—if they ain't goin' to get out and do their duty."

"Brethren, I want you to make your presence felt!
"God bless you, the Lord wants men with grit, grace and manhood!
"I was proud when I was named as the leader of the flogging band because I could suffer with my brethren!
"Amen! Amen!"

"Who's afraid? Nobody's goin' to hurt you. God wants us to clean up our community and make it a

fit place to live in. I don't believe any law is stronger than the sentiment of a community and when that sentiment says anything must go, God help us, it's stronger than any law!"

Absent from church that morning were Bertha and Inez Fowler. Floggers' victims both, Bertha and Inez are mother and daughter. They are not related to Lihue Fowler and his three daughters also flogged, nor do they look like the sisters—except for their hair.

"You ought to see Bertha and Inez!" neighbors say, pointing out the house. "Shaved 'em clean they did!"

The neighbors say Inez was "right city-like" before her hair was clipped. She is 17, going to be 18 in a week or so. Inez has two brothers and three sisters. Etna, 14 and next oldest, has been mentally incompetent since birth.

It was in Columbus county superior court during the trial of Pink King, accused of a criminal attack upon Etna, that the story of the flogging and night riding first came out.

The girl was not allowed to testify because of her mental deficiency. Junior, her 9-year-old brother, red-haired and freckled, was in court as a witness. He, too, was dis qualified because about to take the oath, he admitted he had never heard of God.

Junior and the three other younger Fowler children are now in the county home of Whitesville. None of the children has ever gone to school.

The house the Fowlers live in aptly described as "one room with a fence across it," sits close to the road, an iron kettle for heating wash water out in front. It was here that the night-riders paid their most recent visit. Julius, Bertha's husband, who walks with one leg and crutches, was not at home. He is there now, recently released from seven months in the penitentiary for shooting off a man's leg.

"All this come about," he says, "because my wife had Pink King arrested. There wasn't never no trouble before that. We're goin' back to Gastonia where we come from. Maybe next month. We're goin' as soon as we can get there."

Grade Crossing Deaths Lower Than Last Year

WASHINGTON, July 17 (U.P.)—Accidents and fatalities at highway-railroad grade crossings declined during March as compared with the same month of 1935, according to the Safety Section of the Association of American Railroads.


During March, grade crossing accidents totaled 286 with 102 deaths, compared with 298 accidents and 130 fatalities for the same month last year. The number of persons injured in this type of accident, however, increased from 349 in March, 1935 to 356 for the same month of 1936.

Grade crossing accidents and deaths during the first three months of 1936 were 1,119 and 396 respectively, compared to 1,025 and 364 for the corresponding period of 1935. Reports showed that 1,352 persons were injured in the three month period of 1936 compared with 1,262 for the corresponding period of 1935.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, July 18—If the state department were in the business of issuing helpful hints to beat the heat, it would tell you to put your mind on the political situation in Europe and start realizing how comfortable you really are.

Fanciful feature stories for years have been telling us that we would be vulnerable to foreign attack with development of the airplane. We need't worry yet. But practically anybody in Europe has to bear in mind the likelihood that a few tons of high explosives may be dropped on him sooner or later.

Confidential reports from overseas show that terror is wide-spread, especially in smaller countries, since the League of Nations collective security system broke down after Italy invaded Ethiopia.

Certain nations which once imagined England and France would protect them from rapacious aggressors aren't very confident any more. England is badly scared. Practically every Briton you meet admits it, although most feel she can build up her armaments and alliances to a point where she need not be fearful.

Potential German air raids on London, potential domination of the Mediterranean by Italian bombers, and actual continued Japanese penetration into Asia have thrown into

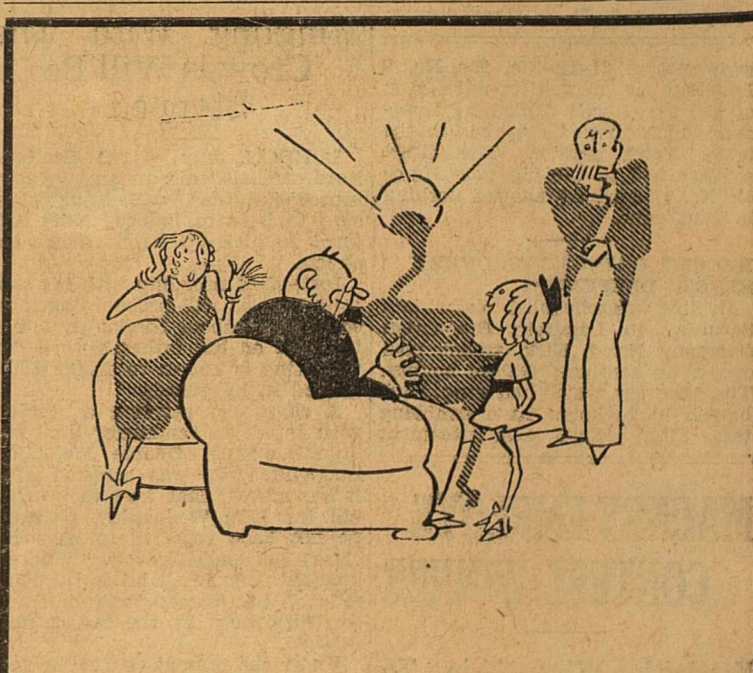

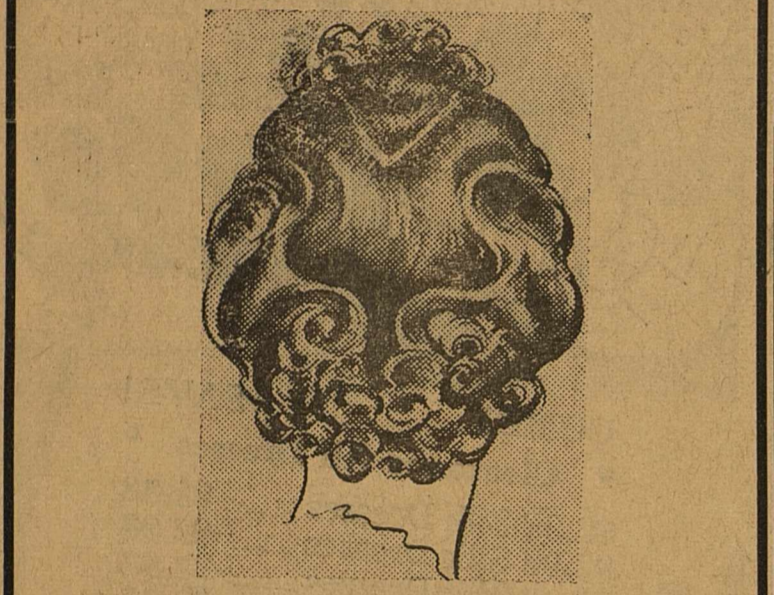

Only Living Pilot Who Ever Made A Flight Around World Plans New Hop

DALLAS, July 18. (U.P.)—Clyde Pangborn, the only aviator now living who ever piloted a plane around the world, is perfecting plans for another ambitious flying venture—a flight from Dallas to New York and Paris, and then a non-stop return to Dallas.

Should the Paris to Dallas flight be successful, it will mark one of the few successful westward trans-Atlantic flights to the United States and will set a new distance record.

Pangborn will be accompanied on the trip by Monty Mason, Los Angeles aircraft manufacturer and designer of the queer-looking red plane known as "The Flying Wing."

Sponsored By Exposition

Pangborn and Mason, who are flying under the sponsorship of the Texas Centennial Exposition and with financial backing of Roland W. Richards, Los Angeles banker, plan to leave Dallas July 18. After installing a radio compass, they plan to take off from New York for Paris about July 25.

Their plane was christened "Texas Sky Ranger" in recent ceremonies here. Miss Frances Nalle, Bluebonnet Girl of the Texas Centennial christened the plane by breaking a bottle of Trinity River water on its propeller, while Mayor George Sergeant of Dallas and numerous Texas celebrities looked on.

Plan To Tour Europe

As representatives of the Texas Centennial, Pangborn and Mason plan to visit several European capitals, including London, Amsterdam, Madrid and Brussels.

Giving a commercial aspect to the flight, they will carry about 1,500 pounds of mail for the benefit of stamp collectors.

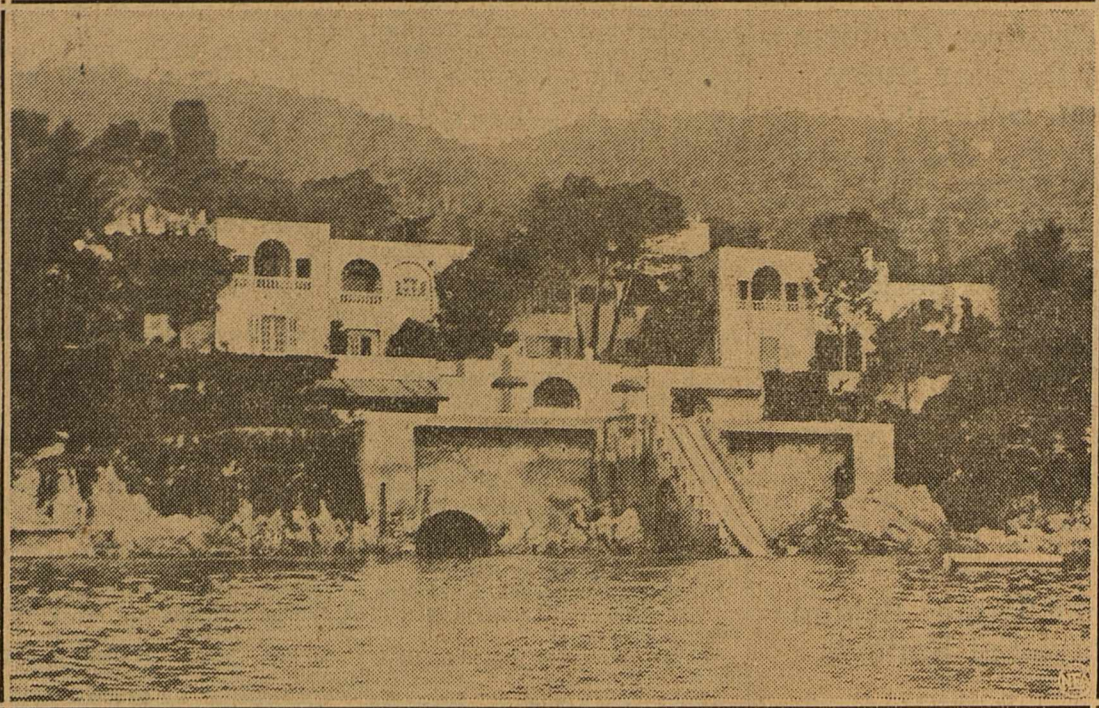
Their plane called, "The Flying Wing", from its unique design, was designed specially for distance flying. A single-motored craft, it has virtually no fuselage. It is only 32 feet long, but has a wing spread of 55 feet 6 inches. It carries 1,156 gallons of gasoline, has a maximum speed of 245 miles an hour, and is calculated to be able to make 8,200 miles without refueling.

Flew With Herndon

Of the three men who have piloted planes on round the world flights, Pangborn is the only one living. Wiley Post was killed when the plane in which he and Will Riser were traveling crashed in Alaska. Sir Charles Kingford Smith the Australian round the world flier, was lost while flying over the Indian Ocean.

Pangborn flew around the world with Hugh Herndon as his navigator in 1931. His trip met added difficulties when he was arrested in Japan and charged with being a spy. He was acquitted on the 50 charges at the end of a six-day trial.

HOLC Refinancing Means Loan Shifts

For nearly three-fourths of its million home-owner borrowers, HOLC loans represent substitution of long-term credit for burdensome short-term mortgages maturing in full, it is indicated by a classification just completed of creditors who had held the mortgages that were taken over by the Corporation.

Of the classes of financial institutions which had held the mortgages that were transferred to HOLC, as a rule only the savings, building and loan associations had employed the long-term monthly repayment type of home loan during the nineteen twenties when most of the loans were made.

The other loans taken over by the Corporation, from banks, insurance and mortgage companies, and individuals, were mainly from six

months to five years in length and, for the borrower, subject to the risk and expense of frequent renewal.

HOLC loans were written for a period of up to 15 years, and are payable through monthly installments of principal and interest by which the unpaid balance is constantly reduced. The interest rate is 5 percent.

Besides its direct effect in giving borrowers the safest and most economical type of loan ever available to home owners in America, HOLC, by example on a grand scale, has spurred the adoption of long-term monthly payment loans by private home-financing institutions of all types throughout the country. It has encouraged the prevalent downward tendency in home mortgage interest rates.

The distribution of HOLC refinancing as to former mortgages, in the group of states cited above is summarized in the July Issue of the Federal Home Loan Bank Review.

The survey also shows that a large number of second and third mortgages at high interest rates were wiped out and consolidated in the HOLC first mortgage loans. It is pointed out that the distribution is not necessarily applicable to the entire country.

PRE-HISTORIC BONES FOUND

MARMADUKE, Ark., July 17 (U.P.)—The skeleton of a pre-historic animal, about 18 feet in length, has been uncovered near here by workmen while excavating. Authorities who have seen the skeleton say the animal was a carnivorous beast. The skeleton is well preserved.

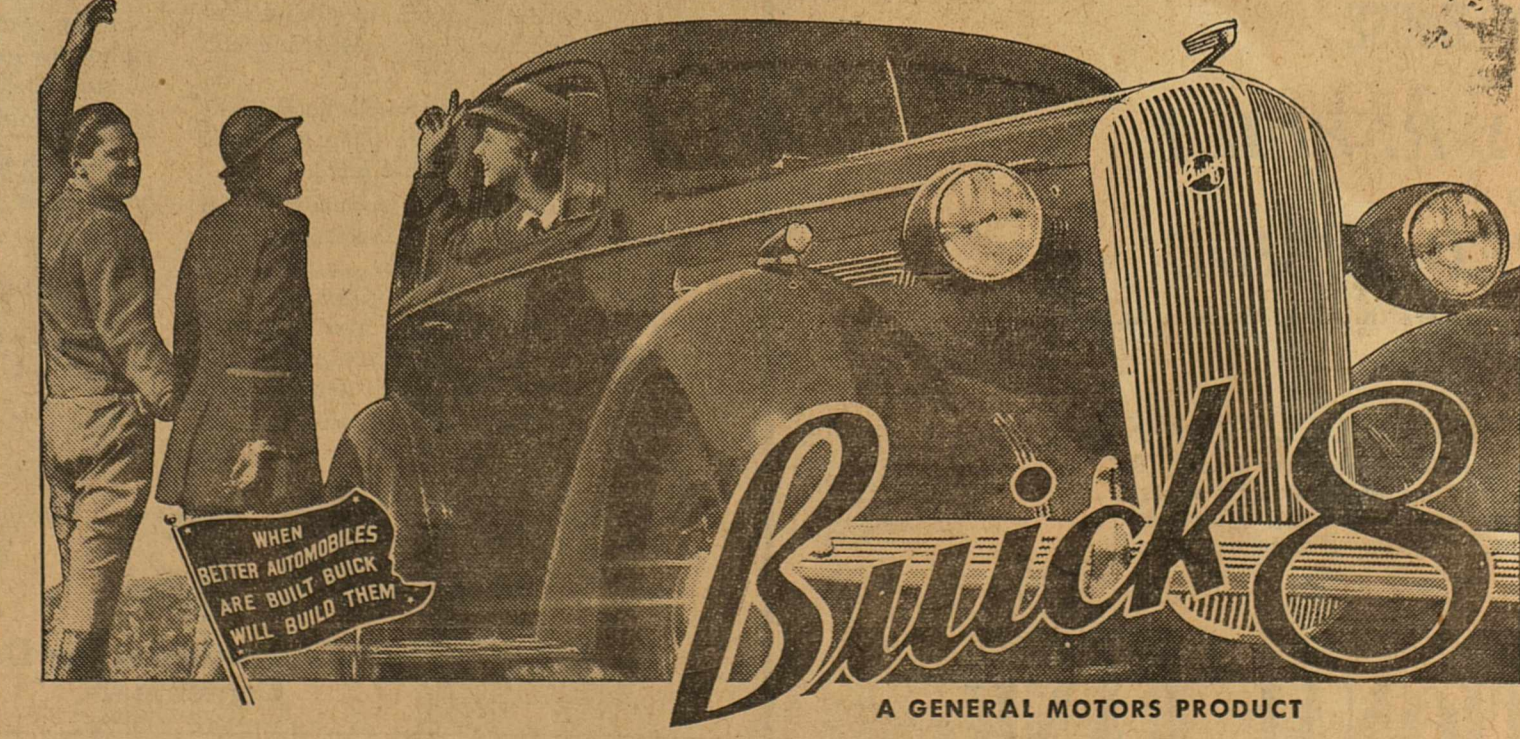

**MAJOR LEAGUES
EYING WINSETT**

COLUMBUS, O., July 17 (U.P.)—A lean, loose-jointed southerner who was just another outfielder in the chain gang of the St. Louis Cardinals a year ago, today is the No. 1 slugger of the minors and a cynosure for the eyes of major league scouts.

He is John Thomas "Jack" Winsett, 24 year old outfielder of the Columbus Red Birds of the American Association.

Winsett, of McKenzie, Tenn., broke into professional baseball in 1929 with Lake Charles in the Cotton States league. The following year he was with Mobile in the Southern Association, and although he hit only 299 he was taken up by the Boston Red Sox and spent the 1931 season with the American League club.

Jack hit a feeble 198 on 76 trips to the plate with Boston and in 1932 was back in the minors at Buffalo. The following season he switched to Montreal and in 1934 was at Rochester. His batting averages for those three International

League seasons were .351, .282 and .356.

Tried by Cardinals
On the basis of his play with Rochester he was tried by the Cardinals and then sent to Columbus, where he hit .348, but failed to impress anyone as a great major league prospect.

Winsett, a left handed hitter, "murdered" right hand pitching but his efforts against southpaws were so poor that he seldom played when a portersider faced him.

At the start of the 1936 season the same policy was followed and Winsett still was just another outfielder.

Then late in May injuries reduced the Columbus squad and the veteran Burt Shotton, manager, was forced to keep Winsett in the lineup regardless of what type of pitcher opponents used.

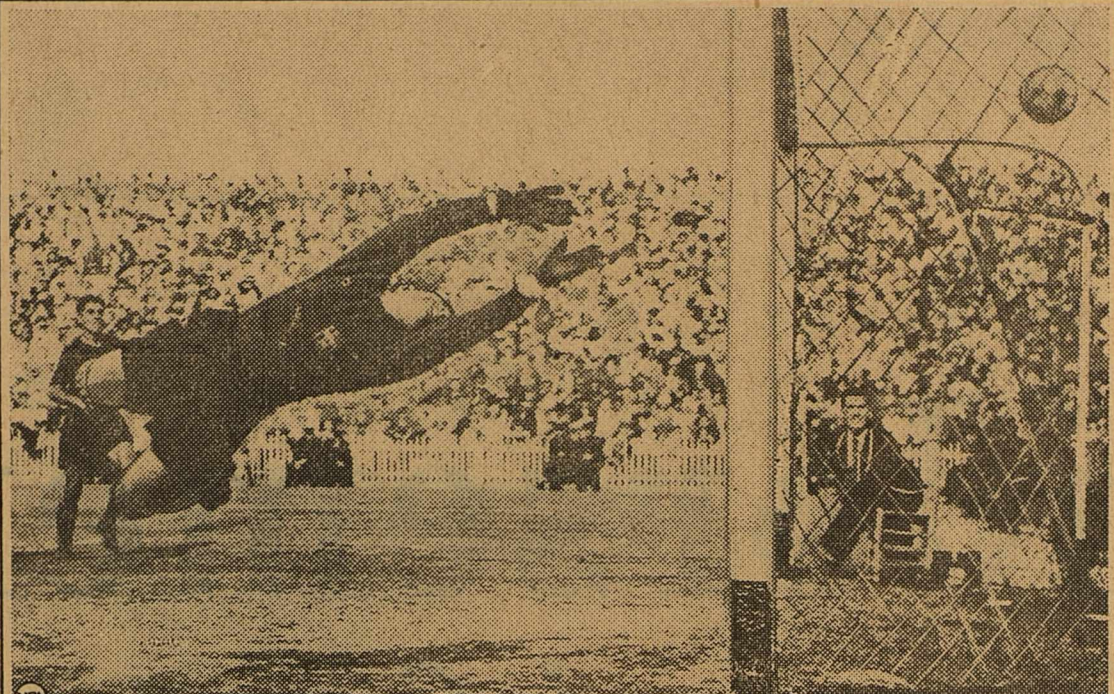
Suddenly the Tennessee became "hot." From May 31 through June 24, Winsett hit safely in 26 consecutive games.

Hit .505 For Stretch
Over the stretch he was at bat 99 times and pounded out 50 hits for a percentage of .505. Included in his barrage of hits were nine doubles, one triple and 18 home runs.

The home run spree during his hitting streak enabled Winsett to boost his total to 33 at the season's half way mark. In seven previous years of professional ball he never hit more than 21 home runs during a single campaign. Winsett's goal now is the All-time American Association record of 69, established in 1933 by Joe Hauser of Minneapolis.

Although the gangling Columbus star has a chance to break Hauser's mark the odds are against him, as when he is at home he plays in a field much more expansive than the park in which Hauser performed.

More Japanese Now Move to Manchukuo

TOKYO, July 17 (U.P.)—A more intensive settlement program for Manchukuo and efforts to improve conditions in the fishing and farm villages at home are planned by leaders who seek to strengthen Japan's economic outlook.

According to reports from government sources, Japan will attempt to send 5,000 Japanese families to Manchukuo next year. An increased subsidy for each household will be granted.

Previous efforts at settlement in Manchukuo are said to have been satisfactory, although the Japanese traditionally are a home-loving people and not enthusiastic over colonization or emigration.

The home situation is causing concern, particularly because of a desire to cement national feeling after the February 26 incident. Cabinet officials have expressed a desire to relieve the plight of agricultural and seacoast towns which have been hit by adverse weather or scant crops.

As a result it has been decided to strengthen the social works investigation commission. Keinosuke Ushio, the home minister, said: "Stabilization of national life is badly needed. We must take into consideration the classes of people most particularly in need. The destitute condition of the farming and fishing villages has deep-rooted causes. Consideration of their grave condition has been neglected in the past but in the existing situation enforcement of social policies aimed at resuscitating these villages is urgently necessary."

Zepp, Va., Postoffice Gets Hindenburg Mail

ZEPP, Va., July 17 (U.P.)—Business at the local postoffice is picking up as a result of the visits of the Hindenburg to the United States.

The Zepp, after whom the town was named years ago, was a relative of the famous Zeppelin family of Germany. As a result, large batches of letters are arriving from souvenir collectors, who ask that they be postmarked in Zepp for mailing to German cities aboard the Hindenburg.

Squirrel Stirs Commotion By Exploring Bass Horn

BROOKLINE, Mass. (U.P.)—It took more than pushing the first and second valves down to get "Fuzzy" the pet squirrel of Martin and John Gannon, to come out of a bass horn.

Fuzzy, curious, decided to explore the interior. The Gannons tried in vain to coax the squirrel out and finally called on the Animal Rescue League. After concocting many schemes they hit upon a solution by placing gasoline in the mouth of the horn and blowing the fumes into the instrument. Fuzzy soon retreated.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 17 (U.P.)—Police investigated a protest by his brother that Roy Springer was spending his soldier's bonus foolishly. They found he had purchased 15 new watches because, "there's nothing like having the right time."

WASHINGTON, July 18 (U.P.)—The bureau of public roads of the U. S. Department of Agriculture announces that highway planning surveys are in progress or soon will begin in 36 states. The surveys are being conducted by the state highway bureau. They will supply information with the cooperation of departments to put forth highway improvement on a sound basis.

In the past attention has been centered on improving the main through highways. In the future more attention must be given, highway officials said, to improving secondary and feeder roads and to improving conditions where the main highways pour their traffic into cities. At the same time the main highways must be maintained and further improved to meet needs that already exist.

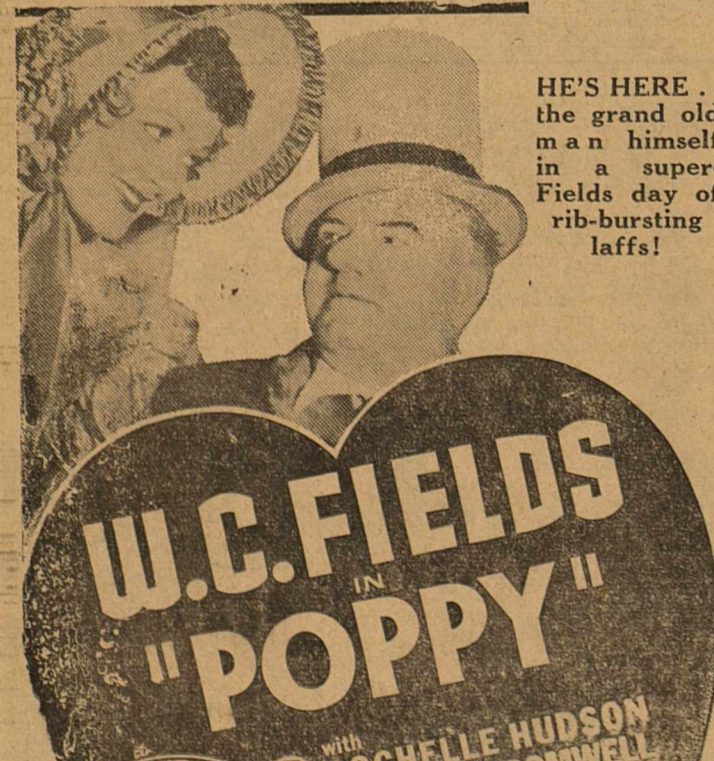
