CLEVELAND, July 18. (AP)- The Fownsend national convention adopted Saturday a resolution declaring the pension organization "shall not at any time during the campaign directly or indirectly endorse any presidential or vice-presidential can didate.

This resolution was an answer to the question as to which way the "Townsend family" would throw its votes in November.

A few delegates said they wanted to endorse specific candidates but they were obviously in the minority, since there were only a few scattered "noes" as the resolution was adopted.

Dr. Townsend, head of the organ zation, told newsmen that he would not attempt to "coerce" his followers but that he would support and work for and "help elect" representative Lemke, union party presilentail candidate.

In Sand Pay Zone

The sand pool east of Jal in Lea county, southeastern New Mexico, Saturday was credited with the largest sand well yet drilled in the Permian Basin when Harry Leonard No. 2 Lanehart, with master-gate only one-sixteenth open, flowed at the rate of 285 barrels an hour for three hours. The well has filled all available storage, and operators will run tubing to kill it preparatory to running a string of 7inch casing.

The No. 2 Lanehart struck oil in . the upper Yates sand at 2,913 and first showed for 15,000,000 cubic feet of gas with only a small amount of oil. After blowing for some time, however, it drilled itself in, with oil flow increasing steadily. A two and one-half hour gague made Friday through open casing showed 124 barrels the first hour, 160 barrels the second and 74 barrels the next hour hour.

The pay horizon of the huge Leonard well is stratigraphically the highest yet found in southeastern New Mexico. Oil in that zone was unexpected, operators having 1,200 feet of open hole. Located in the center of the southeast of the north-
