THE germ of Communism was developing, under the guidance of Karl Marx, in Germany, when it required funds to bring it to maturity. These funds came oblig-ingly from an "angel" who was part of that "capitalistic system" which Communism was being fostered to destroy. The "angel" was Friedrich Engels, native of Germany, and wealthy manufacturer of Manchester, England.

Engels gave not only of his profits, but even wrote and fought for a cause whose primary pur-pose was to end the system on which he depended for his wealth. His belief in Communism, however, far exceeded his interest in his business, and he became close collaborator with Karl Marx in the revolutionary philosophy of the time. He helped prepare the "Communist Manifesto" of 1848, edited part of Karl Marx's famous work, "Das Kapital," and wrote many original books and


