



# Two Deputy Sheriffs In Gun Battle With 2 **Miners Killed**

YREKA, Cal., Aug. 31 (U.P)-Three men, two of them Siskiyou county deputy sheriffs and the third a civilian, were slain early Sunday in a desperate battle with two gold miner brothers along Horse Creek deep in the woods of this Northern California mountain town.

The brothers, John and Coke Bright, fled into the mountains where posses believed they had them surrounded late in the day. The dead were: Martin Lang, 45,

Yreka, a deputy sheriff of the staff of Sheriff W. C. Chandler; Joseph Clark, 65, Yreka, also a deputy sheriff, and Fred Seaborn, 48, Vallejo, yard pilot for the United States Navy at the Mare Island navy yard

Talk of a double lynching was heard as public indignation mounted in this town which a year ago witnessed the lynching of C. L. Johnson, suspect in the slaying of a Dunsmuir police chief.

The posses seeking the brothers were scattered through the dense underbrush and the forests lining the southern slope of the Siskiyou mountains leading from the open camp along the creek in which the bodies of the three slaying victims were found.
