REGION CLUB CALF SALE ENDORSED BY RETAILERS HERE

To Hold Affair In

Connection With Feeder Sale

TO GIVE PRIZES

250 Will Be Offered To Winning Boys At Show

Endorsement of a plan to hold a regional club calf show at Midland Fair, in connection with the fall feeder calf show and race meet, was voted this morning by the retailers' committee of the chamber of commerce. The body referred to the board of directors the proposition of appropriating or raising approximately \$250 for cash prizes.

County agent S. A. Debnam presented the proposal, advising that county agents of the thirty-seventh district, meeting here early this week signified their desire to bring boys from their various counties with calves which have been fed in 4-H club projects. There are from 40 to 50 counties which probably would have entries, with estimated groups of five to 25 person from each coun ty represented, Debnam said.
It was pointed out that to make

the show and sale an annual affair in connection with the carlot feeder calf show of ranchers of this area, would stamp Midland as the calf club center, there being no regular fall show of this nature. Several are held at various points each spring. The calf club show would be just another phase of the fall fair, where in the carlot feeder show and sale will find 1,000 head of top calves from ranches of this section. 
