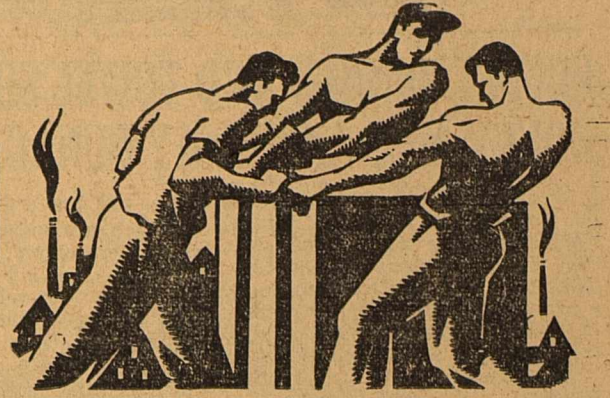




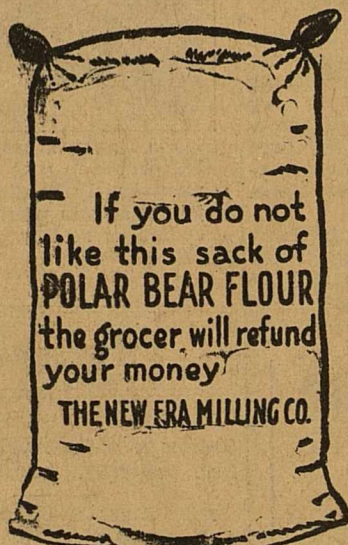
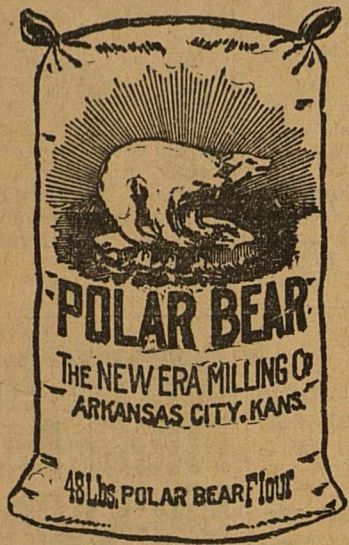

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 3. — The National Collegiate Dairy Cattle Judging Contest will award twenty-four trophies and prizes when the affair is held in the Coliseum at the Texas Centennial Exposition Monday Oct. 12, it was announced today by Eurt Oederkirk, of DeKalb, Ill., contest superintendent.

Contestants will have to start all over again to get a leg on the Ayrshire Breeding Association's new silver trophy as last year's trophy was won for the third successive time by Michigan State and became Michigan's permanent property.

Among the colleges and universities that are considered certain entrants are the 1935 champions, Iowa State, whose team ranked first in judging Guernseys, University of Ohio, winners in judging Holsteins, Purdue University, winners in judging Jerseys, Kansas State, winners in judging all breeds and Michigan State.

SERVILE TO HIS QUEEN



KING ALEXANDER of Serbia, weak in mind and spirit, was 24 when, in 1900, he married his mistress, Draga Mashin. Then Serbia suffered under the cruelty, intolerance, and selfishness of a queen who had no thought but to increase her power and that of her two arrogant brothers in the army. When the congress objected to her actions, the queen had Alexander suspend the constitution, dismiss the legislators, and replace them with men of Draga's choice. Stories were spread of Draga's cruelty, selfishness, and immorality. These the people believed, and prepared to overthrow the regime of Alexander and Draga. Taking advantage of that feeling, one night in 1903, a band of conspirators entered the palace, slew Alexander and Draga and hurled their bodies into the streets of Belgrade.
This story is recalled by a picture of King Alexander on a Serbian stamp that was issued during his reign.

DETROIT LIONS AND COLLEGE STARS BATTLE TO 7-7 DRAW BEFORE 76,000

'Dutch' Clark Leads Pros From Behind To Tie Up Score Late In Game

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—In a furious last minute drive the Detroit Lions, champions of the professional football world, came from behind to battle one of the greatest groups of college all-stars ever assembled to a 7 to 7 tie on flood lighted Soldiers Field last night.

The spectacular, bruising battle was witnessed by 76,361 spectators, with the gate receipts at \$130,146.

The Lions, offering nothing spectacular in the way of offense excepting Captain Earl "Dutch" Clark's gallop of 32 yards in the first period, seized advantage of a break that enabled them to get into scoring position.

Returning to the game for the final period, Clark, the former Colorado college all-American, inspired his players in a furious assault. He ripped off nine yards, then smashed and then the Lions punted to the all stars 28 yard line. On the next play Alphonse (Tuffy) Leemans of George Washington University, who had played a smashing running game, was hit hard and fumbled on the all-stars 28 yard mark. Tom Hupke, the big Lions guard, pounced on the ball.

The Lion's drive for a touchdown was then started in an irresistible drive. Ernie Caddel, Lions halfback who played the entire game, ripped through for 12 yards for a first down on the all-star 17-yard line.

Clark then took the ball in two drives, adding eight more.

While the all-stars were alertly watching Clark, expecting him to take the ball on the next play the Lions sprang a surprise like a bombshell. Caddel took the ball on a reverse and tore around his left end, almost untouched and sprawled across the goal line for the touchdown after an 8-yard sprint. Clark drop-kicked perfectly for the extra point and the count was deadlocked as it remained to the end.

Throwing the longest pass of the four completed by the all-stars, a heave of 30 yards, Leemans started the collegians on the way to their touchdown in the second period. Leemans' pass fell into the hands of Loems of Purdue on the Lions 19-yard line. The Lions broke up three line plunges and then Berwanger replaced Leemans. This move was just a bit of masterful timing, however, because Babe Levor, Minnesota's buzz-saw, took the ball after receiving a short lateral pass and cut back through the center of the line to race over for a touchdown, sending the huge throng into a frenzy. It was the first touchdown scored since the series was started in 1934.

Southwest representatives in the game were Spain (Southern Methodist) in the starting lineup. Lawrence (Texas Christian), Wilson (Southern Methodist), and Manton (Texas Christian), substitutes.
