### WAR POSSIBILITY

Japanese Issue New Ultimatum For Satisfaction

HONGKONG. Sept. 16. (A)-Martial law was proclaimed in the southern city of Pakohoi today where defiant soldiers are opposing a Japanese and Chinese investigation of the killing of a Japanese druggist September 3.

Rebellious members of the Chinese army refused to withdraw to allow inquires ordered by Tokyo and Nanking governments.

Japan's ambassador called upon foreign minister Chang Chun to evacuate the Chinese soldiers as soon as possible. The visit was regarded as a move to force the Japanese investigation.

In a two-hour conference with General Chun Shigeru Kawagoe, the Japanese ambassador, declared Tokyo holds the National Chinese Government responsible for the death of two Japanese and expects

In the hope that complaints relating to them may soon be reuced to a minimum, and eventualentirely eliminated, I quote cerin laws on the subject. > in the actual possession of such erson, within five hundred yards of any private residence, or in any public road or highway, or in any street or alley of any town or city, or within fifty yards of such public road, highway, street or alley, shall be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars."

Art. 696-a. P. C. "That no mucicipal corporation, private corporaion, partnership, joint stock association, syndicate, voluntary association or person shall use or maintain any dumping ground or dump any trash, refuse, debris, or dead animals or premit the same to remain within or nearer than three hundred yards of any public highway of the State of Texas; that no person, firm or corporation, as above named, shall dump or deposit any rubbish, trash, chief justice of the Supreme Court. person, firm or corporation or not; provided, however, that the provisions of this Act shall not affect farmers in the handling of anything

> Any violation of this Act by any person, firm or private corporation shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than two hundred dollars, and each day of such violation shall be a separate offense. In event of any threatened or probable violation of this Act by any public corporation, municipality, city, town or vilan injunction suit may be brought to prevent any such threatcounty or district attorney, or any private individual affected or to be affected by any such threatened or probable violation. The enforcement of the remedy by injunction as herein provided shall not prevent the enforcement of the other pen-

alties provided in this Act."

way any vehicle which as on its periphery any block, lug, stud, ridge, bead or any other protuberance of metal that shall project more than one-fourth of an inch beyond the tread or traction surface of the tire, unless the said wheels are protected by bands, wooden blocks, skids or some sufficient device to protect

the highway against injury by reason thereof. Nothing herein shall prevent the use of traction engines with cleats on the driving wheels thereof on dirt or unimproved roads, gaged at the time in construction or repair work on roads. Whoever vioshall be fined not to exceed one hundred dollars."

The preceding acticle might be interpreted to mean that there is nothing in it to prevent driving tractor with lugs or cleats on the wheels of any length, but such drivthey are dirt roads, does unquestionably damage them, and paragraph 3, of article 6716 of the Revised Civil Statute of Texas reads as fol-

"The owners, operators, drivers or contrivance over a public high-way or bridge shall be jointly and severally responsible for the damof such vehicle, or as the result of bidden by said road officials. The amount of such damages may be recovered in an action at law by the county judge for the use of the county, and such recovery shall go to the benefit of the damaged road.

Sonora Houses By Storm

LOSSES GROWING

Livestock Drowned As Rivers Leap From Bounds

By Associated Press Central West Texas braced itself against encroaching flood waters today as heavy rains continued there being a fear that a seven-inch deluge over the Colorado river drainage area might endanger the Inks dam near Burnet.

Water backed up in Devil river draw into Sonora homes, and telephone lines were down from San Angelo. Menard was practically flooded; and a bridge was washed out west of Junction in the wake of a 48-hour rainfall of more than 12 inches. Stock losses in all the flooded areas was heavy. The Nueces river near Campwood and Rock Springs was nearing a new crest.

Heavy rains fell at Kerrville, Eastland, Lampassas, Brownwood, Abilene, and Weatherford.

The town of Christoval suffered a loss estimated at \$2,000 from the unprecedented rains there, but the damage was occasioned almost as much by a draw which begins at Cat Top mountain and runs through the center of the town, as by the South

William Osborn, 75, Kerrville, was drowned while attempting to cross the Guadalupe river near that town. His body was washed a half-mile before being recovered by searchers. When the rains halted in San Angelo the total was officially recorded as 12.67 inches. Christoval had 16.25 inches in less than 24 hours.
