175,000 REBELS START DRIVE ON SPAIN'S CAPITAL

Fiercest Battle Of Entire War Rages Near Toledo

RECRUIT PILOTS

'Daredevil' Flyers Being Signed By Government

MADRID, Sept. 17 (P)—Spanish Fascists flung 175,000 men at Toledo and Madrid today on three main fronts, the fiercest battle since the outbreak of the revolution raging near Toledo where a last-min-ute delay gave 1,750 Fascists a final chance to evacuate the besieged Alcazar before being blow to bits from underground mines.

The government had announced that TNT had been placed under the fortress and that everyone in it, women and children included, would be destroyed by a blast.

A fascist drive on the capital began west of Madrid and a third assault from the northeast.

The government announced foreign "daredevil" pilots were being recruited to start an aerial offensive with a fleet of new bombing fighting planes.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (P)— President Roosevelt told the annual meeting of mobilization for human needs today that national incomes would soon be double what was the depression's low point and "confidence returned to a great mass of

He said that because of the "re turning prosperity" private relief organizations should expect a large neasure of private aid. Mobilization delegates seek sup-port for social services financed by private funds rather than taxes.

By ALICIA HART NEA Service Staff Writer Exercises to keep feet flexible and ankles trim and slender are important to the woman who wants to step as lightly and gracefully at 40 as she did at 20. These should be

done every night just before going to

First of all, sit upright on a hard bed with heels touching. Raise your feet upward as high as they will go, meanwhile holding your knees perfectly straight and feet close together. Repeat three times, then keeping heels on bed, bend your feet forward toward your body. This stretches and strength ens arch and ankle muscles. Hold the position a few seconds, relax, and stretch toes forward the foot of the bed. Knees must not bend. Keep on stretching until top of the feet and ankles feel the strain. Go through the entire routine ten

times each night. Now stand with feet about ten inches apart and weight on the outer edges of both. Raise your heels. Lower. Raise your toes. Lower. Repeat ten times

Working on this assumption General Parker's staff has made plans to move the civilian population and all moveable property from 17 south Texas counties, namely Cameron, Willacy, Hidalgo, Kennedy, Kleburg, Nueces, San Patricio, Refugio, Aransas, Calhoun, Bee, Goliad, Jim Wells Duval, Brooks, Jim Hogg and Starr

In this area alone in the event of an actual invasion by a foreign power, the army would be faced with the gigantic task of clearing the prob able theater of operations of 343,-200 persons and 887,300 head of live

To accomplish his purpose, Gener al Parker in time of actual war would call on hosts of civilians to aid him in evacuating the area County Clerks, county sheriffs, constables, county commissioner's courts, state police on duty in each county, mayors and city officials and police and fire departments in cities and towns would be called in to expedite the removal of the civilian population and their movable property. County judges would be charged with the responsibility of initiating and effecting the evacuation of their respective counties. Supervision would be maintained by the Army Provost Marshall working under orders from the War Department and General Parker.

To be sure that the rich Rio Grande valley crops and livestock would not fall into the hands of the enemy, civilian motor transportation of all kinds, railroads, civilian and other available transport would be called into use.

For the purpose of the current estored, Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, chief Command Post Exercises, San Patricio, Aransas, Refugio and Calhoun counties would be sent to the Houston Area.

Inhabitants of Cameron, Willacy Kennedy, Jim Wells, Bee and Go-liad will be concentrated at Austin and the evacuees from Hidalgo, Starr, Jim Hogg, Brooks and Duval would be sent to the area around Georgetown, Taylor and Temple, Texas.

To avoid congestion certain direct highways would be designated for the movement and reserved for the specific use of exacuee transportation. To insure that the roads are left clear strict orders would be issued for traffic control and control points manned by civilian officers working under military soupervi-

Since San Antonio under the asumed mythical invasion becomes the principal military concentra-tration point in the theater of operations, precautions would be taken to see that evacuees from south Texas are not permitted to stop in the San Antonio area. To accomplish this roads that do not pass through San Antonio would be utilized for evacuation.

While traffic control on roads assumes the utmost importance to insure efficient and quick evacuation, routing of evacuation trains and empty troop trains returning from combat zone, becomes equally important to avoid congestion in the concentration areas.
