



"The United States supreme court in 1932 held in a clear-cut decision that congressional districts need not even be approximately equal in population. County commissioners precincts, city commissioners precincts, judicial districts, school districts and many other subdivisions created for legislative purposes, are not laid out on a population only basis, but usually with an eye to giving each section or community fair represen-tation. Geographic and territorial considerations play an important part in shaping the aforementioned districts, and should likewise be considered in laying out representative districts instead of using population
