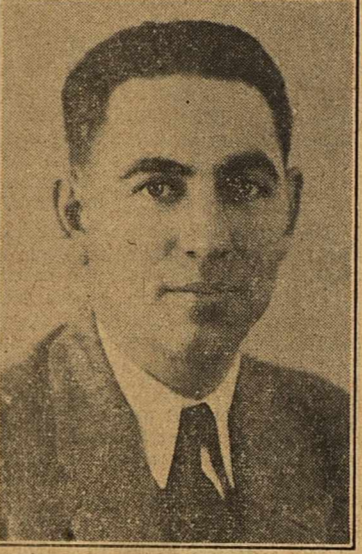

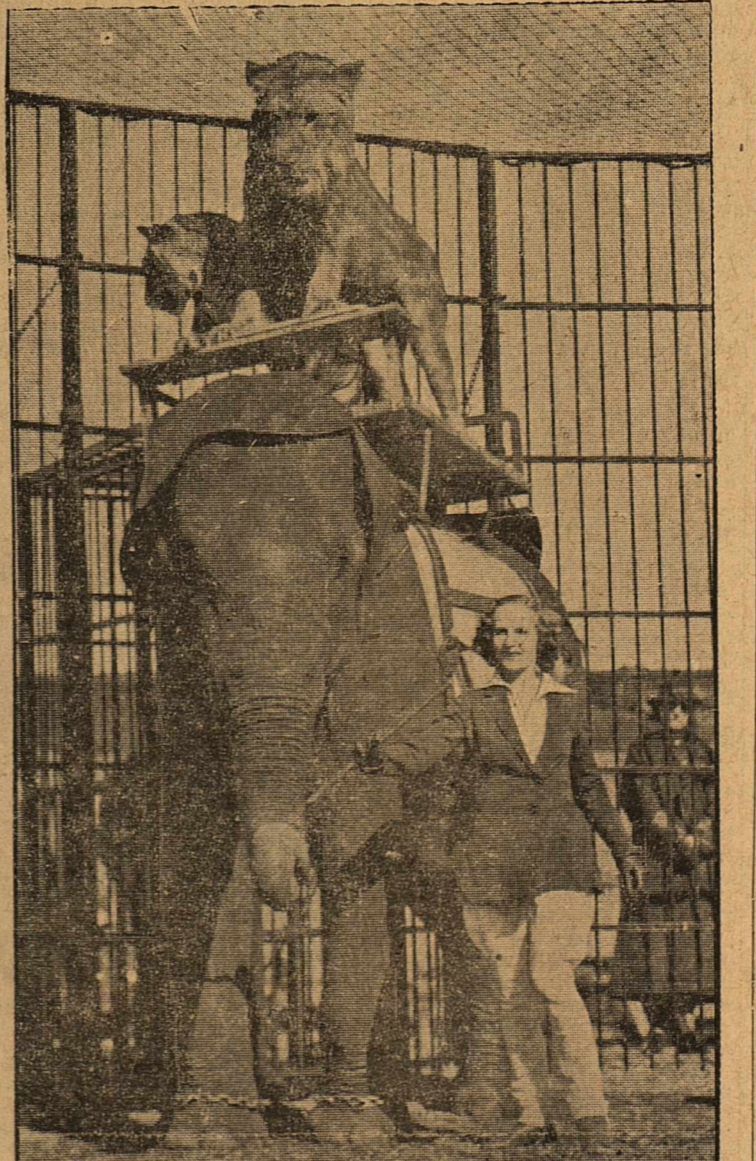

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13. — The United States Supreme Court has been rather effectively kept out of the election campaign and if it finds itself now involved it has only itself to blame.

The justices aren't passing on any more New Deal legislation before election. But their answer to petitions for a rehearing on the New York state minimum wage law will generally be taken as approximately equaling in importance the 5 to 4 decision against the law which the court handed down early in the summer.

The original decision had a pronounced influence on the two political conventions and probably on the campaign as well. Popular reaction was such as to bolster somewhat the administration as against the court and to cause Governor Landon to suggest a possible constitutional amendment—the inevitable effect being to blur what many politicians had figured would be a clean-cut issue.

Looms Again as Issue Lately the politicians have again been figuring. New Dealers decided that if the court should grant the rehearing asked by New York, Illinois, and other states which have minimum wage laws, they would be able to cry out that even the supreme court itself had recognized that it wasn't infallible.

On the other hand, if the petition were denied, they would again be able to picture the five conservative justices as hard-jawed, biased.

Reporters Race Shows Girdling of Globe At Last Swift, Comfortable

The Acoustics Are Said To Be Quite a Problem

Senor Ferdinand Magellan started something back in 1519 when his five little ships dropped down the Guadalquivir river from Seville, Spain, and stood out to sea.

He was to travel around the globe, and he gave man an idea which they have been pursuing ever since.

The three New York newspaper writers now racing to girdle the globe, using only commercial air schedules available to any traveler, are following in the wake of the little ships of Magellan.

Today's Magellans a la carte — H. R. Elkins, Scripps-Howard; Leo Kieran, New York Times; and Dorothy Kilgallen, New York Journal reporters—should have a somewhat better time of it than the original globe trotter.

Magellan lost his life in the Philippines midway in the journey, and his party suffered incredible hardships. They were forced to eat oxides, sawdust, and rats before Juan Sebastian del Cano finally brought one ship, the Victoria, home to Seville after a journey of 1083 days.

Only 31 men of the expedition survived.

Drake Broke Record Navigators in those days weren't thinking of breaking records—the idea was to get around the world in any way they could. But nevertheless Sir Francis Drake broke Magellan's record in 1577-80 by circumnavigating the globe in 1052 days.

No doubt their time was broken by many voyages before 1872, but definite records are scarce. In that year a book appeared which turned men's mind again to around-the-world travel. It was Jules Verne's 'Around the World in 80 Days.'

People in stuffy Victorian drawing rooms sniffed and avowed that it couldn't be done, that it was just another pipe dream of the fantastic Frenchman.

Nellie Bly Sets Mark In 1889, the New York World had a girl reporter, Elizabeth Cochrane who wrote feature stories under the name of Nellie Bly. She was only 21, 'about as big as a minute and prettier than she should be.'

One day her editor assigned her to try the impossible stunt which Verne had described in his fanciful book, and to 'lop off four or five days if possible.'

With practically no advance preparations at all, Nellie Bly sailed all alone, for Europe. And when she came back, 72 days, 6 hours and 11 minutes later, she not only had broken Verne's fictional record, but she was a national heroine.

That started it. Within a year her record was broken by another adventurous traveler and others continued to reduce it until, in 1913, John Henry Mears, an American traveler, made it in 35 days, 21 hours and 36 minutes. That record stood for many years. They all largely depend on luck and on skill in making boat and train connections.

Army Men Shave Time Now another element entered the picture. The United States army sent a fleet of planes around the world in 1924. Lieutenants Smith, Wade, and Nelson brought their ships home in 175 days. But their actual flying time had been only 14 days and 15 hours.

That opened the way to new records, and the next were made by combinations of the old steamship-and-rail routes and with planes. Edward S. Evans and Linton Wells made in 28 days, 14 hours and 36 minutes in 1925, and Mears came back in 1928 with a plane pilot, C. B. Collyer, to cut that time to 24 days, 15 hours, 21 minutes.

Still another means of speedy globe travel came into the picture in 1929, when the Graf Zeppelin made her famous circuit. The Graf was a lineal ancestor of the Hindenburg, on which today's globe trotters started out. The Graf, thundering out of the night above Europe, Asia, and America, came home to Lakehurst in 20 days and 4 hours.

Flyers Take Short Way The next defiance of the earth's spacious surface came in 1931 when Wiley Post and Harold Gatty made the complete circuit in 8 days, 15 hours, 51 minutes.

This flight, epoch-making enough in its own right, differs somewhat from most of the globe-encircling records, inasmuch as it was made had made a reconnaissance up and down the street.

Next day photographers rushed up as he was leaving. "No pictures!" exclaimed Hughes. "What no pictures?" echoed the boys. "No pictures!" repeated Hughes firmly.

Justice VanDevanter posed obligingly and Justice Cardozo made no complaint about a surprise shot. Justice Roberts was out of town but the doorman at his home was found to be wearing a big Landon sunflower. Mrs. Justice Stone was very nice and was sure a photo could be arranged later. Justice Sutherland sent out word that he was ill. Justice Brandeis was non-co-operative. Justice McReynolds refused.

Justice Butler became enraged at an attempt to snap him in his automobile. He poked his cane under the photographer's nose and cried, "You get out of here!"

Court May Stay Intact One table says the oldest of the justices has a life expectancy of more than four years and so it might be deduced that Roosevelt would have no chance to fill a court vacancy if re-elected. On the other hand, since 1789 no five years have ever passed without the occurrence of a vacancy. The last one was in 1932, when Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes resigned and was succeeded by Cardozo.



in northern latitudes. That is, instead of putting a belt around the earth at its broadest part, Post and Gatty threw a collar around her neck where she is narrowest. It was a circuit of the pole, but scarcely of the earth.

Reduced to absurdity, this method of globe-circling admits that Peary walked around the world in two days when he was at the North Pole, and Byrd flew around it in a few hours.

Theoretically, if you stood exactly beside the pole, you could walk around the world in a few steps. It is the difference between going around on a parallel of latitude close to the pole, and making a "great circle" around the globe at its greatest dimension.

In 1933 Post beat his own record, over almost the same far-northern course flying alone in the staunch Winnie Mae, and coming home in 7 days, 18 hours, 49 1/2 minutes.

New Kind of Race But the present race is more in the spirit of Nellie Bly. It will not show what can be done after months of preparation, at unlimited expense, as a stunt. It will break no speed records.

It will show what is available to anyone in the world who has the price and a little ingenuity.

The three American newspaper writers now racing around the globe will use no facilities than regularly scheduled airlines and connections. The spanning of the Pacific by the American clipper ships has closed the last link in a chain of regular airlines around the globe.

This journey is to mark the fact that man's conquest of the air now provides an air lane around the world at no greater difficulty than it takes to buy a ticket.

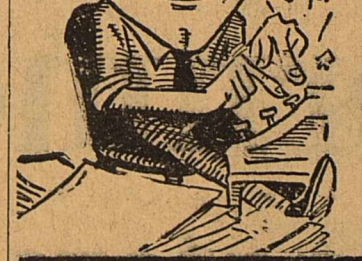

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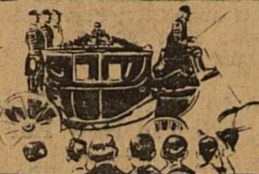

STAMP collectors of Great Britain are expecting several issues of commemorative stamps for the coronation of King Edward VIII early next year. Great Britain itself may have a set, and Australia and South Africa already have submitted designs for such stamps to the king.

India will not have a commemorative series, but the new Edward stamps will be issued at the time of the coronation. These will have special designs, with King Edward wearing his crown.

Canada and Newfoundland also are expected to come into line with coronation commemoratives of their own.

The Philatelic Agency at Washington has removed the Mother's Day rotary press stamps from sale. Sale of flat plate stamps was discontinued some time ago. Nearly 200,000,000 of the rotaries were printed.

Canada has run out of its 5-cent jubilee stamps, and none is available at the Philatelic Agency in Ottawa.

Turkey is issuing a special stamp commemorating restoration of full sovereignty over the Dardanelles.

A new kind of stamp is one planned by Belgium in connection with the forthcoming national philatelic exposition. It will be a special delivery type of double regular value, and will be available as an "admission ticket" to the exposition. Moore Bros. No. 1 T. C. Barnsley, Crage, county deep test, is drilling lime at 5,927 feet. The well is reported to have gone out of the Permian; 5,715, but opinions differ as to whether it is now in the Pennsylvania or Ordovician. It is in section 43, block 32, public school land.

After reaming to bottom at 6,388, drill-pipe became stuck in Gulf No. 2 Waddell, another Crane deep test, and efforts are now being made to free it.
Attempts yesterday to swab the Loffland Bros. No. 2 Tubb, Tubb area well, ended in failure when swab would not go below 3,000 feet from the top. Swabbing and testing were to be resumed today. The well defined a new producing horizon for the area 200 feet below the regular Tubb pay when it filled with oil in drilling from 4,625 to 4,628, the present depth.

Drilling Plug
Plug is now being drilled today from the Honolulu, Cascade & Devonian No. 1 Duggan, southeast Cochran strike. The well is now bottomed at 5,038 and had 4,600 feet of oil in the hole before setting 7-inch casing at 4,946. It will probably be tested before any new hole is made. The No. 1 Duggan is over 25 miles north of the closest producing area, the Bennett pool in Yoakum county.

In Gaines county, Amerada No. 1-A Averitt is drilling anhydrite below 3,560, showing gas through rotary mud.

Keyes Pool Well
Mid-Continent No. 4 Walton, Keyes pool well in Winkler, flowed 50 barrels the first hour after a shot of 1150 quarts from 2,800 to 2,950, the total depth.

Reid & Duffey No. 1 Sealey, southeastern Winkler, wildcat, is drilling today below 3,200 in anhydrite after a shut down while changing engines.

RANGE AND LIVESTOCK CONDITIONS IN STATE SHOW LARGE IMPROVEMENT

Prospects for Winter Grazing During The Winter Best in Years

Range and livestock conditions were very favorable on October 1, 1936. Prospects for winter grazing are very good for the State as a whole. September rains improved conditions materially in the north central and northwestern portions of the State.

Ranges: Cattle ranges improved 11 points during the month of September this year, while the average improvement based on the last 10-year record is only 2.5 percent. The conditions on October 1, 1936, was 86 percent of normal, compared with 75 percent a month ago, 88 percent a year ago, and 80 percent of the 10-year (1926-35) average on October 1. Cattle ranges were in very good condition in all of the southern half of the State and in a fair to good condition in most section of the northern half of the State. September general rains over practically all of the State accounted for the improvement in the condition of cattle ranges. Heavy rains throughout north and northwest Texas, except in the extreme northern portion of the Panhandle, did much in reviving grass, and if the weather remains favorable long enough this fall an ample growth of grass for winter grazing is virtually assured. Prospects for small grain grazing are in view in areas where grass was short, in the event freezing weather should come before the grass has time to make sufficient growth. Most of the Panhandle area has grain fields well started and prospects are splendid for winter grazing in grain fields. In areas in the north central portion of Texas small grain plantings were somewhat delayed, but prospects winter grazing in small grain fields are good.

Sheep ranges improved 14 points during September, while the average improvement for the last 10 years is only 1.3 percent. The condition on October 1, 1936, was 92 percent of normal, compared with 78 percent a month ago, 94 percent a year ago, and 78 percent of the 10-year average on October 1. The entire sheep producing area is in very good shape, and prospects for winter grazing are very good. Good rains over the entire sheep area during September did much in increasing the ample to surplus range feed. Ranges in this area can carry additional livestock. Ample range and other feed supplies are assured in both the Edwards Plateau and Trans-Pecos Regions.

Livestock: Cattle condition improved 4 points during September. The condition on October 1, 1936, was 86 percent of normal compared with 82 percent a month ago, 87 percent a year ago, and 82 percent of the 10-year (1926-35) average on October 1. Cattle are in good condition in all sections of the State with a large number of grass fat cattle available in the southwestern portion of the State.

Sheep improved 3 points during September. The condition on October 1, 1936, was 84 percent of normal, compared with 81 percent a month ago, 90 percent a year ago, and 82 percent of the 10-year average on October 1. Sheep and lambs are in good condition, generally. Indications are that sheep and lambs will come through the winter in good shape, and prospects are good for a large lamb crop next spring. Goats improved 1 point during

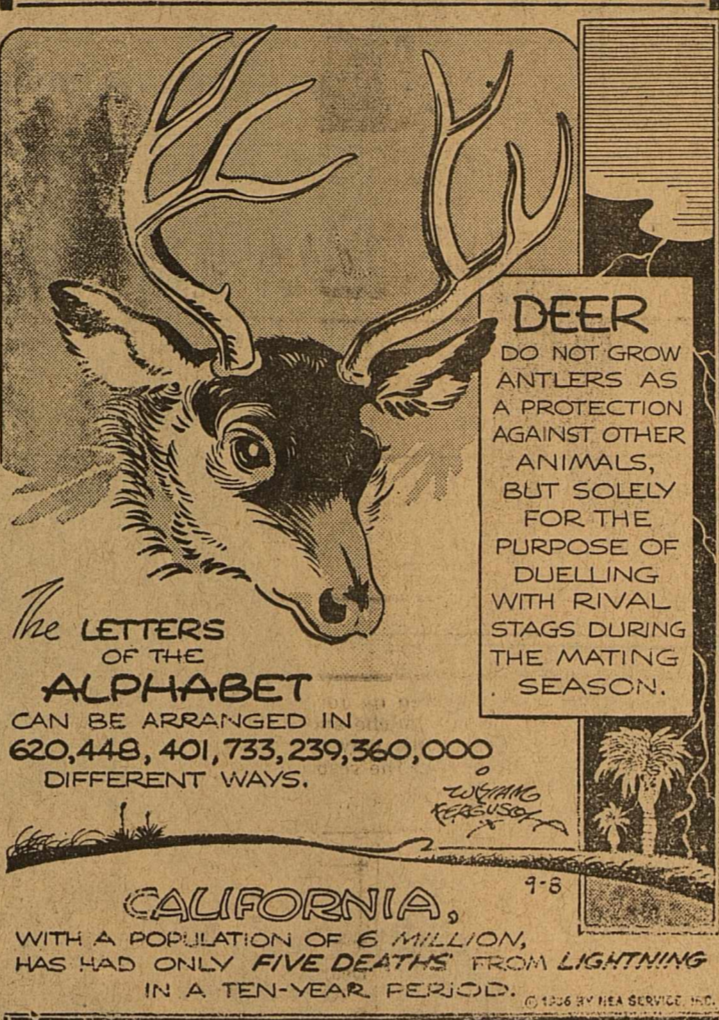
September. The conditions on October 1, 1936, was 87 percent of normal, compared with 86 percent a month ago, 91 percent a year ago, and 84 percent of the 10-year average on October 1.

17 Western States
Ranges: Late September rains broke the drought in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, and New Mexico. These rains supplied much moisture but came rather late to make much feed on the burned ranges and pastures, unless weather conditions are favorable. Range and pasture feeds have been improved by some rain in the eastern Dakotas and parts of Nebraska. Drought conditions continue in the western Dakotas, eastern Montana, and northeastern Wyoming, where there is little feed. Feeds are short through the central third of Montana, parts of east-central Wyoming, and northwestern Nebraska. Fall and winter ranges are generally in good condition in western Montana, south-central and western Wyoming, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, Arizona, and Utah. California has fair to good feed, but winter feed is dependent on rain. Wheat and grain pasture prospects are promising but late in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, and parts of Nebraska. Texas has good ranges except in the northern areas that were dry. Hay, grains, and other feed are short in the Great Plains sections. The state west of the Divide, the mountain sections, Colorado, western Wyoming, western Montana, and New Mexico have ample feeds. Texas has ample feeds with some surplus, except in the north. The condition of ranges is 74 percent of normal, compared with 70 percent last month, 83 percent a year ago, and the ten-year (1926-35) average of 79.4 percent. The record low condition was 55 percent on October 1, 1934. The condition on October 1, 1933 was 76 percent and on October 1, 1931, 71 percent.

Cattle: Cattle are generally in good condition except a few in the dry areas. Cattle in the drought sections held up very well. Cattle shipments were fairly heavy during September, but the bulk of the cattle from the more severe northern areas moved prior to September 1. Short feed and high prices of shipped-in feeds will force fairly heavy shipments from some areas. Section with ample weed supplies have not shipped many cattle and the cattle may be held rather closely in these sections, if prices are not satisfactory. Many of the cattle from eastern Montana, the western Dakotas, northeastern Wyoming moved to pastures, or were sold locally and shipped west and east. The condition of cattle and calves is 83 percent of normal, compared with 81 percent last month, 87 percent a year ago and the ten-year (1926-35) average of 85.3 percent.

Sheep: Sheep are generally in good condition and above average condition, except in the Dakotas, Montana, and Wyoming. Winter sheep ranges generally have a good supply of feed, except in eastern Montana, northeastern Wyoming and northeastern New Mexico. Conditions are unusually good in the sheep section of Texas. Short feed forced a heavy movement of sheep and lambs from eastern Montana, the western Dakotas, and northeastern Wyoming, many of these being sold to go to farms and other ranges. The late lamb movement is well under way from the northern ranges, with most sheep moved from summer ranges. The condition of sheep and lambs is 86 percent of normal, compared with 85 percent last month, 90 percent a year ago, and the ten-year (1926-35) average of 87.3 percent.

Military Stations Receive WPA Funds

FORT SAM HOUSTON, Oct. 13.—The Works Progress Administration has allotted the additional \$602,817 for projects at military stations and posts within the eighth corps area for the fiscal year of 1937 bringing the total allotted to date to approximately \$1,372,817.

Funds are being used on projects for the repair of buildings, construction and repair of utilities, roads, sewer lines, water lines, repair of transportation facilities and the improvement of parks and recreational facilities.

Allotments for air corps landing fields are being used for the repair of landing fields, runways, roads, streets, buildings and utilities.

Of the total figure of \$1,372,817, the amount of \$1,087,817 is being spent at posts and stations directly under the control of the eighth corps area, and the sum of \$285,000 is being expended at stations not directly under the eighth corps area control.

The \$285,000 is being spent at William Beaumont General Hospital, El Paso; Duncan Field, San Antonio; Kelly Field, San Antonio; Randolph Field, San Antonio; Fort Sill, Lawton, Okla.; and Fitzsimons

General Hospital Denver, Colo. Regular stations in the eighth corps area had, prior to the latest grant of \$602,817, received \$485,000 bringing the total to \$1,087,817.

Stations allotted the \$1,372,817 include: Fort Sam Houston; eighth corps area general depot, San Antonio; Fort Bliss, El Paso; Fort Brown, Brownsville; Fort Crockett, Galveston; Fort Huachuca, Arizona; Fort Logan, Colo.; Fort McIntosh, Laredo; Biggs Field, Fort Bliss; Mormoyle Quartermaster depot, San Antonio; Fort Ringgold, Rio Grande City; Fort D. A. Russell, Marfa; Fort Francis E. Warren, Wyoming.

Zoo to Outfit Monkey Tribe in New Fur Coats

MOSCOW, (U.P.) — The Moscow zoo will put pants, fur coats and gloves on its monkeys this winter to keep them warm.

While polar bears thrive in the frigid Russian winter, tropical animals suffer from being kept indoors, so discovering that fresh air greatly improved the health of its charges, the zoo management will endeavor to keep such animals as it can outdoors.

Providing clothes for monkeys was comparatively simple, but when it came to the elephants, the

zoo was up against another problem. In solution it constructed a huge light hall, of 300 square meters, replacing iron railings with a trench or moat, connected with which is a special elephant hospital.

The monkeys, shedding their pants and coats, can come into an artificial tropical wood, have bathrooms, dining room and hospital equipped with X-rays. Other animals are equally well cared for, and evidence their satisfaction by bearing young for the first time in captivity.

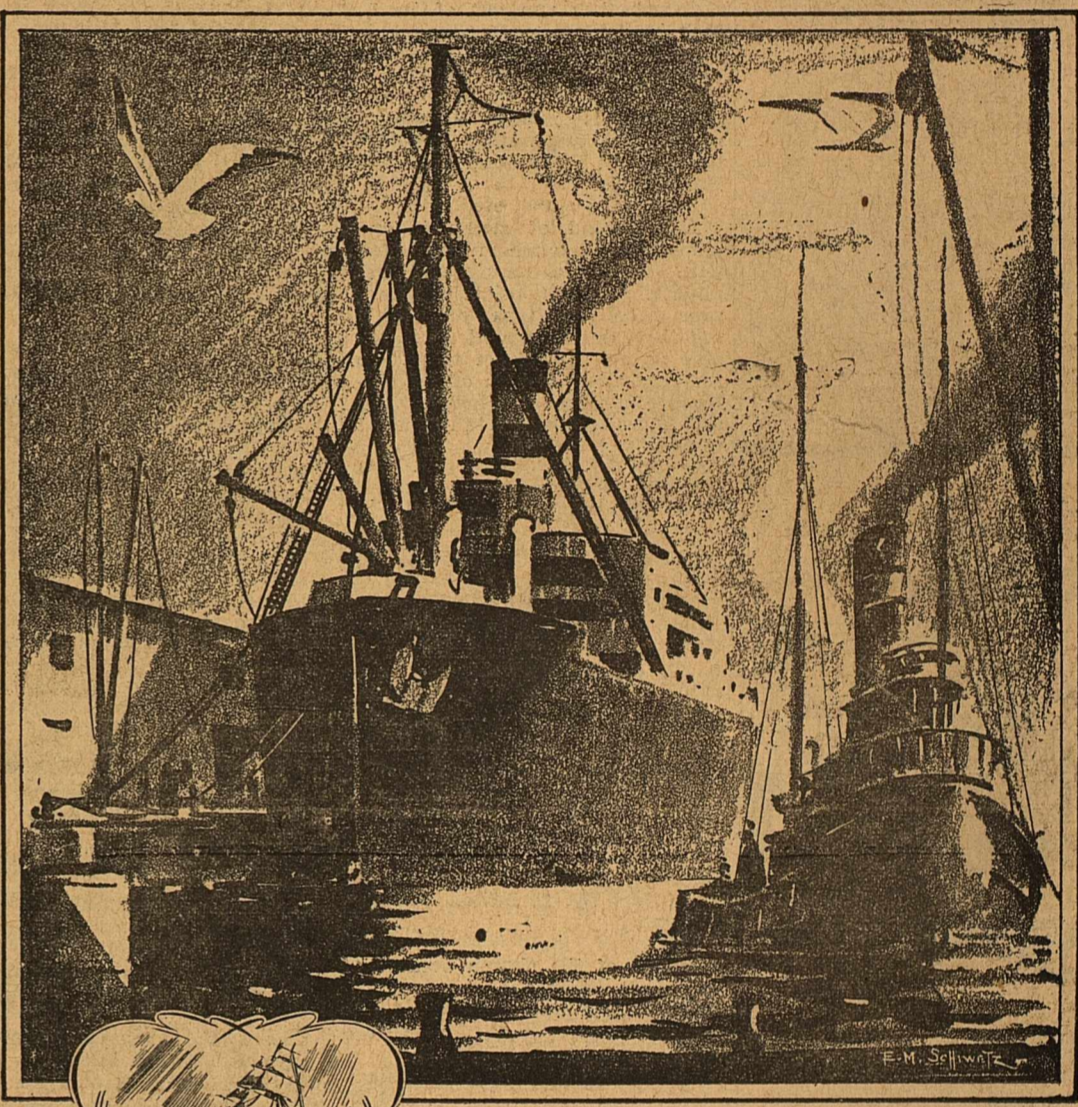
Perilous Razing Work Is Undertaken by Divers

a very fine corps of teachers and officers throughout. All of these are talented and consecrated leaders, and the work this year bids fair to be the greatest in the history of the church.

"Every since the arrival of Mr. Borum, he has stressed the scriptural plan of finance for church work, and he has led the church in a great way along this line. When he arrived five years ago, the church was around \$6,000 in debt. However, this amount was constantly reduced in

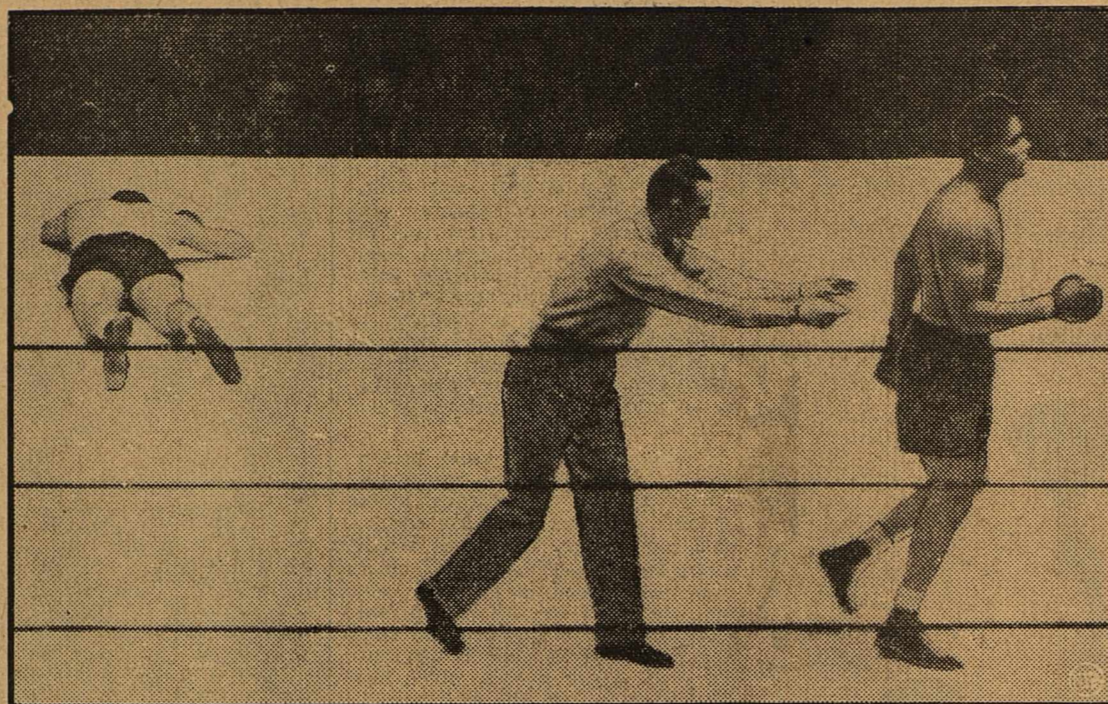
spite of the church operating on a larger budget, and about two years ago the final balance was completely paid off. Since that time the church has been running on a cash basis and constantly increasing in a fine way their gifts to worldwide Missions. In addition to these financial items, the church has acquired additional property to carry on larger work. They have bought two fine lots in Mexican town, with buildings adequate to house the Mission work there. This work has grown splendidly, there having been some fifteen additions the past year alone to this work. The Mission Sunday school is conducted every Sunday morning, with preaching by a Mexican preacher two Sundays each month.

"The church has also acquired a lot and a two story brick building, all fully paid for, which houses a part of the educational program of the church.

"About a year ago the church started a building fund, looking toward the remodeling of the present plant and building additional equipment. This fund now totals almost \$8,000, and steps are being taken at the present time to begin one unit of the building program. An architect has been employed and is now shaping up plans and specifications for the new program, which will total approximately \$30,000. This program calls for a complete remodeling of the present main building, and enlarging the present auditorium with a balcony, etc., to almost double the seating capacity. In addition to this, a number of class rooms will be added which will permit the rearranging of all classes and departments and allow room for expansion. It is hoped that bids will soon be in, the contract let, and the building program going forward immediately. With the substantial fund already on hand and from indications of the church membership, it is hoped that the church will be able to dedicate the new building free of debt at an early date."

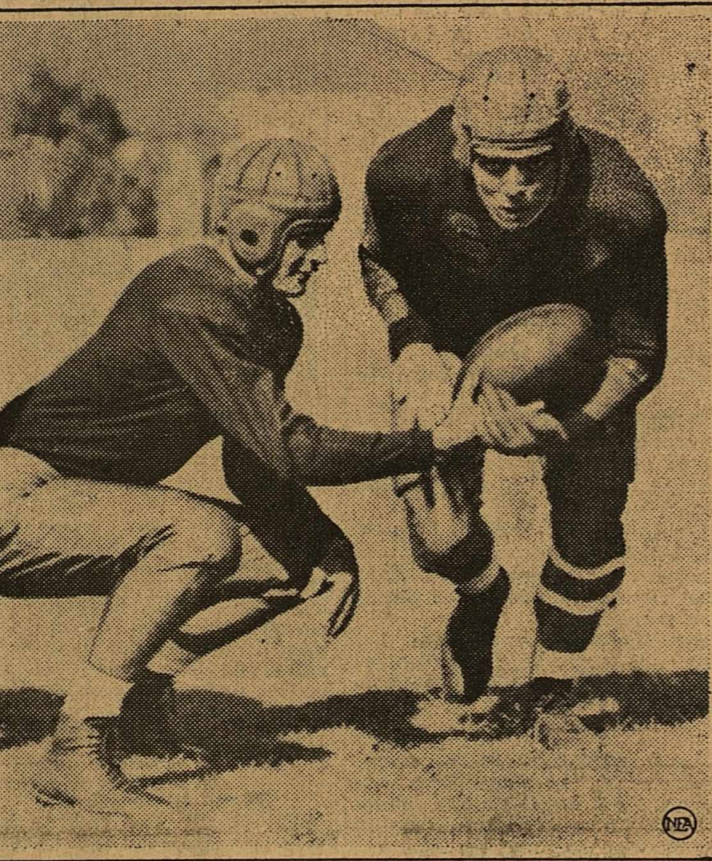

LUBBOCK, Oct. 13.—They're building the fires for big football smoke at Texas Tech on the night of October 25.

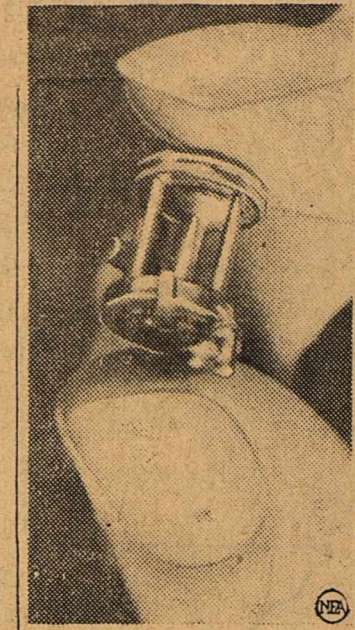
That is when the Gentlemen of Centenary pay their first visit here, and it is the one day of the year when alumni and ex-students gather on the campus.

Sterners Rules for All Motorists Due in Britain

WASHINGTON, (AP)— British officials, in an effort to promote safer driving in Great Britain, are preparing to crack down on the issuance of permits, the Commerce Department is advised by Trade Commissioner E. B. Lawson in London.

Under present regulations, Lawson reported, general licenses permit the operation of several types of motor vehicles—steam, gasoline or electric. The new regulations, if adopted, will limit issuance of future licenses to vehicles for which an applicant has qualified to drive, and the present type of license will no longer be obtainable.

Lawson reported that the new regulations are not expected to apply to persons possessing driving licenses at the time they are put into effect, but all applicants for new licenses will be required to conform to them.

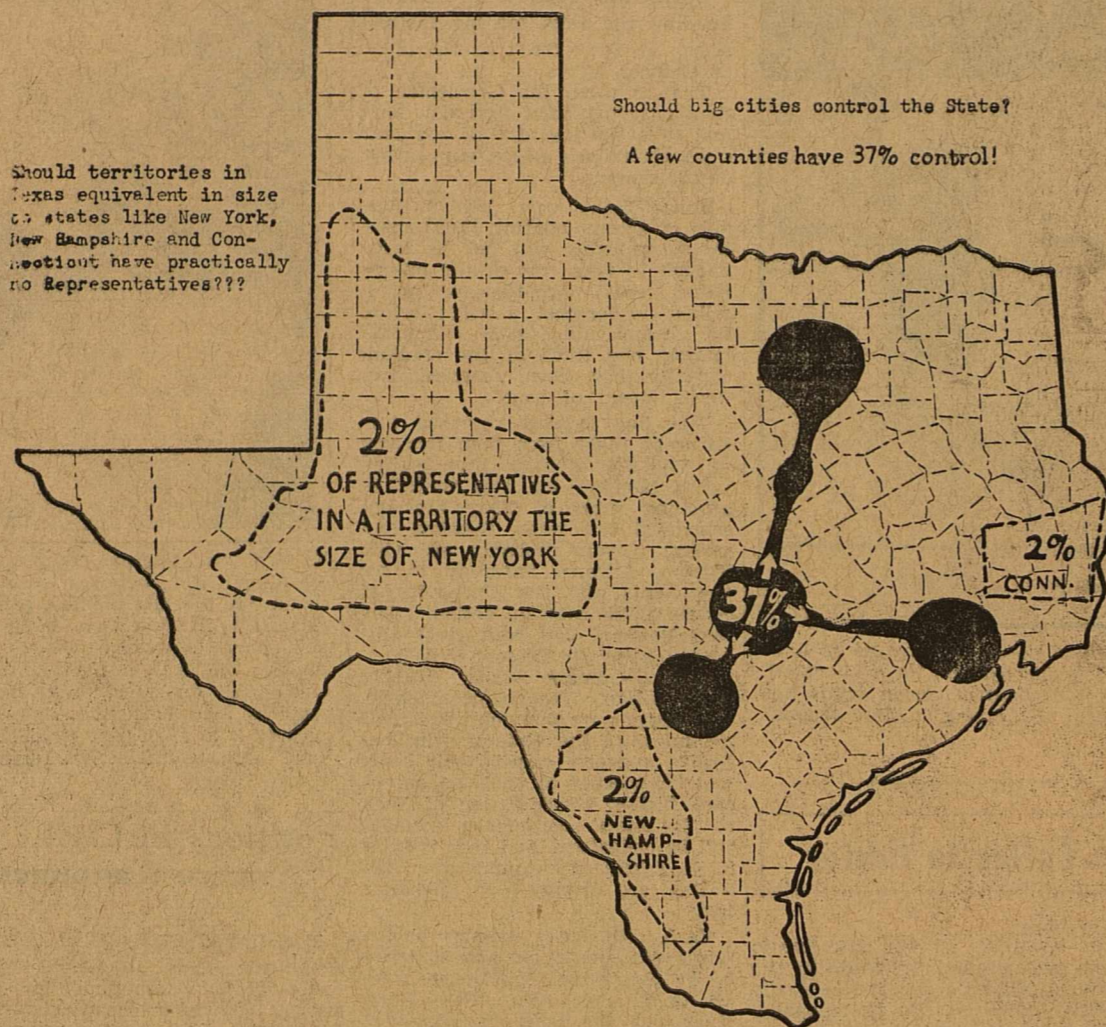

Texas Lawmakers Criticizes Redistricting System In The State As Being Unfair to Agriculture Area Residents

The Moffett Amendment (No. 6) will prevent undue centralization of power in a few of the very largest Counties of Texas. "Vote for amendment No. 6 in November"

AUSTIN, Oct. 13.—George Moffett member of the Texas legislature from Chillicothe, made these statements today: "Texas is the largest and most important agricultural state in the union, and this should be the most potent fact in the minds of legislators as they enact the laws under which the people of Texas live. "But the state's population trend is not toward the farm. It is away from it, moving into already populous centers. In the 1920-1930 decade the population increased 1,162,000 and almost exactly one-third of the increase occurred in the three most populous counties. By actual census figures 69 rural counties showed decreases in population between 1920 and 1930. Power farming probably accounted for most of the decrease. "If Texas were given legislative redistricting today under our present constitution, Dallas county would have ten members and Harris county (Houston) eleven. In 20 or 30 years more this would be doubled. "Unless our present constitution is amended, population will continue to be the only yardstick by which representatives in the legislature are allotted to the various counties, and the big cities will completely control the legislature."

Here is an example of how that works: Dallas county, with six members, has a representation exceeding the following 32 West Texas counties: Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Hall, Childress, Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, and Cottle. Another example: An area in West Texas reaching from Farwell down to Sanderson and from Balmorhea across to Paint Rock—an area as large as the state of New York—has only three members in the lower house, no greater than the representation allowed Beaumont and Port Arthur in one county. Jefferson. Moffett sounded this warning: "It was a stern and hard fight to get the legislature to submit this amendment. Opposition to submission, centering in the populous counties that profit most under the present law, was overcome with the

greatest difficulty. If the people vote against the amendment next month, I am afraid they will never get another opportunity to pass on the question, and that the state will be restricted under the present laws. And that would give two counties (Dallas and Harris) 14 per cent of the entire lower house membership."

Season for Colds Presents Problem

AUSTIN, Texas. — The common cold is an economic problem of considerable importance and more time is lost from work and school through colds and the illness to which they open the way than from any other single cause, according to observations of public health authorities. "As a means of preventing colds, grippe, influenza, or whatever you choose to call the ailment that is usually present at this season, keep yourself as fit as possible," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. "Get plenty of sleep. Don't overdo. Eat nourishing food at regular times, but do not overeat. Drink plenty of water and take some exercise out of doors every day.

"Colds are spread from person to person through the discharges from the nose and throat. Avoid droplet infection from the coughs and the sneezes. The germs which cause you to catch cold may enter your nose and throat passages from the air when the infected person talks, coughs, or sneezes. You may also catch cold by using an unwashed glass, spoon or fork, which has been used by someone with a cold. The germs may be on your hands because you have touched something which has been handled by the person with a cold. Wash your hands frequently, especially before eating.

"Dress according to the weather. Have a coat ready for the cool days and don't feel that you are coddling yourself when you put it on. Sleep with your windows open but have sufficient blankets available to be comfortable. Do not allow the temperature of your home or working place to exceed 70 degrees.

"The quickest way to get rid of a cold is to go to bed and stay there—following your physician's advice at the beginning of the attack. For the public, the surest prevention is for everyone who has a cold to go to bed and stay there until it is cured, to receive no visitors and to avoid all crowds, in order that one may not be guilty of transmitting a possible deadly infection."

King Edward Dooms Royal Fishing Temple

WINDSOR, England. (U.P.) — The royal fishing temple built by George IV at Virginia Water is being demolished by order of King Edward VIII.

George IV and William IV used the temple. Oriental in design, extensively. Since their reigns, however, the temple has served chiefly as a museum. The temple interrupted the view from the King's Fort Belvedere apartment overlooking Windsor Forest.

79,000 Needy Given Old Age Assistance

SAN ANTONIO. — Approximately 79,000 needy aged men and women in Texas benefited under the old-age assistance provisions of the Social Security Act during September. These figures were announced by Mr. H. F. Drought, State Director for the National Emergency Council for Texas, and are based upon a report of the Social Security Board, summarizing the progress made under the Act in the eight months since it became operative.

Texas has established a plan for aid to the needy aged which, with Federal aid, provides a regular income to aged individuals who are unable to provide for themselves. In September an estimated 79,000 persons received assistance under this plan at a total cost of \$1,240,000. Approximately one-half this cost was paid by the Social Security Board.

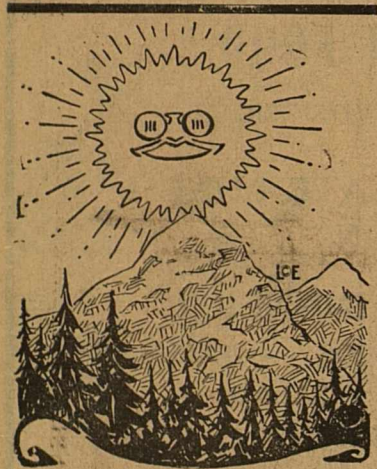
Since the State began cooperation with the Federal Government under the terms of the Social Security Act, a total of \$2,088,450 of Federal funds has come to Texas to aid it in financing its program for aid to the aged. Federal aid has made it possible for the State to provide much more adequately for its needy aged than would have been possible out of State and local funds alone.

Still further benefits are open to Texas under the Social Security Act. If the State enacts an unemployment compensation law in line with the Federal act it will be eligible to receive funds from the Social Security Board to pay all proper costs of administering this law, and eligible workers in Texas will receive protection against loss of income due to temporary periods of unemployment. Furthermore, if the State establishes plans for aid to the needy blind and aid to dependent children, which conform to the Federal act, it will be eligible to receive from the Social Security Board approximately one-half the cost of its aid to the blind and one-third the cost of its program for dependent children.

Mechanical Arm Halts Speeding Bandit Cars

LONDON. (U.P.) — A "mechanical arm," which enables police cars to stop automobiles driven by bandits, has been invented by Sir Malcolm Campbell.

The device, which has been demonstrated to Scotland Yard, consists of a telescopic steel arm with strong claws a foot wide. On making contact with the rear bumpers of a car the claw becomes firmly locked and the pursued car is brought to a standstill.

Amendment No. 6 Moffett's statement was made in support of one of six proposed constitutional amendments upon which the people of Texas will vote on Tuesday, November 3. It is Amendment No. 6 providing for equalization of legislative representation on a basis of geography as well as population in laying out districts. As chairman of the legislative committee on constitutional amendments Moffett was the author of Amendment No. 6. He is for all the amendments, but believes this one is by far the most useful "to keep the government in the hands of all the people and not the few who have moved to the cities and whose interests are more industrial than agricultural." Moffett said further: "Thirty states take geography as well as population into consideration in laying out legislative districts—why should not Texas? In Oklahoma the limit for a county is seven members; in Georgia and Florida, three members; in Iowa, two members; and other states that are predominantly agricultural have similar restrictions based on geographic and territorial considerations. "Our forefathers wrote it into the federal constitution that the president and vice president of the United States should not come from the same state. The opposed concentration of powers—and Amendment No. 6 proposes to do the same thing in Texas. "The United States supreme court in 1932 held in a clear-cut decision that congressional districts need not even be approximately equal in population. County commissioners precincts, city commissioners precincts, judicial districts, school districts and many other subdivisions created for legislative purposes, are not laid out on a population only basis, but usually with an eye to giving each section or community fair representation. Geographic and territorial considerations play an important part in shaping the aforementioned districts, and should likewise be considered in laying out representative districts instead of using population alone. "What Amendment Proposes Amendment No. 6—last on the November ballot—was passed for submission by the 44th legislature. It provides that no county may have more than seven members in the lower house, and if adopted, a redistricting under any law—present or future—would have to conform to it. "Since the total membership of the house is fixed in the constitution at 150," said Moffett, "it certainly is proper and fair that no one county out of the 254 counties in Texas should have a disproportionate representation, and a maximum of seven should be enough. In a state as large as Texas it would never
