## LOBBYISTS CITED

Charged With Trying To Force Passage Of Measure

AUSTIN. Oct. 23. (AP)- Fresh protests against deliberalization of the old age assistance law broke in the legislature today, Representative Hollis Frazer, Franklin, walking out of a meeting of the free conference committee considering the compromise measure, and Representative Leonard Westfall, Aspermont, charging the lobbyists of "great corporate interests" were behind a move to "force the House to swallow deliberalization.

The committee resumed executive session after a long meeting last night working on various sections of the omnibus tax bill to which the deliberalization proposition was attached in the form of an amendment by the senate.

The Senate adopted a free conference report on a bill to provide Texas participation in benefits of the federal unemployment insurance program.

The vote of 23 to 6 was sufficient to put the law into immediate effect if it receives 100 votes in the House which postponed action until Monday.

## START GAME AT 8

Record Attendance Forecast For Struggle

What will probably be the most spectacular and interesting foot-ball game from a spectator's point of the year for Midland fans will take place tonight when the Mid-land Bulldogs meet their arch-rivals. the Wink Wildcats, on Lackey field at 8 p. m.

Both clubs have enviable records one tie marring an otherwise perfect season for the Bulldogs and one defeat being the only mark on the Wink escutheon. Each club has played five games to date, two each of them conference affairs.

A street parade, consisting of both Midland and Wink pep squads and bands, will be held in the city this afternoon at 5:15. Approximately 300 students of the two schools will leave the high school building and parade through the business section as a prelude to the championship game. The game will start at eight o'clock.


