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BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 23.—Indiana, where politics is a profession for many and a hobby for all, may give its 14 electoral votes to Landon. But it is practically impossible to find any astute, well-in-

formed person in Indianapolis who will make that prediction.

A big reason for almost general anticipation of a Roosevelt victory is the expected repudiation by 50,000 or more Negro voters of a Republican leadership which a few years ago made open alliance with the Ku Klux Klan.

Indiana has long been a bordering state and its election is bound to be close in any doubtful year. The Hoosier state went for Roosevelt by 185,000 in 1932.

The Negro vote always has been the chief basis of what came to be considered more or less normal Republican majorities in Indianapolis. This year most of the colored voters are getting ready to vote for Roosevelt and the state G. O. P. is engaged in a desperate but apparently vain effort to wean them back.

One reason Indiana may still be classed as doubtful is found in the fact that you never know just how dirty its campaign will be until

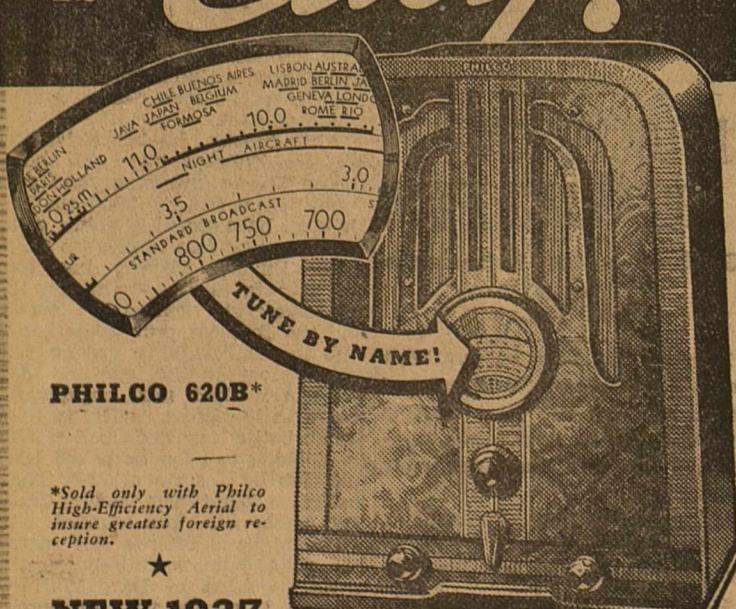

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it's all over. Gov. Paul McNutt's Democratic machine is openly assessing state jobholders for campaign funds and Republican whispering campaign seem a bit weirder than in other states.

Lines Sharply Drawn
But the essentials of the situation are obvious. Insofar as the presidential contest goes, an Old Guard Republican machine is opposing a pro-Roosevelt mass movement which draws its strength from the sensing and feeling of the poor.

The Republicans find anti-New Deal sentiment strong among farmers, business men, and many conservative Democrats. But Roosevelt is proving to have a solid bulwark of strength among laboring men in the industrial cents, among those on relief—and among the Negroes.

That's why veteran political writers who have toured the state are predicting a victory for Roosevelt by 50,000 or more, but not necessarily for the Democratic state ticket.

Ex-Senator Jim Watson, despite mistaken reports from your correspondent and others in the past, is still the most powerful Republican in Indiana. A sort of "young guard," which has rallied around Watson, has at least nominal control of the party.

"Knifing" Rumors Heard
Watson isn't fond of Landon. The Landonites weren't very respectful to him at the Cleveland convention. Reports that Landon is being traded down the river for support of the G. O. P. candidate for governor cannot be confirmed, although there's more Republican effort in the gubernatorial fight than the presidential contest.

The old hard-hitting Republican machine has disintegrated considerably under Democratic rule. But a large army of enthusiastic volunteers, led by professionals who have been away from the feebish six years, has been extremely active.

They find that the "waste and extravagance" issue is the most potent one against Roosevelt, especially in rural areas.

G. O. P. reports from steel and other industrial center, such as Gary, South Bend, Terre Haute, Evansville, Fort Wayne, and Indianapolis, are not especially encouraging.

Springer Fights Hard
Raymond Springer, first state commander of the American Legion, is the Republican candidate for governor. Tireless campaigner and handshaker, he says he can end McNutt's unpopular "gross income" tax by economies and elimination of alleged beer graft.

His opponent, handpicked by McNutt, is Lieut.-Gov. M. Clifford Townsend, a Grant County farmer experienced in politics.

The "gross income" tax taps practically everyone who receives money for services or goods and amounts to a disguised sales tax, which hits the consumer first as an earner, then as a buyer. The proceeds of about \$16,000,000 a year go for education. Small merchants are making a

terrific fight against it. The McNutt-Townsend group insists Springer's election would mean a general sales tax.

McNutt Is Issue Himself
Platinum-haired McNutt is a big issue all by himself. He admits that a star of destiny is leading him toward the White House as a 1940 candidate. A leader, a fighter, an astute politician, a brilliant orator, and dictatorial boss over a ruthless political machine, he has built up a nation-wide network of contacts as governor, as one-time national commander of the American Legion, and former dean of the Indiana University School of Law.

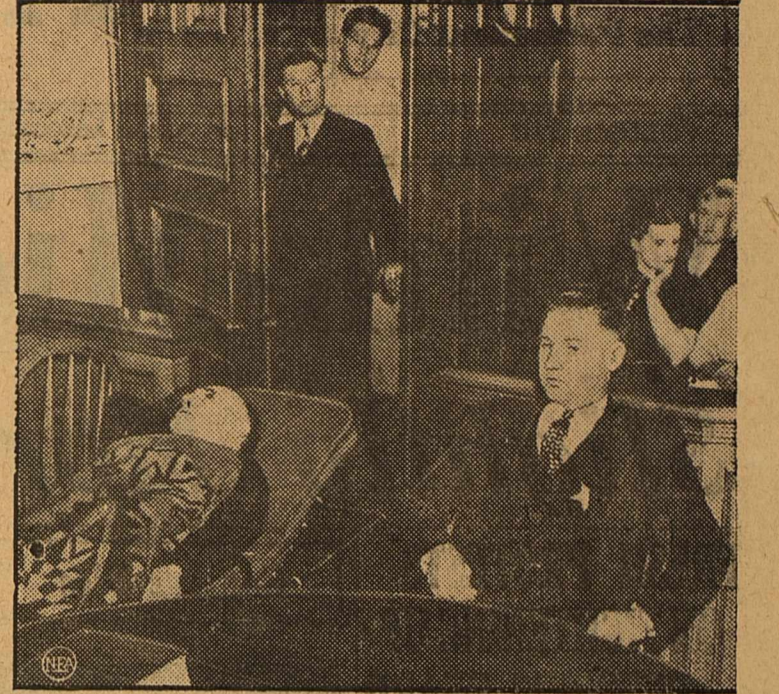

Angle for Veteran Vote

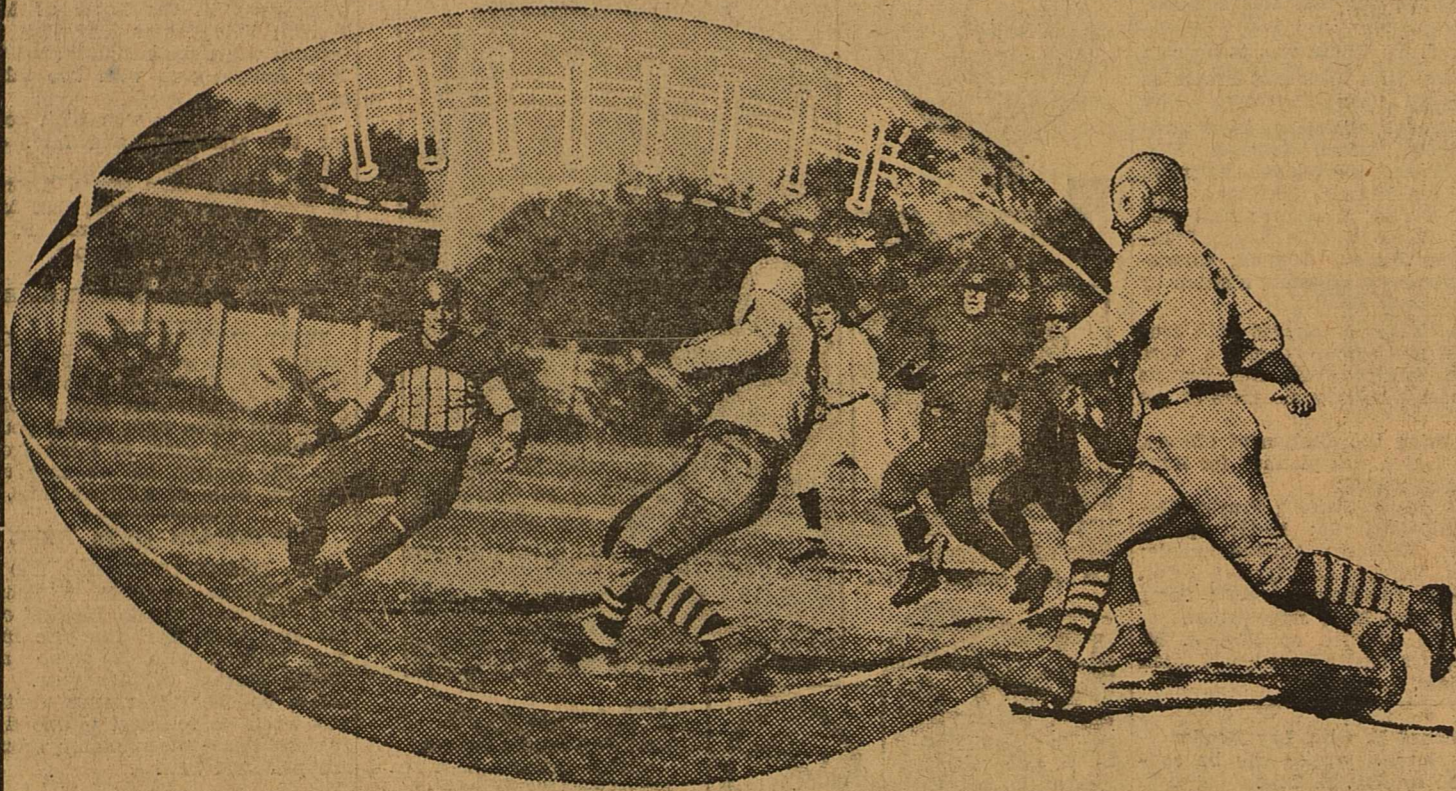

All the All-Americans Are Not In the Big Colleges

Many a backfield man and line stalwart, like the rose in Gray's Elegy, "is born to blush unseen and waste its sweetness on the desert air."

The desert, in this case the smaller conferences, produces gridiron greats on a par with those of such major loops as the Big Ten, Southern, Southwestern, Pacific Coast, and the other recognized big wheels. But due to lack of high-powered press agents, feats of these youngsters seldom hit the sports pages unless their teams happen to score upsets over larger institutions.

With those upsets occurring every week this season, All-American pickers are finding the task of selecting their annual teams more difficult than ever.

Baldwin-Wallace's 19-7 victory over Syracuse University's vaunted Orange brought to light a running, passing phenom in Norman Schoen, a brilliant Berea, O., back, who put that school of only 600 students on the map by passing coach Vic Hanson's team dizzy in the first five minutes of the game.

Schoen, a bespectacled individual of the gridiron, is an amateur baseball star of major league promise, and his pitching of the pigskin is no less accurate than his fast one over the heart of the plate.

Ever Hear Of Henry Hammond?

Gordon Williams, sports editor of the Reading, Pa., Times, tells us that Coach Clarence Munn, of Albright, former Minnesota star, has in Dick Riffle, the best football player of the small schools in the east. Dick received honorable All-American mention last year as a sophomore.

"Truthful," says Williams, "he is a great ball carrier, and one of the outstanding backs in the country. He also kicks and passes, and Coach Munn says he is a fine defensive player."

Southwestern University, 12; Vanderbilt, 0! A great grid surprise for everybody but Ray Morrison, Vandy coach.

The night before his Commodores were scheduled to meet the Memphis school, Morrison received a phone

call from an unknown Southwestern supporter.

"An All-American end will be playing for Southwestern here tomorrow," the voice said. "You'll never see a better wingman. His name is Henry Hammond."

And after the upset Morrison called Hammond, who barks signals and played a bangup game for Coach Shorty Propst's team, the best end he ever saw step on a field.

Although Washington University of St. Louis didn't beat Notre Dame the Bears threw quite a scare into the Irish, and showed Elmer Layden a fullback in "Buckin' Joe" Bukant who reminded him of Joe Savoldi.

Joe, called by Jimmy Conzelman the hardest hitting plunger in the country, kicks and passes, too. He not only scored the Bears' touchdown against the Irish, but also registered a counter against Illinois.

Unless you live in the Rocky Mountain district, you probably never have heard of Alex Drobnitch. Yet coaches rate that University of Denver lad as one of the best guards of the country, and worthy of All-American consideration.

Texas Tech, of Lubbock, has in Jim Neill, sparkling back, a ball player who is deserving of national honors, according to his coach, Pete Cawthon. Neill, his mentor states, showed up Sammy Baugh, Texas Christian's great passer, badly in the upset the Matadors scored over the Horned Frogs early in the season.

Spears Has Squad Of 23 — And A Star!

Ray Zeh, nation's leading scorer from Western Reserve, Cleveland, last year, is back again, going better than ever. A youngster who can pack and pass a pigskin as he can deserve a great deal of commendation.

Jack Foley, one of Tom Lieb's two returning veterans to this season's Loyola of Los Angeles team, is a great ball player, and one wonders what he could do behind a line of Pitt's calibre, and a few backfield mates with more experience.

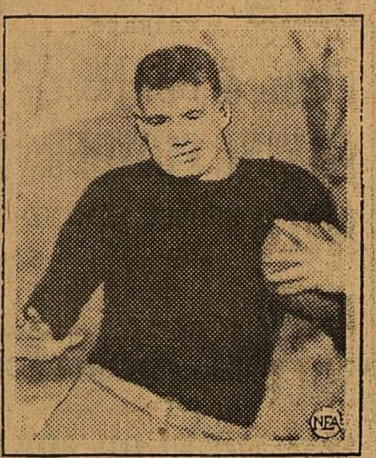
The veteran Dr. Clarence (Fat) Spears, with 23 men on his small squad at the University of Toledo, showed the effete east a major lea-

CENTER OF EVOLUTION WAR



THE controversy between fundamentalists and evolutionists places at its focus the simple discoveries of an English naturalist and explorer—Charles Robert Darwin. Whatever the discussion however, Darwin is the innocent victim, for his work stressed not so much the theory that man and monkey came from similar stock but the belief that species evolve by a process of natural selection and that the struggle for existence favored the strong.

Darwin was born Feb. 12, 1809, the same day on which Abraham Lincoln was born. In 1831 he joined a surveying expedition to the South Seas. In the next five years his explorations and discoveries among the islands of the Pacific led him to formulate his theories on evolution. He finished his work in 1859, and died in 1882.

Recalling Darwin's visit to the Galapagos Islands 100 years ago, Ecuador in 1935 issued a set of stamps commemorating the event. The stamp portraying Darwin is shown here.

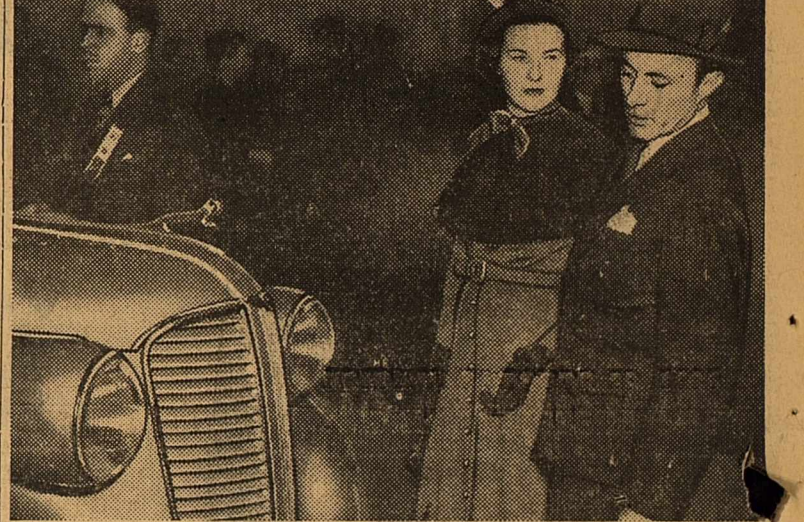
MORE SCRAP IRON TO JAPAN

Landon Continues To Lead Roosevelt In Straw Vote Poll

Landon leads Roosevelt nearly 11 to 8 in the semi-final returns of The Literary Digest's nation-wide poll even though the President cuts into the Kansas Governor's plurality for the seventh consecutive time due to the addition of approximately 125,000 poll ballots from metropolitan centers out of a total increase of 345,000 votes since last week's report.

Landon has a poll majority or plurality in thirty-two states while Roosevelt is shown carrying sixteen. In the Electoral College these states would divide 370 votes for Governor Landon to 161 for President Roosevelt.

A total of 2,158,739 votes is reported in the current poll tally. The Republican candidate gets, 1,181,307 votes to the Democrat's 878,526 and the Union candidate's total of 75,119. The balance of 22,787 votes or slightly over 1 per cent, is divided among the four minor candidates.
