Authorization for 58 WPA Projects Are Released for State During The Last Week

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 21—Authorizations for 58 projects, involving sponsors' expenditures of \$298,739 and WPA contributions of \$743,622 were released from the state Works Progress Administration office during the past week, it was announced today by H. P. Drought, state administrator. "It is expected that these new projects will absorb workers who are released from completed projects and those who are returning to WPA rolls as seasonal agricultural work ends in various parts of the state," Drought said. "It is estimated that the 58 projects authorized during the past week will employ 3,876 persons." State WPA officials said that more projects will be authorized when needed to care for those persons being released from completed

contribution of \$17,670. Cottle county is sponsoring construction and improvements at Salt Creek and Hackberry schools. Projects were approved to extend the University of Texas geological survey to include Shackelford, Williamson, Bastrop, and Roberts counties. Hygiene projects were approved in Longview, Carthage, and Lampasas, and library projects were authorized in Austin, Houston county, and on a countywide scale in Titus county. San Francisco Loses Its Oldest Livery Stable SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22 (U.P.)—The oldest of San Francisco's livery stables has passed out of existence, to be succeeded by its logical successor—a garage. The Kelly Livery Stables, as they were known, were founded in 1859 and had a continuous existence down until the day when they had to give way to the automobile. The founder, Thomas Kelly, landed in San Francisco in 1854, having sailed around the Horn in a clipper ship. It was five years later that he opened the stables. They played a picturesque part in the early days of California, when swank turnouts, with hatted coachmen and hieftoppers were the sights that could be rolled in from the mines, the gambling tables, or even business. In 1906, the son of Kelly took over the stables and continued the business. However, he was quick to

sense the incoming power of the auto, and was one of the first livery stable proprietors on the coast to equip his stables in such a manner that a customer could have his choice between Old Dobbin or a motor car. 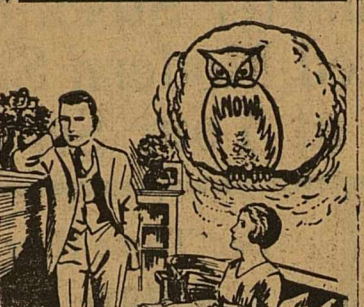
EAR HAS 1,188 KERNELS

Census Shows Apparel Sales Increase Most In Country Over 12-Month Period

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24 (U.P.)—Retail sales in the United States for 1935 increased 31 per cent over 1934, according to the preliminary report of the Federal Census of Business.

"Sales are still nearly one-third lower in dollar volume than during 1929, but a substantial part of the difference is caused by the increase in price levels in the two years," the report said.

Montana led the nation with an increase of 68 per cent over the two-year period. Maryland fared poorest, with an upturn of 17 per cent, but officials explained that returns from that state still were incomplete.

Family clothing stores throughout the nation benefited most from freer spending, with sales increasing 94 per cent. Sale of radio dealers decreased 51 per cent to set the low mark, but radio stores also dealing in household appliances registered an increase of 90 per cent.

Tobacco Slump Noted
Sales of new and used vehicle dealers increased 82 per cent, but garages did 29 per cent less business. The only other decrease of 4 per cent was shown by cigar stores and stands.

"There was a pronounced decrease between 1929 and 1933 in sales of apparel, furniture, hardware, building materials, farmers' supplies and motor vehicles, and there has been a marked increase since 1933," the report stated.

Total retail sales last year for the 1,649,081 stores, reporting amounted to \$32,790,267,000. The report cautioned, however, that the preliminary figures do not contain full returns from five states where the field canvass is incomplete, nor scattered returns from other states received after reports were filed.

Incomplete New York returns amounted to \$4,579,000,000, the highest state total, an increase of 22 per cent over 1933. Pennsylvania with \$2,497,000,000 and an increase of 33 per cent, was second. Incomplete returns from Illinois placed that state third with \$2,077,000,000, at 21 per cent increase.

Mountain States Lead
The Mountain states showed an upturn of 47 per cent over the previous census, greater than any section of the nation. Four states in that region—Montana, Idaho, New Mexico and Arizona—were the only units to register increases more than 50 per cent. The Middle Atlantic states, with a 25 per cent increase, fared the poorest of any section.

Retail store employees numbered 3,899,000, or 14 per cent more than in 1933, and they received pay checks totaling \$3,568,000,000, or 23 per cent more than they received two years ago. There also was a substantial increase in the number of full-time workers. The number of stores increased 8 per cent.

"The current census has been affected by incomplete coverage, because of inability to obtain schedules from a small number of concerns," the report said. "This shortage is largely due to the absence of the legislation which during regular census years makes reporting mandatory."

The Census of Business is conducted under the supervision of Fred A. Gosnell, chief statistician of the census bureau, from headquarters set up here.

The preliminary report contains retail distribution table for all states and for cities of more than 500,000 population. Further reports, broken down into smaller units, will be released within several months, the bureau announced.

LANDON CARRIES HIS CAMPAIGN TO INDIANA VOTERS
Roosevelt Prepares For Last Week Of The Race

Governor Landon sped into Indiana Saturday while President Roosevelt, after declaring aims at strengthening foundations of "lasting democracy," prepared for next week's final presidential drive.

Going to Indianapolis to make a bid "we want a government concerned about the economic rights and opportunities of the average man."

"The administration is desperately worried," he told a cheering crowd that filled the 7,500 capacity Oklahoma City Coliseum. "It knows it will not be re-elected if it depends on voluntary support so it has turned to coercion."

As a candidate, he said, President Roosevelt looked in one direction; as President he looks in another.

He was welcomed to Oklahoma and introduced by former Democratic Gov. Williams H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray.
