The SPORTS HORN

A lot of Midland people will be journeying over to Odessa tomorrow afternoon to see the Odessa Bronchos and the Pecos Eagles get together in a football game that will probably be as tough as any in the district this year.

By virtue of their recent showing the Bronchos should be a slight favorite to cop, but there will be plenty that will argue or wager otherwise.

The Eagles have shown improvement with each game played this year and a lot of supporters of the club claim that it is only rounding into its peak form. Little Joe Bob Kelton, spark plug of the team, has been out most of the season because of injuries and that has severely handicapped the team. Kelton is almost as valuable to the Eagles as Wafford is to the Bulldogs. In fact, he is the difference between a good team and a mediocre one.

The Eagles managed to beat Monahans only one touchdown while the Bronchos hung up a two touch-down win over the same club but the Ward county boys were admittedly "pointed" for the Pecos match. Had they won it they might still be unbeaten. But the Lobos lost something in that game they have never recovered—their spirit. They were not the same kind of boys in their game against Odessa or Wink that they were against Pecos. For that reason there is a lot of doubt that Odessa really has a better club than Pecos.

Midland supporters are hoping for an Odessa victory in the belief the Bulldogs can take the Bronchos if it narrows down to the Thanks-giving game here as to which will be champion.

The way the district standings are now things can get in one large middle before the season is over. Should Odessa win the game against Pecos they will be tied up with Wink for second place in the district. And then should they beat Midland and Wink beat Pecos the three

teams, Midland, Wink and Odessa will be tied up for the lead when the season ends. (Just in case Midland beats Monahans.)

What a district committee would do in a case like that remains to be seen. They might order the clubs to play off the tie and again they might designate a winner. And Midland has already got one decision from the committee this year. And plenty of people think they "put something over" on the boys when they did it.

Regardless of how Odessa and Pecos come out it is up to Midland to win their remaining games to be a cinch for the district title. Because it is almost a certainty that Wink will take the Eagles when they play Turkey Day. Pecos wins over Wink just about as often as A. & M. beats TCU.

The Odessa crew has used a varied number of formations this year, never coming up two weeks in succession with the same kind of attack. One week they will run only line plays from a formation and the next week they will use only passes from that formation. As a result, they have had scouts pulling their hair.

The Bronch backfield is directed by Thomas, a lad that Odessa supporters claim is the best all-around back in the district. Records bear out the statements that he is one of the best passers in this area. Most of the Odessa points have been rolled up by passes from Thomas to Acker, elongated end who got his preliminary football studies in Midland.

The Eagle offensive is built around Kelton and Oglesby. Team members that have played against both Oglesby and Wafford say that Wafford does not hit one ounce harder than does the Pecos lad. But he does not have the speed and shiftness of the local boy. However, very few clubs have made successful goal line stands against the Eagles if Oglesby got a chance to crack their line.

Regardless of which club wins tomorrow the game should be the best of the season in Odessa.

History Aided by Minnesota Fossil Finds

MINNEAPOLIS, (U.P.)—Dr. A. E. Jenks, University of Minnesota anthropologist, chapter by chapter is turning back the history of man, with the mounds of northern Minnesota his most fertile source of information.

With a great mass of data, collected in operations in the northern part of the state, Jenks returned to the university to begin to integrate his findings.

The professor, aided by students and WPA workers, spent the summer digging near Red Lake Falls, Bronson, Malmo and Brown's Valley. At the latter place in 1930 he found bones out of which he constructed the Brown's Valley man, whose age was estimated at 8,000 years, and in the same area a few years ago he found "Miss Minnesota," who, it is believed was a belle 20,000 years ago.

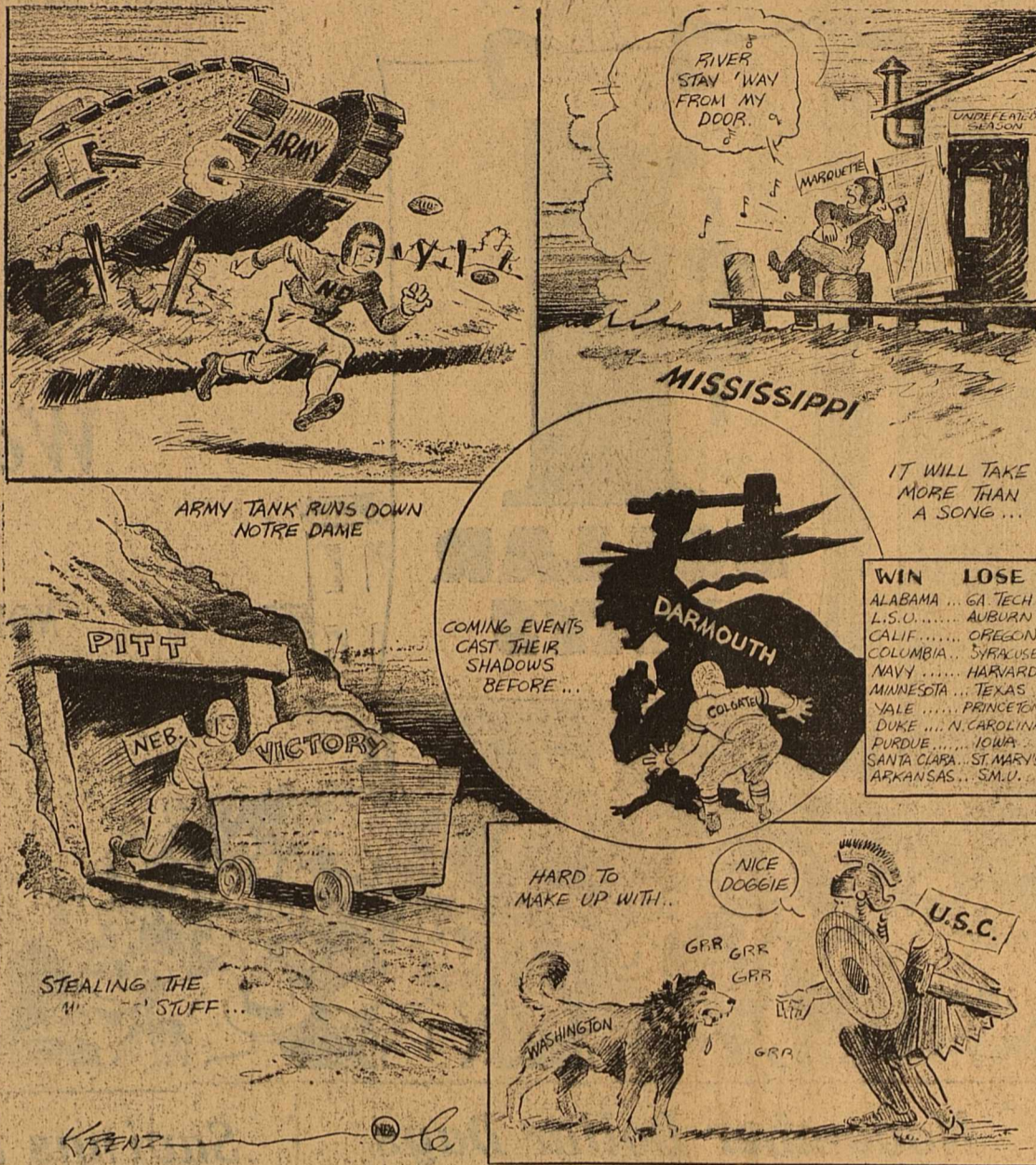

In the gravel deposits at the lake shore have been found implements which the "early settlers" used in their homemaking.

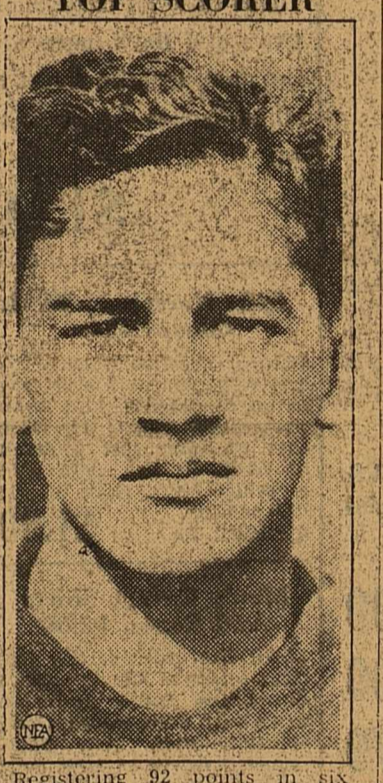

RA Loans Repaid at Rate of \$25,000 Per Day In The County

AMARILLO.— The Rural Rehabilitation Division of the Resettlement Administration is receiving collections of approximately \$25,000 per day on the five and one-half million dollars loaned this year to farmers, it was announced by R. I. Kimmel, chief of the Division. Over twelve thousand farmers were given help in the five state area in Region 12, comprising New Mexico, and parts of Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and Texas.

Mr. Kimmel estimates that 75 per cent of these borrowers will make final repayment of the indebtedness due this year. About one-fifth of them will have repaid their loan in full within the next two months. It is believed that they have re-established themselves financially to a degree where any future financial requirements can be met by private lending agencies. Reports from several counties indicate that collections to date are from 40 to 50 percent of the total loans in the counties, whereas the harvest season is only about 45 per cent completed.

These loans are made to farmers to enable them to buy implements, work stock, milk cows, hogs, poultry, food, clothing, seed and other subsistence supplies. Many of the loans were made to men who had been engaged in farming all their lives but who were practically destitute when the loan was made due to circumstances over which they had no control. Many farmers had to buy a complete farm unit setup because everything they had owned had been lost in the depression. Without the particular kind of which was furnished by the Resettlement Administration, many of these farmers today would have
