



FAMOUS OLD FRUIT CAKE

1 lb. pecans or walnuts

lb. candied pineapple

1 lb. flour

1-4 teaspoon allspice

Wash and dry currants. Cut grape fruit peel or citron and pineapple in 1-2 in cubes, leaving the herries and nuts while. Cream butter and sugar and beaten egg yolks Mix flour and fruit juices alter-nately. Add fruits, nuts (dredged in small amount of flour). thoroughly and place in baking pans (use 1 lb. coffee cans with lids if they fit tightly) which have been lined with butter paper which has been oiled. Cover the top of the pan (if you don't use the lids) with heavy brown paper which has been oiled on both sides. Tie the paper securely around the edges of the pans to prevent water getting into the cake. Place pans into the cooker, and pour (or already have) hot water in the cooker half way up the pans. Place top on the cooker but do not fasten the clamps or petcock. Keep at boiling point 55 minutes. After that clamp lid securely and close petcock. Raise the pressure to 15 and leave 15 minutes. This insures cooking of cake to center of pans. Release pressure slowly, remove from cooker. Take off lids or paper cover and place pans in slow even for 15 minutes to dry out the crust. This recipe makes

I usually add 1-2 lb. butter nuts and 1-4 lb. orange peel and 1-4 lb. lemon peel. Leave butter nuts whole. Save some of the cherries and nuts to decorate top of cake just before placing in the oven.

The City Council has ordered the service of delinquent water customers discontinued unless their accounts are paid immediately.



Statements are being mailed to delinguent customers calling for payment by the 18th of this month and it is hoped that it will not be necessary to discontinue any one's service.


