# **DELAY FIGHTING**

Fascist Attack On Outskirts Is Expected

MADRID. Dec. 8. (P)- Government artillery raked insurgent lines with heavy fire today as bitter cold delayed the expected fascist assaults around the capital's outskirts

Twenty-one persons were reported killed during an insurgent aerial attack on Guadalajara, provincial capital north of Madrid.

A fascist attack is expected to be moved against the University City barricades.

Fighting around Guadalajara, northeast of Madrid, indicated the insurgents were seeking to smash their way into the city from that region also. Twenty-three Fascist planes bombed the area around Guadalajara.

The ministry of state disclosed, meanwhile, that the government had asked immediate withdrawal of the Finnish charge d'affaires in Madrid because of "scandalous abuse of diplomatic privilege."

The government in a message to the Helsingfors administration, asserted the Finnish official threw hand grenades from the windows of his legation at government troops between Dec. 1 and Dec. 3, stored arms and ammunition in the build-ing, and harbored Fascists who were not "entitled to diplomatic refuge.

# **BELIEVE MONARCH** HAS ARRIVED AT FINAL DECISION

Renunciation of His American Friend Expected

### PUBLIC HOPEFUL

News to be Withheld Until House Hears His Answer

LONDON, Dec. 8 (AP)-Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin reached Fort Belevedere tonight-summoned by King Edward-presumably to receive a final decision by Edward on his renunciation to either the throne or Wallis Simpson.

It was generally believed that the decision, even if given tonight, will be withheld from the public until Bald-win has an opportunity to communicate it to the House

of Commons. If the answer is abdication the King might give a tip-off by quick flight from the country.

The Duke of Kent, the King's youngest brother, is believed to have been on hand to participate in the

In view of Mrs. Simpson's statement that she is willing to sacifice the King rather than hurt the soveriegn or throne, the British public is hopeful the monarch has decided the crown is to come first.

LEIPZIG. (U.P.) — The history of important national conventions altrade has been traced back for many centuries by the translation of ancient Babylonian records. Hieroglyphics of the brick books of Babylon reveal the fact that as early as 3880 B. C. in the reign of Sargon in Sumeria fairs and bazaars were held to encourage trade. A thousand years later laws for the proper conduct of such fairs, known as the code of Khammurahi were announced by the Babylonian em-

peror of that name. In China, the Emperor Fu-Hi issued orders regarding the conduct of fairs as early as 2852 B. C. Later came he Greek festival fair at Delos with its familiar Olympic games History was repeated this year when crowds attended the Olympics and remained to visit the Leipzig fair as they did in Greec 3,000 years ago.
