DUKE OF YORK

LONDON, Dec. 10 (AP)—King Edward VIII, ruler of England and its far flung dominion, abdicated his throne today, and will marry Wallis Warfield Simpson as a man, not as a monarch.

Albert Frederick Arthur George, 40-year-old Duke of York, will rule over the 495,000,000 subjects of the greatest empire on earth as George VI. In a "message from his majesty signed by his own hand," Captain Edward Algernon Fitzroy, speaker of

the House of Commons, announced the abdication. The statement said "after long, anxious consideration I have determined to renounce the throne to which I succeeded on the death of my father, and am now commun-

icating this, my final and irrevocable decision.' Edward asked "understanding of my peoples," stating the burden resting on the soverign's shoulders was so heavy it "can only be borne in circumstances different from those in which I now find myself."

Other statements included: "I, Edward VIII, of Great Britain, Ireland, British dominions beyond the seas, King and Emperor of India, hereby declare my irrecovable determination to renounce the throne for myself and for my descendants and my desire to that effect should be given this instrument of abdication immediately

"In token whereof I have hereunto set my hand this tenth day of December, 1936, in the presence of witnesses whose signatures are subscribed.

"I deeply appreciate the spirit that has actuated appeals which have been made to me to take a different decision and have before reaching a final determination most fully pondered over them.

"But my mind is made up. Moreover, further delay can not but be most injurous to the peoples whom I have





The increasingly important problem of the farm tenant, and what can be done to give this lowincome worker a more desirable status with a brighter future, thus raising the level of American citizenship, is of prime importance today; especially so since the Resettlement Administration is planning to attack the problem with a series of demonstration projects in ten Southern states, where more than one thousand farm families will be given an opportunity to purchase homes and farms for themselves and become self-supporting. Congressional legislators forecast that the approaching session of Congress will be asked to pass a bill seeking to end farm tenantry, and Senator Tom Connally of Texas, characterizes this work as the most important which will come before the ses-

Farm tenantry has been steadily increasing throughout the nation since 1880. In Texas the percentage has increased from 37 to 57 per cent in the fifty-five year period. and this average is considerably higher in the southern part of the state where 70 per cent of the choice cotton acreage is tenant farmed. The problem is particulary acute in the southern states where 54 per cent of the farming is done by tenants, and only slightly less acute in the other major divisions of the nation-32 percent in the in the Western states.
