HAVANA, Dec. 22. (P)—Cuba's senate constituted itself in a court today for the trial of President Gomez on impeachment charges following his veto of the sugar tax bill providing funds for army-taught rural schools.

HUNT FOR MISSING PLANE IS 'CLOSED' DOWN BY OFFICERS

Hope Is Abandoned For Lives of 7 On Ship

SPOKANE, Dec. 22. (P)—Rescue parties pushed toward the wreckage of the Northwest Airlines plane believed to contain the bodies of pilot Joe Livermore and co-pilot Arthur Haid in mountainous Idaho today.

No trace has been found of the lost Western Air Express transport, lost with seven occupants in Utah.

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 22. (P)—Search for an airliner, lost with seven persons was "closed down" indefinitely here Monday after a hectic day in which Amelia Earhart Putnam, ocean flight heroine, made a brief appearance in the hunt.

Officials apparently all but abandoned hope of finding in North-ern Utah the Western Air Express transport that disappeared last Tuesday en route here from Los Angeles. It was announced head-quarters will be shifted to Milford 180 miles southwest.

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 22. (P)—Tragic success crowned a search for one of two airliners in Western America Monday and some fear the other may not be found until spring.

A Northwest Airlines transport that crashed last Friday in North Idaho wilds was sighted from the air by Lieutenant Byron Cooper. The plane carried Pilots Joe Livermore and Arthur A. Haid.

"There is no question but that both men are dead," the national guard pilot said.

Amelia Earhart Putnam, world famed woman flier, came here to follow up a "hunch" as to the fate of seven persons aboard a Western Air Express ship that disappeared last Tuesday en route to Salt Lake City from Los Angeles.

She piloted her red and white low-winged monoplane along the eastern shores of historic Great Salt Lake for an hour. Then she returned with the report that fell regularly from the lips of nearly a score of searching fliers.

No trace sighted.

Later, apparently concluding her own "clue" was false—like a hundred others—Mrs. Putnam and Paul Mantz, technical adviser, left for Los Angeles.

Officials pushing the hunt centered here made no attempt to conceal their dejection at the end of a week in which thousands have combed mountain wilds and some 30 planes have hunted from the air.

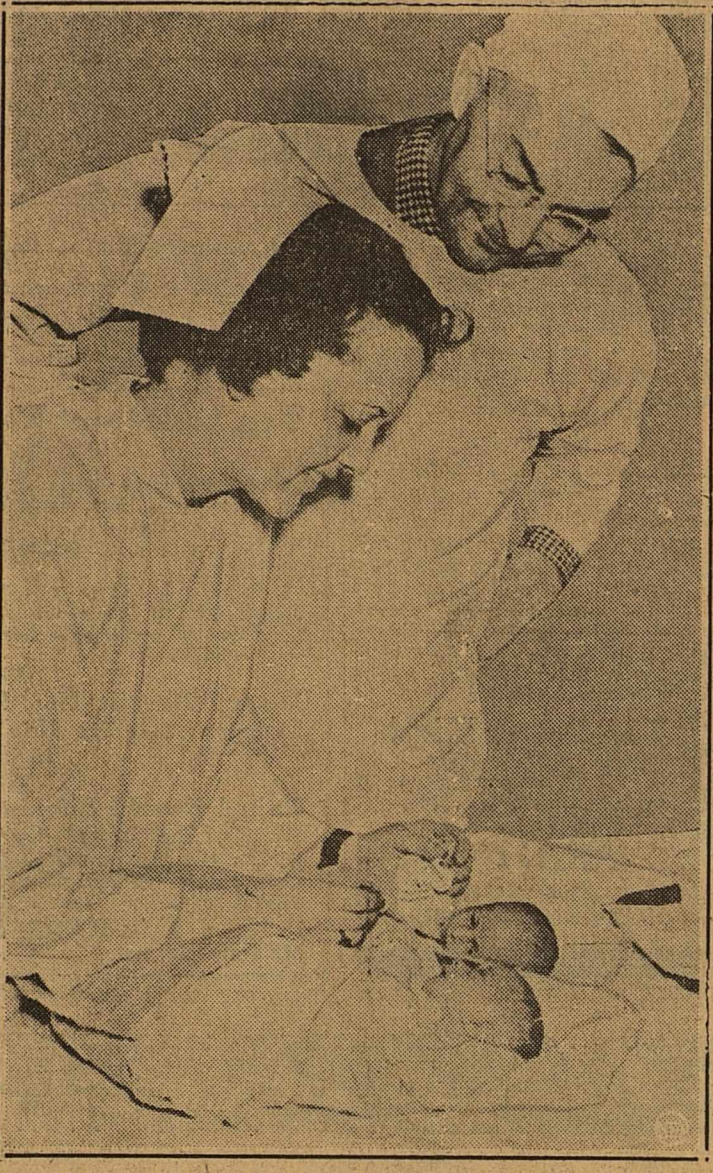
Schlisler in Money At South Texas Tracks

WOMAN ESCAPES HOSPITAL, DIES

Mental Patient Found In Deserted Club Building

BALTIMORE, Dec. 22. (P)—Dr. Silas Weltner, head of the mental diseases hospital here, today identified a nude woman found dead in a gas-filled kitchen of a deserted country club as Mrs. Edith B. Gaither, patient who escaped last night.

The body was covered with scratches and bruises as if she had been walking through the woods.

Soviet Finds Movies Aid Mental Patients

MOSCOW, (U.P.)—Cinema films are being used for hypnosis in the treatment of alcoholism in a special studio at Podolsk, near Moscow.

Violent mental cases become quiet after seeing a light comedy, experiments proved. Epileptics become calm and feel well for a few days after the show. Alcoholics present in the audience fall easily into a hypnotic state, during which suggestions act strongly.

TERRY WILDCAT TO MEASURE UP

Uscan & Illinois Brownfield Has Reached Contract Depth

Steel-line measurement will be made today of depth of the Uscan & Illinois No. 1 Brownfield, wildcat in southwest Terry county, ten miles east of the Honolulu & Cascade No. 1 Bennett, Yoakum discovery. Sand-line showed depth of the well to 5,504 feet in hard lime, four feet below the contract depth. It will be shut down until after Jan. 1, but operators stated that it will be carried deeper. Since entering the lime, the well showed oil stains in samples from 5,398 to 5,404, but has encountered no free oil, gas or water. The No. 1 Brownfield is located in section 54, block K, public school land.

In Yoakum county, a short distance northwest of the Bennett pool opener, T. P. Coal & Oil Company, No. 1 Bennett, section 678, block D, John H. Gibson survey, was forced to shut down for boiler repairs after pulling part of the 8-inch casing. It had drilled plug from 7-inch casing set at 6,645.

Fishing for halter lost at 3,787 in sand and anhydrite is under way in the Hockley county wildcat, Texas No. 1 Bob Slaughter in labour 83, league 38, Zavalla county school land.

Estor Well Gauged

Humble No. 1 Cowden in Ector county flowed 917 barrels through 2 1/2-inch tubing in 24 hours, bottomed at 4,275 in lime. The well, which will serve to close the four-mile breach between the Cummins and Goldsmith pools, was shot with nitro and also given two acid treatments. It is in section 30, block 44, township 1 north, T. & S. survey.

East of the north end of the Goldsmith pool, Devonian No. 1 Scharbauer is preparing to plug back to 4,214 from 4,225 after testing a quarter of a barrel of sulphur water per hour.

American-Maracabo No. 1 Scharbauer is drilling lime at 4,022; T. P. No. 1 Scharbauer and Shasta No. 1 Scharbauer are both drilling plug from cement in the oil string.

Indicating the extension of the Penn pool over a half-mile south, Shell No. 1 University is drilling lime at 3,670 with 1,500 feet of oil in the hole. It struck a show of gas at 3,548 and oil and gas from 3,560-65. Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east line of section 3, block 35, public school land.

OIL PRODUCTION ALLOWABLE FOR JANUARY HIKED

R. R. Commission Sets 1,248,907 Bbls. As Figure RAISE OF 44,512

Good Demand And The Storage Drop Are Cited

AUSTIN, Dec. 22. (P)—The Railroad Commission today set the allowable oil production in Texas for January at 1,248,907 barrels daily, an increase of 44,512 barrels over December and 72,907 above the federal bureau of mines estimate of the market demand.

Chairman Ernest O. Thompson said that the increase was granted because of the nation-wide drop in above ground storage of oil, and the good demand.

He added the opinion that the year 1936 would be a billion-barrel production year.

Feeds Bull Calf For Odessa Show

James Waddell, son of Jim Waddell and wife who ranch in Ector county, will feed a registered bull calf as his vocational agriculture project in Odessa high school this year.

The calf was selected Friday of last week by B. N. Aycock, veteran leader of registered breeders, and S. A. Debnam, Midland county agent, from two calves picked out by Waddell. The calf, to be used later as a herd bull or sold in the Odessa show and sale next spring, is sired by Junior Prince Domino No. 133, a bull bought by Waddell a few years ago from Tom Nance. It is out of a Captain Diamond cow.

Waddell said his boy was feeding a registered bull for the show herd rather than to finish a steer for beef because of the fact that he expects to follow the ranching business rather than the feeding business.

Discarded Toys Are Desired by Scouts

Many unfortunate kiddies of Midland will be made happy, and their belief in Santa Claus will be bolstered on Christmas morning as a result of the toy renovation program now being carried out by the Lions club and Boy Scout troops of the city. All used and discarded toys received by the two organizations are being reworked and repainted by members of the Scout troops, the renovated toys to be distributed to the needy children of the city on Christmas eve.

All used toys received to date have been reworked by the Boy Scouts and the call for additional toys was sent out last night. The demand for the toys is said to be great, and unless more discarded toys are secured many of the unfortunate children will be missed in the distribution.

Johnson, son of the late C. C. Johnston, one of Midland's early cattlemen, was known throughout this section, having been connected with the operation of numerous ranches.

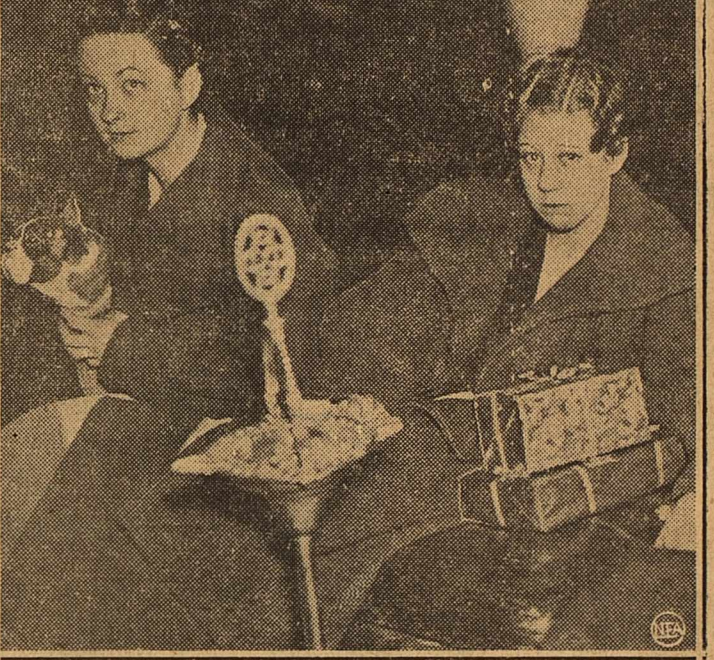

RA DIVISION WILL BE PLACED UNDER NEW DEPARTMENT

Secretary Wallace To Get Control In Future

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (P)—In his first major move toward consolidating government agencies, President Roosevelt decided Monday to make the resettlement administration a part of the agriculture department.

Secretary Wallace revealed after a White House conference that the change would be made by presidential order about January 1. Rexford G. Tutwiler, who recently resigned as resettlement administrator to become an executive for a large molasses company, and Dr. W. W. Alexander, whom Tutwiler picked as his successor, joined in discussing the move with Mr. Roosevelt.

The resettlement administration was established as an emergency agency April 30, 1935, by order of the president.

It has been in charge of buying and retiring from cultivation vast tracts of poor crop land, and has conducted experiments in resettling farmers and housing suburban populations. It also had adjusted some farm debts and aided drought-stricken farm families.

RELIEF CASH FOR TEXAS 110 MILLION

WPA Backs Heaviest Of Expenditures Made To The State

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (P)—Government statistics showed Monday that more than \$110,000,000 had been sent to Texas by emergency government agencies during 1936.

The national emergency council charts showed that expenditures under the emergency relief appropriation acts of 1935 and 1936 totaled \$85,446,053.62 through Nov. 20 and payments for the agriculture departments crop and soil programs totaled \$23,734,000 for the first ten months of the year.

The council disclosed that the largest single agency expenditure was the \$41,321,877.05 distributed through the works progress administration, NEC's breakdown of the special appropriations above the regular departmental expenses which vary little from year to year showed:

MORE OUTSPOKEN THAN CHURCH HEAD IN FIRST ADDRESS

Criticizes Duke For Falling In Love With Wallis FLAYS DECISION

Says Love Not Kind Spoken of By Gospel

YORK, England, Dec. 22. (P)—The Archbishop of York today, breaking his silence on Edward's abdication, was more outspoken than the Archbishop of Canterbury, who drew fire from press and parliament. The archbishop said: "It has happened that many a man before now has found himself beginning to fall in love with another man's wife; that is the moment of critical decision when they should cease before the passion is so developed as to create an agonizing conflict between love and duty."

"That decision has often been taken by men of honor," he said, "that any love which conflicts with duty is not 'love of which the gospel speaks.'"

The Archbishop of Canterbury, soon after the abdication of the King, bitterly attacked the decision of the ruler, roundly chastising him and his "crowd."

MEXICAN SOLON DIES WHEN SHOT BY ARMY MAJOR

'Tragic Mistake' Declared In Death

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 22. (P)—Congressman Salvador Mayorga died today, making a total of three dead in a shooting last night near the chamber of deputies building.

Major Roberto Hernandez, participant in the shooting, said that it was a "tragic mistake."

Authorities quoted Hernandez as saying he and two military police had been hunting two men believed guilty of slaying his brother. Mayoroga corresponded to the description of one.

PRORATION ORDER UPHELD IN YATES BY 3-JUDGE COURT

Ohio Oil Co. Refused Injunction Halting Railroad Comm.

HOUSTON, Dec. 22. (P)—A three judge federal court today refused to grant a temporary injunction restraining the Texas Railroad Commission from enforcing proration order in the Yates oil field in Pecos county.

A restraining order was sought by the Ohio Oil Company, alleging the proration rule was discriminatory. The court set the case down for a hearing on its merits. A tentative date was set for February 11.
