'IMPULSE' SLAYER OF GIRL FRIEND IS SUICIDE VICTIM

Hope Morgan Takes Own Life Today In Jail

JEALOUSY CAUSE Leaves Reasons For Murder of Her 'Pal'

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 15 (AP)—Hope Morgan, who confessed an "impulse" caused her to kill Elizabeth Giltner, a friend, one week ago, hanged herself today in the county jail at Mason while awaiting a report from a sanity commission. The girl fashioned a noose from pajamas to cause her own death. She shot the daughter of the Michigan State College dean. Sheriff McDonald said before the girl hanged herself that she wrote on pages of a magazine that she killed her friend because of jealousy over her friend getting married and leaving her "out of the picture." Miss Morgan, when arrested, calmly told her "homicidal fixation, and asked to be sent to an asylum for the insane. She admitted firing four shots into Miss Giltner's chest. She gave as her reason for killing her friend an impulse to "kill somebody."

Who Said There Is No Santa Claus? to Be Here on Friday

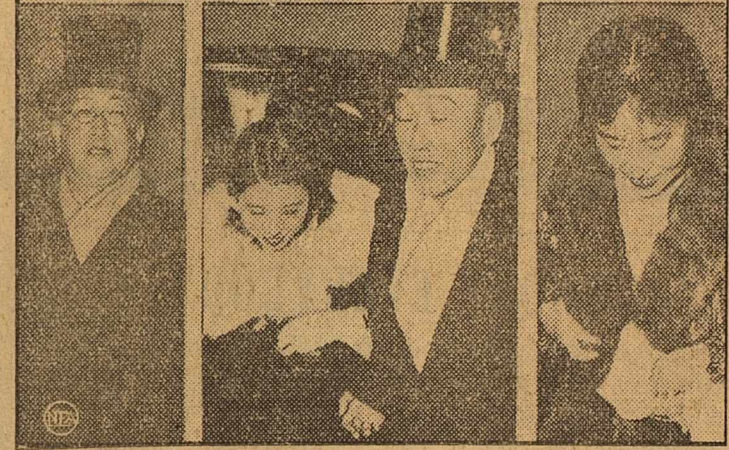

REPORT DICTATOR IS MAINTAINING HEALTH, SPIRITS

Negotiations Must Be Speeded Up, China Told

NATION CHEERED

Had Feared General Had Been Killed By Chang

NANKING, Dec. 15 (AP)—The Chinese government declared martial law throughout China today after rebellious Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang announced the killing of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and other military leaders. Liang reported the killings over radio on the heels of advances in which W. H. Donald, advisor of the central government, said he had seen the military overlord and found him in good health and spirits. It was not reported what time Donald saw Kai-Shek, however.

NANKING, Dec. 15 (AP)—W. H. Donald, advisor of the Chinese government, telegraphed today that he had seen Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, captive dictator of China, at Sianfu, found him in good health and spirits. Donald said, however, "intensive negotiations" are essential before the crisis is relieved and the military overlord released from custody of the mutinous Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang. The report brought great relief in official circles. Donald indicated he intends to return to the Shensi provincial capital tomorrow to speed efforts to effect the release and settle demands of the rebels.

TOKYO, Dec. 15 (AP)—The Domei (Japanese) news agency reported from Shanghai today that leaders of China's national government in Nanking have expressed belief General Chiang Kai-Shek was killed when he was captured.

NANKING, Dec. 15 (AP)—The official Central News agency today stated the captive Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek had telegraphed his wife "I am well; do not worry over my safety." The news agency said that in his first communication to the outside world since he was captured Saturday in a coup by Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang, the generalissimo did not disclose the situation in Sianfu where he was detained.

ROOSEVELT BACK IN NATION TODAY

Lands at Charleston As 28-day Trip Comes To Completion

CHARLESTON, S. C. — President Roosevelt arrived today from a 28-day cruise to the Buenos Aires peace conference and left by train for Washington. The body of Gus Genrich, presidential bodyguard who died during the trip, was taken from the ship.

LOYALS DESTROY REAR GUARD LINE OF REBEL GROUP

Insurgent Attacks At Two Points Repulsed

MADRID, Dec. 15 (AP)—It was reported a government flank action had "destroyed" the rear guard of insurgents besieging the capital today. Fascists attacked a government position at Atresdilla and one at Balmemorillo but were repulsed at both points.

Sluggish Fascist tanks smashed at Madrid suburbs to no avail Monday as militia defenders hastened transfer of women and children from the wind-swept and hungry Spanish capital.

Sixty thousand men, women and children were escorted to warmer and safer areas during the last week, the military announced. Thus far, about 300,000 citizens have been evacuated from the besieged city, and an estimated 200,000 remained, awaiting transportation.

The insurgent tanks rumbled into Northwestern University City and charged at Government lines for two hours, before beating a retreat.

Convinced the siege will last throughout the winter, the defense junta Monday took advantage of the comparative lull in fighting to reorganize defense lines and drafted efforts to enforce strictest discipline among the militia units.

DUKE OF WINDSOR REMAINS IN WITH HEAD, EAR ACHES

Wallis Takes Trip With Hostess To Nice

ENZESFELD, Austria, Dec. 15 (AP)—The Duke of Windsor, who abdicated the British throne because of Wallis Simpson, was suffering head and ear aches today, remaining in bed.

Police maintained a watch to prevent distractions that would increase the prince's discomfort.

NICE, France, Dec. 15 (AP)—Mrs. Wallis Simpson ended her seclusion today, driving from Cannes with her host and hostess while the latter visited the United States consulate on personal matters.

Mrs. Simpson indicated earlier that she intended to re-enter the Riviera social life.

HARRY BRUNETTE CAPTURED TODAY

Noted Robber Fires At Federal Men Until Guns Are Empty

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (AP)—Federal agents captured Harry Brunette, wanted for kidnaping a New Jersey trooper, and for bank robberies in the middle west, and wounded his wife in an apartment house today. The woman was shot in the thigh but was not seriously hurt. The desperado fought back until his pistols were empty.

J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the bureau of investigation, said that Brunette was one of the worst criminals in the country.

Soil Conservation Advances In State

AUSTIN, Dec. 14—Soil conservation work in a tier of Central West Texas counties, carried on cooperatively by the A. & M. Extension Service and the National Youth Administration, is producing worthwhile results speedily. C. E. Bowles, district extension service agent for that area, has notified L. B. Griffith, state supervisor of projects for the NYA.

In Mr. Bowles' district work was under way in Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Coleman, McCulloch, San Saba, Llano and Blanco counties. Projects had been approved for Palo Pinto, Erath, and Comanche counties, but had not then been put into operation. Mr. Bowles reported that projects were needed and should be set up in Fannin, Runnels, Brown and Mills counties.

The work of running terrace lines for farmers is done by a crew of NYA workers directed by a transitman, and is supervised by the county agricultural agent of each county. Work is done on request of farmers who agree to construct the terraces laid out by the surveying parties.

As examples of work accomplished by these crews, Mr. Bowles cited a report from Callahan county which stated that 698 acres were terraced in 8 working days, an average of 87 acres per day, and from Jones county that "terrace lines were run on 1774 acres during the two weeks in which the project was in operation. PROBABILITY OF NEW WARD POOL SEEN AS FINLEY & CHERRY TEST SHOWS OIL

No. 1 Sealey Estate Cores From Bottom Of Hole Show Good Porosity, Saturation

BY FRANK GARDNER The probability that D. J. Finley and A. W. Cherry, co-discoverers with others of the Keyes and Daugherty pools in Winkler county, had opened another pool was seen this morning when it was reported that their No. 1 Sealey Estate wildcat in northern Ward county practically on the Ward-Winkler line, was showing a good amount of oil through drilling-water. The well was cored to 3,204 1/2 feet from the old total depth of 3,200 and is reported to have had good porosity and saturation. Although the No. 1 Sealey had encountered several promising shows in going to 3,200, it never showed any appreciable amount of free oil. Seven-inch casing was cemented last week at 2,886, and plug was drilled last night.

Whether operators will core deeper or test the well at 3,204 1/2 was not learned. It is located four miles northeast of the O'Brien pool, in the northeast corner of section 54, block F. G. & M. M. B. & A. survey. Closest previous production was that of the old Magnolia No. 1-46 Sealey in section 46, which is now pumping about 5 barrels a day. The Magnolia well is a mile and a half south and a half mile east of the Finley & Cherry prospect.

Deepening from 5,029, where it had shown production of around 200 barrels daily after acidizing, Amerasia Petroleum Corporation No. 1-A Averitt, opener of the second pool in Gaines county, drilled into sulphur water and will be plugged back. The well stopped drilling at 5,564 and was given a 45-minute drill-stem test from 5,029-54, showing four strands or 360 feet of sulphur water and five strands or 450 feet of oil through 3/8-inch bottom choke. Gas showing was very light.

In drilling into the water, the Amerasia well evidently struck good oil increases as well. Saturation was reported in samples from 5,033-49.

ACCUSE BROTHERS IN RAILROAD DEAL

Van Sweringens Are Alleged To Have Broken Law

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—The late Van Sweringens brothers of Cleveland were accused before a Senate committee Monday of having violated a Federal and a State law in the purchase of terminal properties while building their three-billion dollar industrial empire.

Chairman Burton K. Wheeler (Dem.) of Montana of the committee inquiring into railroad financing, said a dummy trust company had been set up after the purchase to get around a Missouri statute requiring approval of such a sale by the Missouri Railroad Regulatory Commission.

John P. Murphy of Cleveland, chief counsel for the Van Sweringens interests, heatedly denied Wheeler's assertion. He said the terminal transactions were entirely valid because the Missouri statute does not apply to a transaction outside of the State. He did not specify in which State the properties were transferred, but Wheeler said it was Ohio.

COURT DECLARES ALABAMA LAW OUT

Unemployment Insurance Act in State Held Invalid Today

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Dec. 15 (AP)—A federal court ruled today that the Alabama unemployment law, a state and federal constitutionality and granted an injunction to complaining firms enjoining state enforcement of the law. The court did not pass on the constitutionality of the federal unemployment insurance act.

Health Authorities Seek Home For Boy

County health authorities today were seeking a home, with adequate board and room accommodations for a seventeen year old youth who recently was dismissed from the Carlisbad Sanatorium. The boy who spent almost six months there, was discharged as being thoroughly recovered but in need of regular rest each day. He is an arrested case and not infectious.

Dr. L. W. Leggett, county health officer, said the boy needs to go to school in the morning taking four hours of rest each afternoon, thereby building strength and resistance against a return of the lung trouble for which he was treated.

His parents, reside here but, on account of limited income, are unable to provide the youth with the care he needs for a few months.

Health authorities planned to aid the youth in securing vocational training here after two months. Any person or family interested in providing room and board for the boy during at least the next two months may secure full particulars from Dr. Leggett.

AMERICAS FAVOR NEUTRALITY PACT AHEAD OF OTHERS

League of Nations Idea Discarded By Group

Buenos Aires, Dec. 15 (AP)—Twelve of the 21 delegations to the Inter-American peace conference signed the United States revised neutrality plan today.

As sponsors of the proposal before it was sent from the committee the peace organization committee approved the recommendation to postpone considering creation of an Inter-American court of justice until the next Pan-American conference in 1938.

The delegations heard a message from President Roosevelt, who favored the parity.

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Dec. 15 (AP)—Proposals for an American League of Nations and an American Court of Justice appeared Monday to be doomed to the discard at the Inter-American peace conference but a United States neutrality plan won strong support.

A majority of the members of a sub-committee which studied the league and court projects indicated willingness to shelve the plans. They said they will support reports prepared by their chairman, Juan Antonio Buero of Uruguay, who urged that experts consider the plans and report to the regular Pan-American conference at Lima, Peru in 1938.

The United States delegation has indicated disapproval of the American court and American league plans. It has suggested Inter-American co-operation for peaceful settlement of American troubles, however, and its neutrality proposal won the signatures of at least ten other groups.

The neutrality project calls for consultation among American Republics if there is war in or outside America. The signatories also would consider prohibiting loans and the sale or shipment of war materials to belligerents, although they would not guarantee taking such measures in advance.

The aged Gen. Jose Mariaoncada, a bitter assailant of regional arm limitation proposals since the conference began, told a committee: "The good people cannot limit their defenses while the bad people arm."

Tuberculin Aids To Children Are Cited

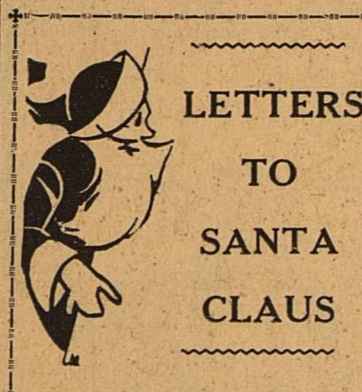
"One child out of every five in our schools needs to be safe-guarded against a possible future breakdown from tuberculosis," Dr. Z. T. Scott, managing director of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, said today in an appeal to the women of Texas to take up the fight against tuberculosis, the foe of youth.

"Prevention of tuberculosis means the protection of the home, the conservation of child health, mothers know how important are the growing years of boys and girls, the building of strong bodies that can ward off disease. Women are the direct contact between the school and the home.

"Tuberculosis is readily preventable if known in time. Science has given us two certain means of a check on our children so that we may know the first danger signals of tuberculosis and can act accordingly. These are the tuberculin skin test and the X-ray. Through examinations given school children which included these two methods of diagnosis, it has been found that one child out of every five is in danger of the disease and one in every hundred actually has tuberculosis. The resistance of these children can be built up through adequate rest, balanced diet and medical supervision."

Everyone may have a part in the campaign against tuberculosis, Dr. Scott said, by buying Christmas seals which finance the work of the affiliated tuberculosis associations, which are directing special effort at this time toward the prevention of tuberculosis among the youth of our state and nation.

"Although most of us are familiar with the old proverb that one bad apple can spoil a barrel," Dr. H. F. Carman, president of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, said today, "not everyone realizes that a case

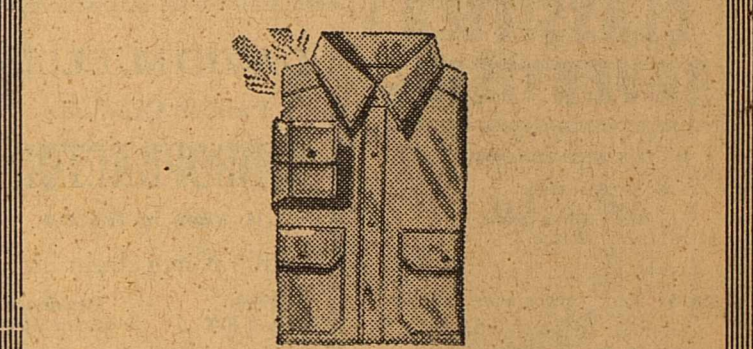

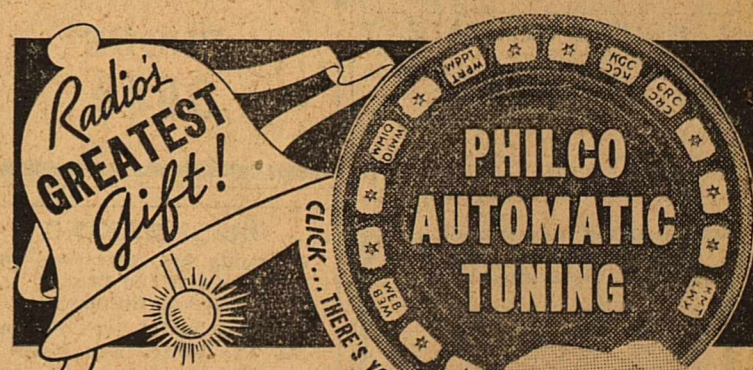
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
