Three Reported Dead In Raid on City, 10 Injured

MADRID, Dec. 16. (A)-Twenty insurgent planes bombed suburb-Madrid and outskirts today, killing three and wounding ten at Majadahonda. Other planes were reported to have bombarded Bou, Franco-Spanish border town.

Heavy casualties were recorded in the capital's Cuatrocaminos district. Government forces wiped out the rear guard of the Fascists attacking Madrid while the insurgent commanders threw German troops into their front lines, defense of-ficers declared Tuesday night. A government announcement said

Gen. Francisco Franco's troops were whipped and destroyed in flank action at Fresnedillas, twenty five miles west of Madrid.
