Gasoline Blast Kills Mother, Child

No German Hostilities in Spanish Mix-up Expected

To Permit Fascists Volunteer in The Revolution

(By Associated Press)
Authoritative sources said today that Germany will skirt war with Socialist Spain without resorting to actual hostilities, permitting volunteers to sail to Fascist aid and stationing warships at Spanish ports to convoy German vessels.
There will be no armed rescue of the seized freighter Palos at Bilbao and whole units of the regular army will not be sent to war, it was reported.
Great Britain held hopes that refusal of the Spanish government to free the ship would be settled through diplomatic channels. The steamer was held on grounds that it carried contraband.
Socialist Spain refused Sunday night to give up the captured Nazi freighter Palos in a sharp rebuff to Germany that brought a new threat of war to troubled Europe.
Germany warned of reprisals if the freighter and its cargo were not released by its Bilbao captors. Bilbao refused.
"A clear case of war contraband," said a note issued through the Spanish Embassy at Paris. The ship carried 1,500 tons of armaments Bilbao authorities charged.
"There is no question of releasing the Palos," the note added—in effect accepting the challenge of Germany.

KIDNAPERS FREE AMBASSADOR SON

Youth Held Five Hours By Trio; Queried About Family
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28. (AP)—C. E. Alfaro, ambassador of Ecuador, reported to the state department today that his fifteen-year-old son, Clmeda, had been restored to his home after being kidnaped by three unidentified men Christmas night. He had been held for five hours.
The youth said the men forced him into a car and drove him over the city, questioning him about members of his family. They finally put him out in the southeast section of the capital.
The ambassador made no request for government action.

BANK OFFICIALS ARE RE-ARRESTED

Charged With Violations Of Banking Laws In Vermont
RUTLAND, Vt., Dec. 28. (AP)—Governor Charles M. Smith, president of the Marble Savings Bank, and three other officers of the institution, arrested some time ago in connection with concealment of theft, were rearrested today on charges of violating the banking laws.
The actions were the outcome of alleged defalcations of a former bookkeeper, John J. Cocklin, now serving a prison sentence.

Three Injured In Texon Blast Sunday

TEXON, Dec. 28. (AP)—Three persons were injured and \$25,000 damage was done early Sunday morning to the gasoline plant of the Big Lake Oil Company here from an explosion after a discharge valve blew out on a gas line.
The plant was enveloped in flames, which were soon extinguished. C. S. Bewick, Walter Ritter and Troy Gambill, only men on duty at the time of the explosion received serious burns and were knocked down by the concussion.
Neither of the trio were inside the building when the gas exploded. They were at the Texon Hospital for treatment. The explosion was heard and felt for 15 or 20 miles, some thinking it a tremor. The plant is being repaired and will be in full operation within two or three days.

MIDLAND WOMAN BADLY INJURED IN AUTO CRASH

Amputation of Arm Necessary For Mrs. Bodine
Mrs. Pat Bodine of Midland sustained serious injury in an automobile crash near Westbrook, in Mitchell county, late Saturday, necessitating the amputation of her left arm. She and two daughters were en route to Colorado for a visit with relatives, it was reported. An automobile ahead of their car was reported to have had a fire blowout the rear car crashing into it as it swerved and suddenly stopped.
Bodine, summoned by telephone at his farm two miles north of Midland, rushed to Colorado where she had been taken to a hospital. Although other complications might set up, it was believed that the arm injury was her worst. Her two daughters were only slightly bruised and shaken up from the crash, it was reported here. Mrs. Bodine remained in the Colorado hospital today.



Need of Sound Cotton Policy Stressed by Economist

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 28. — The keen interest now being shown in the development of a sound cotton policy for Texas deserves the best thought and cooperation of every citizen of the State and of our Federal government, Dr. A. B. Cox, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research and internationally known cotton economist, asserted in discussing the proposed policy.
"The tendency now for all interests to cooperate in making out a program is especially encouraging," Dr. Cox stated. "Cotton growers, ginners, merchants, cottonseed crushers, and others involved are recognizing the problem as one primarily of common interest and deserving of coordinated effort, and not one of group conflicts."
"Clearly defined objectives are the first essential in planning a cotton policy for Texas and a program to attain those objectives," he continued. "In order to visualize objectives in dealing with the cotton industry, it is necessary to have a clear understanding of its significance and ramifications in the State's economic and social life. During the three years, 1927, 1928, and 1929, the farm cash income from cotton and cottonseed in Texas averaged \$467,000,000, and that was 64 per cent of all farm cash income.
"The cotton industry taken as a whole is by far the greatest source of employment in Texas. Normally, nearly 800,000 of the gainfully employed in Texas, or over one-fifth of all employed people, were engaged in the production and harvesting of cotton. Even the hauling of the normal cotton crop in Texas

Deputies, Jobs Periled, Hear Duce in Historic Session



Apparently doomed to be replaced by a new law-making body, the Italian Chamber of Deputies is pictured in Rome recently in what may have been its last session. The 400 members are at attention as Premier Benito Mussolini, indicated by arrow, addresses them in commemoration of the conquest of Ethiopia. The chamber now faces absorption by the national Council of Corporations, which would substitute Fascist group representatives for deputies. Since 1928, deputies have served five-year terms, their duties being mainly to ratify decisions made by Mussolini and his ministers. In electing deputies, the National Syndicate Confederations, equally representing labor and capital, nominated 800 candidates. Various other groups nominated 200 more. From this slate of 1,000, the Grand Fascist Council selected 400 to be submitted to the voters. In the 1934 elections, the Grand Council's list was approved 99.84 per cent.

Tacoma Youth Kidnaped; J. Edgar Hoover to Aid

Ransom Note Left By Armed Man Who Grabs Child
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28. (AP)—J. Edgar Hoover said today the department of justice would "cooperate fully" with local authorities in seeking capture of the kidnaped ten-year-old Charles Matson of Tacoma, Washington. The boy was snatched from the living room of the Matson home last night, the armed intruder throwing a ransom note on the floor.
The Lindbergh law is not operative until kidnapers cross a state line, but federal agents customarily give assistance as soon as such crimes are reported.
A police official at Tacoma reported that members of the Matson family were directed in the note to make contact with the kidnapers some time this afternoon through a newspaper want ad. He said the note demanded \$28,000 ransom.

WEST TEXAS DEVELOPMENTS AS WORK OPENS DOMINATED BY ECTOR COUNTY

Texas-Pacific 1 Scharbauer Shows Largest Natural Production of Area

Ector county continued to dominate West Texas oil developments as the week opened, with two wells showing large production, the new south extension to the Penn pool gauging over 200 barrels a day after shot, and a semi-wildcat northeast of the Foster pool logging its first oil showing.
Between the Cummins and Goldsmith pools, Texas-Pacific Coal & Oil Company No. 1 Scharbauer, 440 feet from the north and east lines of section 31, block 44, township 1 north, T. & P. survey, indicated the largest natural production of any well in the area as it flowed between 30 and 40 barrels of oil hourly while drilling to 4,215 feet in lime. The well is said to have logged its best pay section from 4,175 to 4,220. It has been shut in pending pipe-line connection, having filled both storage tanks. The T. P. well is a mile southeast of the Humble No. 1 Cowden, first wildcat in the area to strike oil, which was completed last week for 917 barrels a day after shooting and acidizing.
Over a half mile north of the T. P. producer, Shasta Oil Company No. 1 Scharbauer, 2,200 feet from the north and 440 feet from the west line of section 29, block 44, township 1 north, T. & P. survey, was shot yesterday with 100 quarts of solidified nitro from 4,142 to 4,197. It flowed 25 barrels the first hour after shot, 27 1/2 barrels the second, and was reported holding close to that average in succeeding hours. Best pay was from 4,149-57, and the well flowed 18 barrels an hour, natural, while drilling to total depth of 4,202. It will probably be acidized.
Also in that area, American-Marcacabo No. 1 Scharbauer, southwest corner of section 19, was reaming rathole at 4,100, bottomed at 4,155. It was showing some gas. Further northwest, Manson Oil Company No. 1 Cummins is drilling below 3,625 feet in anhydrite. It is 440 feet from the north and west lines of section 24, block 41, township 1 north, a half mile southeast of the Empire No. 1-C Cummins extension producer.
Penwell Extension
Shell No. 1 University, half-mile south extension to the Penn pool in Ector, flowed 217 barrels in 24 hours following shot with 440 quarts from 3,150 to 3,660, the total depth. Last night, it was cleaning out cavings at 3,595, with 2,500 feet of oil in the hole. Driller reported the well as having found its best pay from 3,610-25. Location of the No. 1 University is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east line of section 3, block 35, public school land.
A mile northeast of production in the Foster pool, York & Harper and Sloan & Zook No. 1-B Foster encountered its first oil and gas showing from 4,138-48 and showed a small amount of free oil in the hole. It is drilling ahead below 4,174 feet in lime. The semi-wildcat is located in the southwest corner of section 8, block 42, township 2 south, T. & P. survey.
To Shoot Today
In southern Andrews county, Sinclair-Prather No. 1 Emma Cowden, over two miles northwest of the North Cowden pool of Ector, will be shot today with 90 quarts from approximately 4,110 to 4,300, the total depth. It filled up at the rate of 50 feet of oil an hour when swabbed down through tubing. Location is in section 12, block 44, township 2 north.
Getty No. 1 Moxley, wildcat north of the town of Andrews and southwest of the Means pool, logged a showing of gas at 2,955 and is reported to have topped the Yates sand at 2,960. It is now drilling anhydrite below 3,100. Nine and 5/8-inch casing was set at 2,832.
Getty No. 1 Lindley, another Andrews wildcat, was last reported rigging up standard tools after setting pipe at 3,135.
In the northwest part of the county, William Hannigan et al No. 1 Logsdon is drilling at 4,270 feet in lime and anhydrite. It is in the center of the southwest quarter of section 5, block A-32, public school land.
Tops Anhydrite
Top of anhydrite was called at 2,120 feet in W. L. Picketts et al No. 1 Lewright, closely-watched wildcat in southeastern Terry county 14 miles northwest of the Albaugh discovery well in Dawson county. With elevation of 3,185, it is said to be running about 100 feet

Four Are Seriously Burned in Center Explosion

CENTER, Dec. 28. (AP)—Mr. Dewey Bates, 34, and her infant daughter were burned to death and four others were critically injured yesterday in a gasoline explosion east of here.
Betty Jo Plunkett, 5, and Mrs. Levon Guy, 26, were not expected to live. Dewey Bates and Levon Guy were seriously burned while attempting to rescue their wives. The blast occurred when Mrs. Bates poured gasoline on a fire, thinking it was kerosene.

TRAFFIC DEATHS LEAD CHRISTMAS FATALITIES

CHICAGO, Dec. 28. (AP)—Over 750 persons died violent deaths in the nation during the Christmas holidays and the past week end, a survey showed today.
Traffic deaths numbered 555, with 33 in Texas.

TWO DROWNED AS CAR CRASHES BARRICADE

WACO, Dec. 28.—Two young people were drowned and two others rescued when the automobile in which they were riding plunged through a barricade at the Cotton Palace here early Sunday into swollen Waco Creek.
The dead are:
Miss Dorothy Holmes, 18, graduate of Marlin High School in 1936 and class beauty of that year.
James Haug, 24, of Marlin, graduate of Texas A. & M. College, home on a holiday from Stillwater, Okla., where he was employed by the Government.
Clifton Eskridge of Marlin, escaped and succeeded in rescuing Miss Jean Singletary of Bryan, a student at Texas State College for Women at Denton.
Eskridge, driver of the car, dragged Miss Singletary from the front seat and swam to safety after the machine had been carried about a hundred feet downstream.


BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

written. But the administration's legislative program will be developed gradually as the session progresses, rather than all at once.

Measures to restrict the U. S. Supreme Court's veto power over the legislative and executive branches of government, wage and hour legislation, federal housing subsidies, relief expenditures and budget-balancing, neutrality, crop insurance and farm tenancy, Government reorganization—all those issues will be prominently before Congress.

The safest prediction is that this session will be extremely busy and that it will not be short.

To be settled at the outset is a bitter contest for the majority leadership of the House between Sam Rayburn of Texas and John J. O'Connor of New York. Speaker William H. Bankhead of Alabama will be chosen again without opposition.

Roosevelt has announced flatly that he is taking no part in this battle, but so many of his confidantes and lieutenants are working for Rayburn that if O'Connor, a Tammany man, is chosen, insiders will construe his victory as a licking for the administration and a portent of trouble ahead.

There will be only 17 Republicans in the Senate, several of them notoriously independent in speech and vote, among 96 members. And only 89 Republicans among the 435 members of the House.

House Majority "Unwieldy" Old-timers say they'd rather try to control a House with a majority of only 10 or a dozen than one with a majority of a hundred. It is recalled that Roosevelt's first real troubles with Congress began soon after the Democratic landslide of 1934. Some fear that this Congress may break up into blocks difficult to control.

Senate leadership will remain the same—Joe Robinson of Arkansas as floor leader, Pat Harrison of Mississippi as whip, and Charlie McNary of Oregon titular leader of the small Republican minority.

Van den Berg of Michigan is expected to be the outstanding Republican spokesman and will have as much as anyone to do with shaping the programs which Republicans hope to formulate for use in the campaigns of 1938 and 1940.

The minority leader on the House side will again be Congressman Bert Snell of New York.

CHINESE PARADE IN HONOR CHIANG

200,000 Gathered in Airdrome Praised By Chieftain

NANKING, Dec. 28. (AP)—Two hundred thousand Chinese held a celebration and parade Sunday night in honor of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's return from captivity. He had been the hostage of Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang, who attempted to force him into a more aggressive anti-Japanese policy.

The Chinese gathered in the great airdrome, Chang, although invited, did not attend. Rather he sent a message which was read to the gathering by Gen. Ho Ying-Chin, Minister of War.

Chiang told his people that their behavior in the face of the crisis over the last few weeks had demonstrated that China was an organized, forceful State.

Mounted gendarmes and white-uniformed nurses headed the two-mile parade. All members of the Government as well as representatives of military, civil, labor, students, women's and journalistic organizations took part in it, demonstrating their loyalty to the leader.

Meanwhile Government officials were debating what discipline should be meted out to the young Marshal who shocked all China by his sudden coup. He has now recanted his heresy and acknowledged the correctness of the political policies followed by Chiang.

Chang, son of the Old Marshal, Chang Tso-Lin, who dominated Manchuria for years before the Japanese took it, wanted to fight Japan to regain his former heritage in Manchuria and also to end Japanese domination in all parts of China.

Gen. Chen Chang and Chiang Tso-Pin, former Chinese Ambassador to Tokyo, who were taken prisoners by Chang along with the Generalissimo, returned to Nanking Sunday.

The American Embassy Sunday was advised that United States nationals in Shensi and Kansu Provinces were not evacuating as they had planned.

'Fake Suicide' Victim Identified

FRESNO, Cal., Dec. 28. (AP)—Under-Sheriff C. A. Tarr said Sunday the victim of a "fake suicide" slaying whose headless body was found on a railroad right-of-way Saturday had been identified as Emory Parr, 37.

The man previously had been identified as Bernard Jack Smith, but Tarr said two neighbors of the man positively established his identity as Parr by clothing, dental work and various characteristics.

Officers continued questioning Thelma Switzer, 32, alias William, operator of a highway lunch counter, who reported Parr had struck her with an ax and ripped off her coat when she resisted his advances during a drinking party.

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Joe Marty Expected to Prove Equal Of DiMaggio In First Year In Majors

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28. — There'll be one less worry for Chicago Cub supporters next year. Pacific Coast League fans will bet their shirts that the Bruins' center field job will be handled in satisfactory manner.

For when Phillip K. Wrigley parted with cash and three players in a \$50,000 deal for Joe Marty, young San Francisco Seals, outfielder, he got value received.

Marty comes from the same hustling Pacific Coast League that sent Joe DiMaggio up to electrify the American circuit. He was coached and developed by Charlie Graham, president of the club and former major league catcher, and Manager Left O'Doul, along with DiMaggio, the Kanakas' star.

Is he better than his former Italian teammate? You can get an argument from either angle out here on the coast, where everything's moving except ships. It will take a season or two in big top competition to decide that.

However, Marty, in his third season with the San Francisco Seals, hit 359 in 164 games, to top all players participating in 65 or more contests. He's a hard line driver. He clouted 49 two-baggers, 14 triples, and 17 homers. His bat drove in 92 counters, and he is credited with 92 stolen bases.

Hits To All Fields His hitting has been to all the fences in Coast League parks. One drive to left field traveled 365 feet. He lined one 420 feet out center field way, and came close to 400 feet in smacking to right field.

Marty is just under 6 feet, weighs 180, and is 21. He's remarkably fast on the bases, and in the garden is a spectacular center fielder whose work clicks with the fans. He has a powerful throwing arm—not quite as strong as DiMaggio's—but he's faster on his feet than Yankee Joe.

The youngster starred in baseball, football, and basketball at the Christian Brothers' school in Sacramento, his home town. He went to St. Mary's College with football ambitions, but at that time was too light to win a regular berth. He left school, went to work, played semi-pro ball at Sacramento, and

there the Seals picked him up. In his first season Marty batted .287, but his work gave promise. O'Doul and Graham worked hard to develop him. Last year, there

was improvement. "He learns faster and remembers more easily than any youngster I've worked with for a long time," says O'Doul. "He's like DiMaggio in many ways—one being that neither makes the same mistake a second time."

"We expected a lot from DiMaggio—but not what he produced in his first season up. Marty has lots of stuff, but even Ty Cobb didn't do as good breaking in as did DiMaggio."

In exchange for Marty, the Seals received considerable cash and three players—Outfielder Johnny Gill, and Infielders Joe Vitter and Gene Lillard. O'Doul and Graham need these men to build their own club. Lillard was a Coast League sensation when he broke in.

This selling of rookies is a real business with the San Francisco club. Selling a DiMaggio one year and a Marty the next makes a big addition to the club bankroll, so there's real attention given to developing promising youngsters for sale to the majors.

Developpe Great Players Do Seal rookies make good? Well, we might mention that O'Doul himself, was a Seal rookie. He went up as a pitcher, came down again, and went up as a slug-ging outfielder.

The Pirates paid \$95,000 and a player for Seal Rookie Paul Waner. Cleveland gave the Seals \$50,000 for Earl Averill. From the San Francisco club, Roy Johnson went to Detroit for \$50,000; Frankie Crosetti to the Yankees for \$65,000; Lefty Gomez to the same club for fifty grand; Willie Kamm to the White Sox for \$125,000; Jimmy O'Connell to the Giants for \$75,000; Gus Suhr to the Pirates for \$42,500; Jimmy Caveney to Cincinnati for \$25,000 cash and \$25,000 worth of property; Smead Jolley to the White Sox, for \$35,000 and two players; Augie Galan to the Cubs for five players; and DiMaggio brought \$25,000 and four players.

Check on that talent and you'll find they did pretty good in the majors, and stayed a long time. So when the San Francisco Seals put a youngster on the block and say he's ready for delivery, the moguls have reason to consider him worth a real piece of money.

ryover would be 12,300,000 bales. "The point is the United States may be compelled to revise its idea of normal carryover downward if it fails to regain its world markets. In other words, carryover of any particular growth of cotton at the end of the year at any month bears some percentage relation of production and consumption of that growth. If the United States is to continue production then it must continue to revise its ideas of carryover in some like ratio.

"Stocks of cotton in this country show a decline of 343,000 bales from this time last year, and stocks afloat to Europe and in European ports show a decrease of 95,000 bales—a total decrease in these

items of 438,000 bales. "Based on average changes in relationship between supply and price during the past seven years, this decline in the supply should cause an advance of 71 points over the index price at this time last year. When this calculated index price is adjusted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics Wholesale Index and the spinners margin correction factor, the calculated price of middling 7/8-inch spot cotton in New Orleans should be 14.06 cents. Computed on the basis of average percentage change in relation to supply and price, the indicated price is 12.78 cents.
