To the Voters of Midland County
My record as a peace officer in this county for many years is well known. I have always tried to discharge the duties of sheriff fearlessly and fairly and have attempted, within the legal bounds, to suppress all forms of lawlessness and to execute with dispatch all processes coming to my hands.

I am seeking re-election on a promise that my entire attention will be devoted to an honest effort to see that all laws are properly enforced and to the full length that the cooperation of the people of the county will justify.

I believe in the enforcement of all the laws and base my candidacy upon the proposition that no violation of law should receive the attention of an officer above another violation, but that all infractions of law should have his attention upon an equal basis.

I think that it is not amiss to call attention to the fact that we have never had a prohibition law in Texas under which we could operate in the State courts with any degree of success until the passage of the present law which became effective on November 15th, last. Prior to that time the testimony of the purchasers of whiskey had to be coroborated. Because of the condition of the law I followed the custom of most all the sheriffs of the State, and turned the prohibition cases I had over to the Federal authorities. Since then I have been placing them in the State courts, since the State prohibition law is now considered sufficient to sustain convictions.

I feel that my past experiences have better fitted me for other performance of the duties of your sheriff in the future, and I pledge you that if elected I will give full time and best efforts to the fulfilment of all duties attached to this office.
