There are nine hundred students in the Midland public ple were out there yesterday. schools. The enrollment, which on the opening day was 798, has been growing steadily, until it gained over a hundred additional Land Commissioner students. It is now expected that there will be a total of 1,000 by the end of the Fall term.

Cattle over the entire West are in a little better flesh than a year ago, the condition being 93 per cent of normal compared with 92 per cent last month, 91 per cent a year ago, and 89 per cent two years ago.

Sheep conditions on the ranges were very favorable during August except in Texas, where dry weather cut the condition and on some of the higher ranges wher ethere was too much rain. Sheep and lambs are moving from summer ranges in good flesh and the lambs are generally heavy. Better feed conditions in Ne wMexico greatly improved the condition and weight of lambs. The bulk of the feeder lambs were contracted early, and recent prices asked for feeders are higher than earlier contract prices. Indications are that many ewe lambs will be held and there is a strong demand for ewe lambs at a premium over feeder lambs, with a strong demand in many of the Western States for young and yearling ewes. Prospects are that winter feeding in the western areas will come back toward normal this year, particularly in northern Colorado and the Scottsbluff section of Nebraska. The condition of sheep and lambs is placed at 96 per cent normal, the same as last month, compared with 94 per cent a year ago and 98 per cent two years ago. -U. S Department of Agriculture.





Beef and Macaroni, San Francisco. Baked Lima Beans, Paprika Pineapple and Cheese Salad Stanford Prune: Whip Pie.

The actual cooking time for this meal is three hours. But, with a reliable stove, the cook does not need to stay in the kitchen more than half an hour!

First, heat the oven well for 3 minutes to 425 degrees, while you make a pie crust. Bake for 10 minutes. Then put meat and beans into oven, and reduce heat to "moderate," or 350 degrees. You need pay no more attention to this cooking for 3 hours, when meal is ready to serve.

A heat regulator takes the guess-work out of baking. It registers the exact degree of heat. One, made especially for oil stoves, may be fastened easily to practically any glass-door oven.



Beef and Macaroni San Francisco Select about 2 pounds of lean beef, cut into pieces suitable for serving. Sprinkle each piece with salt and dredge with flour.

Heat drippings of fat, flour, salt pork in a frying pan, then add meat and quickly brown each piece on ail sides. When browned place in a large casserole and pour over 2 cups of tomato sauce, or pureed tomato, one teaspoon of salt and enough hot water to cover meat. Add 12 or more ripe or stuffed olives. Cover casserole.

Place in a moderate oven and cook about 3 hours. An hour before meal is to be served add 1½ cups elbow macaroni or macaroni broken into inch lengths. If more liquid is needed add either tomato or stock.



Baked Lima Beans, Paprika

Soak lima beans overnight, or at least for several hours. Drain, cover with fresh cold water and set over flame, bringing slowly to the boiling point. Drain again, and place in a casserole or bean pot.

Cover with water, add 1 teaspoon of salt, 2 teaspoons paprika, and 2 tablespoons butter. Cover and cook with the meat, allowing about the same time.



Rub stoned stewed prunes through a coarse sieve. Put sugar, prune pulp and unbeaten egg whites in a bowl and beat with a whip egg-beater until stiff enough to hold its shape. Fold in part of the nuts, then heap mixture in the baked pie crust. Sprinkle nuts on top and place on top grate of oven until nuts are delicately browned.

For Columbus was the one who made so many things possible. Perhaps others may have discovered what he did-doubtless in time to come they would have done so-but that is all guesswork on our part. The fact 's Columbus did make the discovery, so that since his time the countries apon this continent have accomplished so much that is splendid and amazing.

The parents of Columbus were woolcombers, but they saw to it that Cotumbus was quite well educated. At an early age he began his life upon

We all know of his desires and his paragles to obtain aid to discover a route to Asia by going west. The roundness of the earth meant something very real to Columbus. He prozled over it, thought of it, saw in his mind the round, round earth and of himself traveled into Asia by another door as it were!

So at last he started on this venture. Partly with royal assistance. and partly with the help of the Zinzons, merchants of Palos, they started.

There were only three small vessels, the Santa Maria, which was the flagship, manned by Columbus; the Nina, commanded by Vincente Yanez Pinzon, and the Pinta, commanded by were no more than 120 men.

It was August 3, 1492, that they left Palos; or, as we have always said in the little rhyme which makes us keep the date of the discovery of America in our minds:

Columbus sailed the ocean blue, In fourteen hundred and ninety-two.

Whatever dates we may forget, that will somehow always stay in our minds, I think, for not only is there the rhyme, but there is that little picture we can see of Columbus standing in the bow of his small vessel, followed by the two others, and of the water so blue and sparkling and beauiful and smooth.

Columbus took many voyages in his lifetime; he discovered many islands. nade for himself a great and lasting name in history, but he never knew ne had discovered a new continent.

### THE WHY of SUPERSTITIONS By H. IRVING KING

Watch two men walking together and you will be surprised to see how many couples, when they come to an obstruction like a post, or a tree. or, perhaps, a barrel placed on the sidewalk to cover a temporary excavation, will take care to pass together on the same side. Many men who would scout the idea that they are superstitious will, nevertheless, be extremely careful in this respect. For it "breaks friendship" if they pass er third. the obstacle on different sides.

Primarily this superstition is the survival of what was, to our savage | zell third. ancestors, no superstition at all, but only a usage born of the exigencies of savage life. Two members of the same tribe, making their way through the dark forests of Northern lands into which the civilization of the Mediterranean shores had not yet penetrated, knew that, lurking about them in the wilderness were savage beasts and no less savage enemiesand they kept close together for safety's sake. To allow even the bole of a tree to interfere between them might mean that one would be fatally attacked before his companion could assist in his defense. For mutual support, for companionship, they instinctively kept close together and instinctively still their descendants turn out of their way to avoid passing on oppesite sides of a post. And to this is added a subconscious influence of symbolism-the division between the two should the post be between them suggesting severed friendship.

### How It Started By JEAN NEWTON

MANUFACTURE OF PAPER

A LTHOUGH the word "paper" is derived from papyrus, the writrus is not paper, nor does the making of paper hark back to it. The first genuine paper was made by the Chinese in very early times and introduced by them to the Arabs, and thence into Europe. There is knowledge of a factory established for the purpose of making paper at Samarkand as early as 706 A. D.

By the Arabs the art of turning linen and cotton rags into paper is thought to have been taken first into Spain and then into Italy. The year 1150 saw the estamblishment of the paper mill at Fabriano, which became the center of a great paper making district. After Italy came France, Germany, and when the Edict of Nantes in 1685 drove French paper makers into exile, England and America fell heirs to the art.

In the year 1690 the first paper mill in America was built at Roxborough, near Philadelphia, by William Rittenhouse. The story of the manufacture of paper would be incomplete without mention of the Fourdinier brothers, Englishmen, who in the early Nineteenth century lost their fortune in the invention of a machine for producing paper in endless rolls, instead of the old individual sheets, a machine which revolutionized the industry and earned for them the title "the fathers of modern paper-making."

### Disuse of the Long "S"

The modern form of the letter "s" took the place of the old "f"-form of the letter very gradually. #### Natives Confirmed in Their Belief in Ju-Ju

There is a little final touch to a story in the British Medical Journal which should give supporters to the "thirteen superstition" and similar delusions something to think about.

It occurs at the end of an account, by a medical officer in West Africa, of how thirteen native women were all struck and killed by lightning while cowering under the same galvanized iron shelter. All the natives, including the driver of the motor lorry

which had been sent to remove the bodies to a mortuary, firmly refused to enter the shelter, as there was a prevalent belief that anyone removing the bodies before the "ju-ju" had been appeased by a ceremony of purification by the "thunder women" would die within a week.

However, the European manager of the local transport company took the bodies to the mortuary in spite of the warnings he also received. Three days later he was admitted to the European hospital at Accra and died of yellow fever after three days' illness.

#### Thirteen at Table

The origin of the superstition about the unluckiness of the thirteenth person at a table is so old as to be unknown. Thirteen, from earliest times, has been a number with mystic asso ciations-like three and seven.

Rev. E. Cobham Brewer's "Dictionary of Phrase and Fable" records that: "It is said that the origin of sitting down thirteen at dinner being deemed unlucky is because, at a banquet in Valhalla, Loki once intruded, making thirteen guests, and Balder was slain.

1. Elijah's Flight (vv. 1-14).
