

ORSON TO CONSTRUCT NEW BRICK BUILDING

ALSO BOUGHT ADDITIONAL LOT
IN BLOCK NEAR THE
DEPOT

Frank Orson will erect a new two story brick building, 25 by 80 in dimensions, on his lots at the corner of Main Street and Missouri Avenue, at an early date, the plans having been prepared by Edw. A. Nolan and Sons, architects.

The lower floor will be leased to some business firm, while the upper floor will be made up into four complete apartments.

Each apartment will have a living room, a dining and kitchenette, a bed room and bath.

Mr. Orson closed a deal this week with W. F. Cowden, buying the building located on the south of the Howe and Allen building. The new brick is to be on the lot just north of the Howe and Allen building.

Results From Tulsa Trip Still Showing

When To Buy Feeders

Just what grade of cattle to select for the feed lot is a problem that must be considered in every feeder. There are a number of seasonal factors to be kept in mind in this connection. Common cattle are generally lowest in price in October and November during the time of large runs of cattle from the range. Choice finished cattle are usually higher in price than at any other time of the year because there are ordinarily very few grain fed steers at this time. Because most of the corn fed cattle are fattened during the winter and sold in the spring, the price of choice steers is lowest in April and May. Common steers, on the other hand, bring the highest price of the year during May.

If It's Job Work—We Do It

FALL MILLINERY CONFIRMS VOGUE OF SMALL TYPES



PARIS modistes are still loyal to the little cling-tight shapes—and so are we in America. The skullcaps and toques in the autumn millinery collections are indulging in all sorts of whimsical notions which add to their allurements. Most of the new snug hats exploit the earlap effect, if not on both sides, at least on one.

There is every evidence of a wide use of ornaments, and feather fancies will no doubt capture the mode before the season is far advanced. Even now buckle pads and little wings are used insistently—quills also.

The newer felts have a lustrous, satiny finish with long nap. These are very aptly called soleil felts. There are as many velvet as felt hats among early models. Quite a few models are of velvet and felt in composite.

A representative group of snug-fitting hats is presented in the illustration as follows:

The first hat is black felt with a tiny excuse of a brim done in satin. A gold galloon applique emphasizes an earlap trim, which repeats at the opposite side.

A skullcap with a flare which bridges the top of the hat is illustrated to the right at the top. It, too, is of felt in the new cocoa shade. It stresses the fashionable buckle-trim.

Black stitched suede felt is smartly designed in a unique shape shown to the left, below. It displays a hand-

some ornament such as are in such active use this season.

To the right, below, the shape is felt with cut-out leaves, revealing a velvet background. Rhinestone ornaments add a decided touch of smartness.

An ingenious handling of felt with velvet is featured in the little cling-tight hat shown last. The felt is slashed just large enough to let a tab of the same slip through.

Tiny cloches which cling to the head like a cap are made entirely of shirred velvet. Sometimes an enormous choux of the velvet is placed at one side. Then again the silhouette is not disturbed by any trimming, a sparkling ornament being the only adornment.

Milliners are also producing very fascinating effects by using velvet and felt together. Sometimes velvet in the form of drapes and choux trim the felt helmet or toque, or vice versa. A very effective working of the two together is achieved by fancifully designing the belt in cutout by patterning, which makes a fine showing against the velvet background.

Pyrography, done with a heated needle as on leather, is a new development which is producing wondrous effects on felt hats. Often the felt takes on, under this process, the aspect of tooled leather.

RANGER WILL ENTERTAIN MANY THOUSANDS OCT 21-22.



Ranger, Texas, "the city of flowing gold," where frenzied thousands made fortunes in the mud and rush of the great oil boom invites back to her portals, all those who were there in those stirring days, for a great Homecoming Oil Jubilee, Oct. 21-22, 1927 celebrating the tenth anniversary of the discovery of oil in Eastland County. United States Senators, Congressmen, Gover Moody and famous oil men will be there. Free barbecue, speeches, men renowned in petroleum and statesmanship, Eastland, Ranger, conference football game, big parade with decorated floats, air circus, free vaudeville, carnivals, dances, fiddlers' contest and free boxing exhibitions these are on the program. Fifty thousand visitors are expected. In the pictures, part of the Ranger business district today is shown; the "gusher" is the discovery well in a new pool that has produced several hundred thousand dollars worth of oil; and Jno. M. Gholson, general chairman of the Jubilee.

Whole milk should be fed to calves at the rate of from 8 to 12 pounds daily, depending on their size and condition of thrift. For the first few feedings the calf should have its mother's milk, and should be fed 3 times daily, at regular intervals. Skim milk can be gradually substituted for whole milk at the rate of one pound daily beginning with the third week,

providing the calves are vigorous and healthy. At this time the total amount can also be increased from 2 to 4 pounds daily, unless the milk is carefully weighed at each change of feeding and the amount definitely known, there is danger of overfeeding. All milk should be fed at an even temperature of about 90° in clean pails and at regular hours.

Chinese Elms Recommended For Shade

For shade or a windbreak, the Chinese elm has proved its value in most sections of the United States. The United States Department of Agriculture introduced this tree nearly 20 years ago and it has been growing in popularity ever since. The Department recommends it as useful and suitable for many climates. The Chinese Elm is especially valuable in regions where the rainfall is light and where there are wide extremes of heat and cold—in places where few trees thrive, in other words. Trials show that the Chins elm grows even more rapidly in the relatively dry area of the middle West than in the moister regions of the Atlantic coast.

Remember how fashion once frowned upon fabrics which imitated fur? Well, time brings changes. One of the notable changes wrought in the realm of the mode is the indorsement which stylists are this season accord to materials which look like fur but are not.

Even the better houses are espousing the cause of the fur-fabric coat at present. It really requires little or no persuasion to convert even the most skeptical to the idea of these handsome coats. They speak for themselves in their "snappy" styling and general attractiveness.

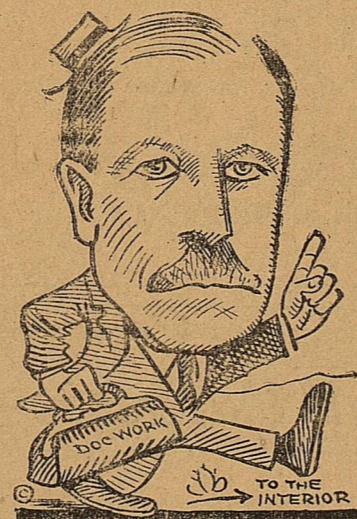

Cooking Chats with 6 Famous Cooks

"CORNED BEEF AND—"

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of interesting cooking articles by 6 famous cooks running exclusively in this paper.)

If the way to a man's heart is through his stomach, surely one of the easiest ways is to serve him corned beef and cabbage.

That holds true for pretty nearly every man, except, of course, the dyspeptic, who is always hard to suit.

Corned beef and cabbage is nowhere more deliciously cooked than in New England, where, with a few additional vegetables, it makes its appearance as the "boiled dinner."

What Flavor!
"And the boiled dinner enthusiast will tell you how excellent the blended flavors are," says Miss Lucy G. Allen, head of the Boston School of Cookery. "I delight in the boiled dinner of corned beef with cabbage, beets, turnips, potatoes, and carrots or parsnips. All but the beets I cook in the same kettle."

Allow ample time for cooking the corned beef, Miss Allen cautions. It should be started at least two or three hours before the vegetables are added. If, by chance, it becomes tender before the vegetables, it can be removed from the fire and reheated before serving.

How to Buy
Very often you can get a more tender piece of meat if you buy a fresh beef brisket. Ask the butcher to rub in coarse salt and keep it a day or two. Sometimes the fibers of meat kept too long in brine get hardened.

Use a very large kettle. Put in the meat, cover with boiling water. If the corned beef has been soaking long in brine, start cooking it in cold water.

Let the meat boil for five minutes, then reduce the heat and let it cook slowly for two or three hours.

Add the Vegetables
Add cabbage which has been washed and cut into quarters. Then add peeled turnips, whole if small, diced if large, and the carrots or parsnips cut into two-inch lengths. Scrub beets thoroughly, and put in separate kettle, covered with boiling water.

Half an hour before serving add peeled potatoes to the large kettle. The success of the dinner depends upon having each article perfectly done, but not overdone.

To Serve
In New England this dinner is usually served by placing the meat in the center of a large platter, and grouping all the vegetables except the cabbage around the meat. The cabbage is so bulky that it is best to serve it in a separate dish.

Truly this is a most delicious meal. A fitting dessert is a custard or a rice pudding, as these are not too hearty to serve with this substantial meal.

stoves are lighted so quickly that much time is saved. And the long-chimney burner oil stoves cook food so thoroughly, too.

Golden Gate Custard
This is a recipe contributed by Mrs. Belle DeGraf, home economics counselor, San Francisco.

1 cup sifted bread crumbs
1 cup milk
1 cup orange rind
3 eggs separated
1/2 cup sugar

Add the grated rind of one orange to the juice. Use soft bread crumbs. Sift through coarse strainer. Add milk and orange juice. Beat eggs separately. Add sugar to yolks and then add to custard. Mix well. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour in a pudding dish. Set dish in pan of hot water, and bake until firm in center. This takes about 30 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees).

Rice Pudding
From Mrs. Kate B. Vaughn, director of the household economics department of the Los Angeles Evening Express, comes the recipe for rice pudding and hard sauce.

1/2 cup rice
6 cups water
2 cups milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon gelatine
1/4 cup cold water

Add rice slowly to boiling water. Boil until tender, 20 minutes, then drain. Heat milk in double boiler. Add egg yolk, sugar and salt, and cook until thick. Add rice, and the last minute before removing from stove, add the gelatine softened in the cold water. Stir thoroughly. Fold in stiffly beaten egg white, and set in a large pan of ice water to cool.

Make the hard sauce by creaming and stirring together 3 tablespoons of butter, 1 egg white, 2 tablespoons of lemon juice, 2 1/2 cups of powdered sugar and any desired flavoring.

Try "corned beef and—" soon. It's sure to be welcomed by the men in your family.

TEXAS AND TEXANS By Will H. Hayes

They Like the Feature
Two editors who use "Texas and Texans" regularly, prompted perhaps by a recent paragraph headed "Make Them Feel Good," wrote me this week to say that they had their readers like the column and it is doing much to keep Texas people appreciative of our great State and its wonderful resources, or words to that effect. Two citizens of Austin stopped me on the street and said they were regular readers of the articles and liked them. One said he saw them in the Jasper News-Boy and the other was a reader of the Hereford Brand, widely separated publications. The most encouraging statement made to me in a long while came from a Brazos county citizen who wrote that if only half the newspapers in Texas would run the articles regularly they would do Texas more good than any publicity that could be bought, whatever the price. Words like these make a fellow want to do his level best at whatever he is doing. Editors need such

encouragement, too. Help them along.

Temple Making Desks

Temple seems determined to become a manufacturing city. For years one of the largest candy and chewing gum factories in the State has been in operation there. Not long ago a Temple Company began building airplanes, the first of the kind in Texas. A building is now being constructed there to house a school desk factory and in a short time it expects to be turning out 10,000 desks annually, with facilities for increasing the output to meet the demand. That is the spirit that has built up a lively city on the prairies of Bell County, with no other advantages noticeable than good railroad shipping facilities. The same kind of enterprise can build a city anywhere. All depends on the people and Temple has the right kind.

Big Basket Plant

Speaking of factories and people, reminds me that I saw a statement recently that Pittsburg, in Camp Co. a place that has never tried especially to extol itself, has a factory that has been manufacturing baskets, crates, and hampers for 25 years, and that it is this year turning them out at the rate of 3,000,000 a year. Most of its products is fruit and berry crates, potato crates and uses no small part of them in Texas. Pittsburg vegetable baskets, and nearly all of sweet potato business and the Rio Grande Valley draws heavily on the output. The plant employs 160 workmen. It is easy to see that Pittsburg is steadily prosperous.

Junction's Attractiveness

Some pictures of the town and the surrounding country have made me want to see Junction, the prosperous and beautiful county site of Kimble county. The pictures tell just why so many Texans now go to the Junction country for rest and recreation instead of to Colorado and other far away places. There are beauties in Texas of which Texans have not yet learned. The pictures also partly account for the prosperous appearance of the Junction Eagle, one of the best small town weekly papers in Texas. Such a county furnishes the inspiration that makes a fellow want to do his best in whatever he is doing.

Uvalde Builds Parks

The small cities in Texas—at least

some of them—are taking the right steps to insure the future attractiveness as well as the comforts necessary to growing places. Uvalde is among the number that has a park commission with which the citizenship is closely co-operating. The city park is to be improved by a memorial arch in suitable honor of the young men who served in the World War. Another park has been secured in the outskirts of the city, and that is also to be improved. The city that neglects to provide and care for parks shows that it is not interested in its appearance, and this at once becomes obvious to all visitors.

Zapata's Court Record

If you have been thinking of the border counties of Texas as sections where crime runs rampant, you have "another thought coming." For the second time in 20 years the district court of the county has had a felony case on its docket and such a thing is so unusual that on the invitation of the district judge, the public school children attended court in a body as an object to civil government. Can you beat it?

College Spreading Out

The West Texas State Teachers' College at Canyon has acquired 200 acres of land adjoining the present campus to be used for "farm and stock demonstration purposes and otherwise to relieve the congested campus." The constant spreading out of the grounds of Texas schools is in keeping with the increase in interest in education throughout the State. When the Canyon School was established there were some pessimists who argued that it would never have any students "way up yonder on the edge of nowhar."

County Hospitals

Scurry county, of which Snyder is the county seat, is to hold an election soon to determine whether the county shall vote an \$80,000 bond issue to build a county sanitarium. Indications as they should be, are that the bonds will be voted by a large majority. Every county owes to its people to provide adequate hospital facilities at a reasonable charge. In our enthusiasm for providing schools and roads we are too much inclined to overlook the needs of the sick.

Hill County Roads

Real county in the Texas Hill country, has started a movement of better roads. Edwards County, which adjoins Real, is also feeling the isolation because of the lack of roads. That part of Texas is one of the most beautiful sections of the state, but thousands of tourists avoid it every year because the roads are bad and at times almost impassable. However attractive a country may be, automobilists will pass it up for the less desirable spots that have good roads. This is as true of the hilly sections of West Texas as of the sandy lands of East Texas.

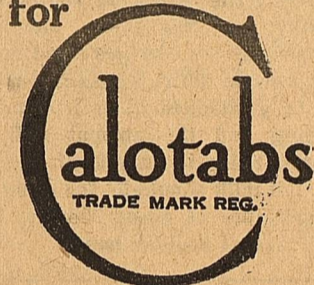
Brownsville Irrigation Project

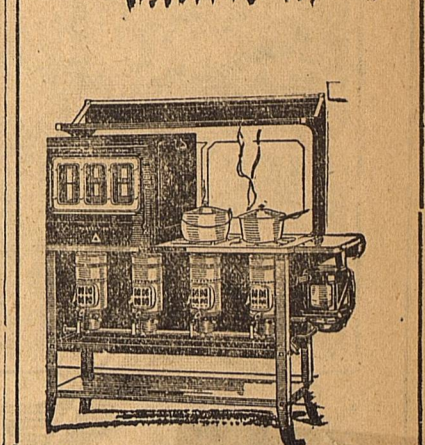

OIL PIPE LINES

Few people realize the heavy investment involved in the laying and maintaining of oil pipe lines. Millions of dollars have been invested in West Texas during the past few months for oil pipe lines alone. These systems, even though costly, provide the most practical method of transporting oil from the producing wells to the storage tanks and then to refineries where it is turned into gasoline, kerosene, Naptha, Asphalt, etc.

Pipe lines, like railroads, have trunk lines, gathering lines, feeders, terminals, storage yards, switching systems, pumping stations, dispatchers, telegraph and telephone lines.

The pipe, which is from four to 12 inches in diameter, is laid below plow depth, or about eighteen inches under the ground, and there are booster stations at intervals of from twenty-five to thirty miles, or often farther, to force the oil through the lines. An eight inch line is capable of carrying about 21,000 barrels per day.

Two trunk lines lead out from Midland, that of the Gulf Pipe Line Co. from Midland to Ranger being now in operation; and that of the Magnolia Petroleum Company from Midland to DeLeon being under construction.

Pipe lines lead to Midland from the Gulf McElroy field and the University field, and a survey has been made by the Atlantic Oil Producing Company for a pipe line from the Winkler County field to their tank farm east of Midland.

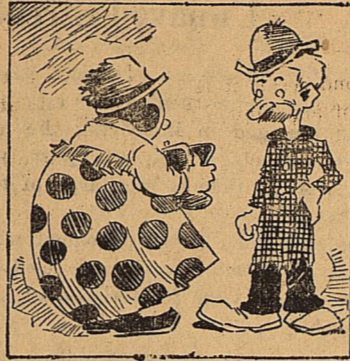

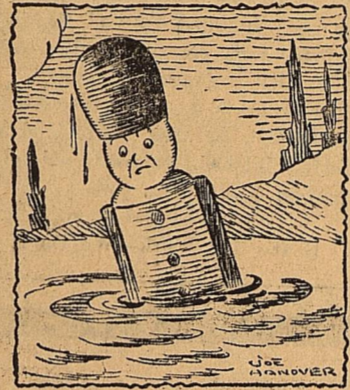

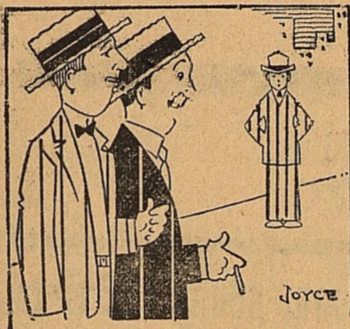

**MIDLAND vs ODESSA
ODESSA vs MIDLAND**

We have often wondered if it is possible to think of anything without making a comparison and we have further wondered if doing so is an unavoidable mental trait, or if it is a form of envy that could be eliminated. If strict attention were given to fairness. It appears to be a difficult matter to decide. Suppose we think of the Yankee's! Immediately there comes

to the mind the urge to place them higher up the baseball ladder than the Pittsburg's. This is by way of being an example of what I mean. Try anything else and the result is likely to be the same. Still it must be possible to train the mind to be fully and fairly fair while making a comparison and it must also be possible to make comparisons without disparagement to either side. Suppose we try that angle and use Midland and Odessa as the object for discussion. We went to Odessa last night, more to get the ride and the air than because we had any very high regard for the town. To be honest about it we have said things in our immaturity about

Odessa that were not complimentary. Thinking it over we find that we were unfair to ourselves and unfair to Odessa. Conversely we have an acquaintance there who has said the same about Midland. If we wished to drop into the vernacular we could easily say that was a fifty-fifty split but the situation is too serious for that. There are in both places progressive and reliable business men who are working for the advancement

of the entire community and it is doubtful if they in any way sponsor the comparison idea to the detriment of the other. It may be said without fear of successful contradiction that it is the climbers who are responsible for the feeling of questionable comparisons. By climbers

we mean those who have little responsibility as a background in their activities be it social or financial, and these should be completely disregarded. We have an idea

that what we are saying can easily be construed into an attempt to curry favor on one side or the other but that is not true for we have only a scattering acquaintance in both places and it would not profit us to show a preference for either and in truth we are in the position of one looking on from the outside. We do observe that the serious men of both places such as Ulmer of the First National, Wilkinson of the Midland National, Bates of

the Odessa bank, the Scharbauer's and Elliott's spend their time attending to their own affairs with the abilities that bring success in any section regardless of what other sections may be doing and this should be true of the entire population in Midland and Odessa. Clarence Scharbauer voiced a bit of pertinent wisdom when he said in a discussion with a number of business

men, "Gentlemen, Odessa is a good town and so is Midland, and the best thing we can do is to attend to our affairs and not interfere with Odessa while she is attending to hers, and also, to be sincerely glad if she succeeds in her attempts to become a prominent business city. There is entirely too much talk about what Midland does that Odessa doesn't, and what Odessa does that

Midland doesn't." Now that is what we mean boiled down to an understandable basis. We will both get along better and make more progress if we treat our efforts as a community matter rather than as a race for supremacy. Permit the feelings of envy to expend themselves in the rivalry between our base-ball nines and foot-ball teams and orators, if you please, but let both towns so conduct themselves that the rest of the world that takes time to look us over might say in full truth "Now there are two fine places, Midland and Odessa. They're both all right."

Lesson for October 16

ELIJAH IN NABOTH'S VINEYARD

LESSON TEXT—1 Kings 21.
GOLDEN TEXT—Be sure your sin
find you out.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Elijah's Message
to a Wicked King.
JUNIOR TOPIC—The Wages of Sin.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—The Rebuke of Wrong.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Opposing Official Corruption.

1. Ahab Covets Naboth's Vineyard (v. 1-6).

1. Location of the vineyard (v. 1). It joined Ahab's summer home in Jezreel. He wanted to transform it into an herb garden and thus round out his property.

2. Ahab's proposal (v. 2). He offered to buy it outright for money, or give in exchange a better one.

3. Naboth's refusal (v. 3). He had a twofold reason: (1) regard for the paternal estate; (2) obedience to God's law (Lev. 25:23-28, cf. Num. 36:7-9). It doubtless would have been profitable to Naboth to have sold his vineyard, but loyalty to God was more important to him than money.

4. Ahab's behavior (v. 4). He came into his house, lay down upon his bed and refused to eat. The king was sulking like a spoiled child.

5. Jezebel's inquiry (v. 5, 6). Apparently she came with the sympathy of a wife, inquiring as to the cause of his behavior. But when she knew of Naboth's refusal she was angry.

1. Ahab Taking Possession of Naboth's Vineyard (vv. 7-16).

1. Jezebel's treachery (vv. 7-15).
(1) Her contemptuous question (v. 7). She taunted him for his cowardice. The fear of being thought weak moves a weak man quickly. Scorn is a powerful weapon in the hands of unscrupulous persons.

(2) Her exhortation to Ahab (v. 7). "Arise and eat bread, and let thine heart be merry." A wife has great influence over her husband. Many a man has been saved from discouragement and therefore defeat through his wife's influence. Unfortunately in this case the influence of the wife was bad.

(3) Her promise to Ahab (v. 7). "I will give thee the vineyard of Naboth."

(4) Her wicked scheme (vv. 8-15). She wrote letters in Ahab's name, sealed them with his seal, and sent them to the elders and nobles who were dwelling in the city with Naboth, asking them to proclaim a fast, as though some great calamity had befallen the nation, and place Naboth before the public as the one who was the cause of it all. They were instructed to find two false witnesses who would testify against Naboth. The charge they brought was blasphemy against God and the king. Naboth's only offense was his refusal to sell his estate. When they had thus stoned Naboth and his sons to death (2 Kings 9:26), they came and told Jezebel, who in turn came to Ahab with the information and directed him to take possession of the vineyard. It was the custom for the property of those who were condemned to death for blasphemy to revert to the king.

2. Ahab goes to Jezreel to take possession of Naboth's vineyard (v. 16). Ahab had not killed Naboth, but he eagerly accepted the prize without inquiring as to how it was secured. Many today are like Ahab, too cowardly to commit wrong themselves, but are willing to reap the benefits of the wrongdoing of others.

III. Elijah in Naboth's Vineyard, Announcing Doom Upon Ahab (vv. 17-26).

Elijah told him the dogs should lick his blood in the place where they licked the blood of Naboth. It would seem that Naboth's body was thrown out to be devoured by the dogs. Evil was to fall upon Ahab and his posterity, even to wipe out his seed and name. Ahab stood in that vineyard guilty of all the sins which Jezebel had committed, though he had been silent and inactive. God held him responsible for Jezebel's acts, for he was king and head of the nation. The day of reckoning did come to Ahab (1 Kings 22:33). Ahab's question to Elijah when confronted by him in the vineyard showed that his conscience was not wholly dead.

2. Doom upon Jezebel (vv. 23-26). She likewise should be eaten by the dogs by the wall of Jezreel. This was literally fulfilled (2 Kings 9:33-37): "Be sure your sin will find you out;" "Whatever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."

IV. Ahab's Repentance (vv. 27-29). Because of this God promised to withhold judgment during his lifetime.

JOURNALISM IS POPULAR COURSE

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 12.—Enrollment in classes in journalism at the University of Texas has seen nearly 100 per cent increase over last year, according to Paul J. Thompson, chairman of the department. The most significant thing about the increase according to Professor Thompson, is that the greatest increase has been in the enrollment in the news gathering and reporting class which is a required first course to be taken by students in journalism. The large enrollment in this beginning class points to an increased enrollment in all journalism classes next year, according to Mr. Thompson.

The increased enrollment for courses in journalism in the University can be accounted for by the favorable attention given to the reinstatement of the department with the opening of this year and the agreement of the department with The Daily Texan, the campus newspaper, whereby the class in news gathering and reporting collects news for that publication, said Mr. Thompson.

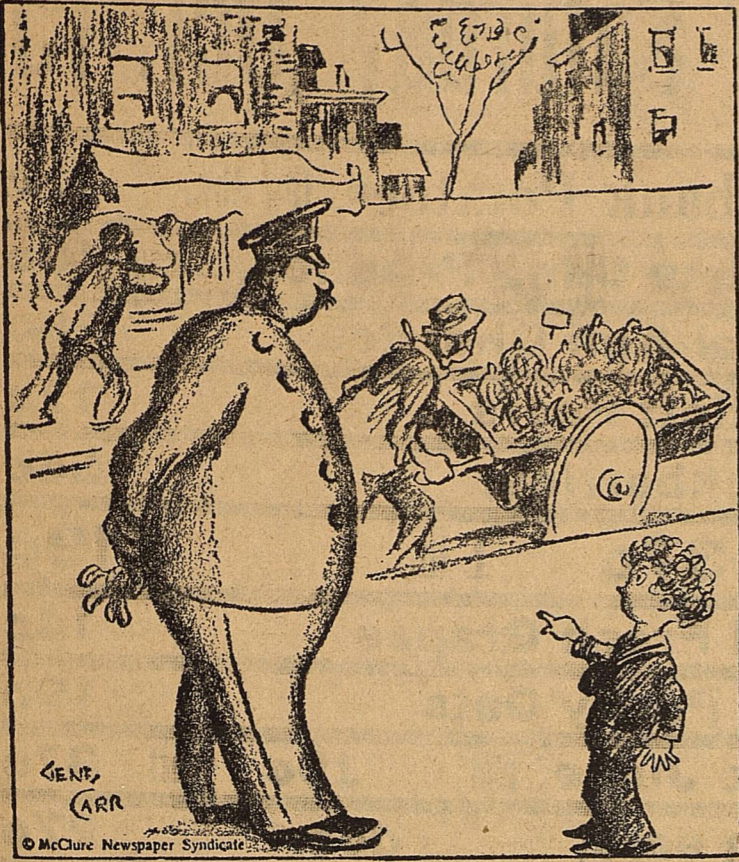

Big Oil Play For Eastern New Mexico

Southeastern Lea County, it is generally understood, is due for an extensive play during the coming winter. 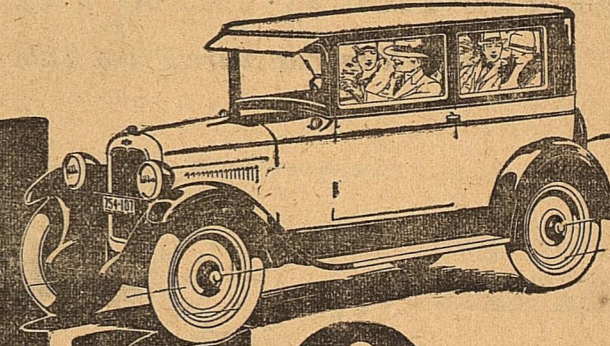

Mrs. Jack Hazeltine won high score trophy and Mrs. E. M. Henderson was awarded low score prize. These gifts were presented to the honoree.

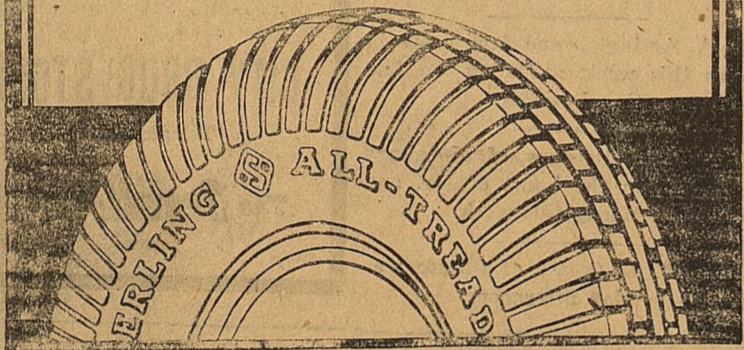

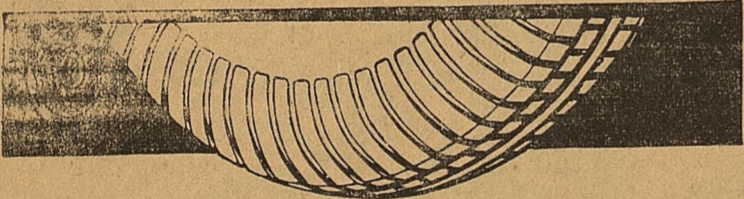
