KEEPING WORK STOCK IN CONDITION

As a rule, horses and mules get too much hay when they are working hard, especially in warm weather, and green feed is also detrimental rather than beneficial to a hard working horse or mule. All the hay and green grass he will eat are good for an idle horse or mule, but when the animal is working the hay should be limited and the green feed cut out entirely. A working horse or mule should get from 3-4 to 1 pound of hay for every 100 pounds of his weight, and the smaller amount is better, if enough grain is fed. All of this limited quantity of hay should be given at the night feed, especially to an animal that is inclined to eat too much hay or that suffer from scours or too great looseness of the bowels when first put to work in the morning. With every five or six pounds of corn or sorghum grain fed should be given one pound of cottonseed meal, when the animal does not receive some legume hay like soybeans, cowpeas, alfalfa, clover, or lespedeza.

Of course, oats are excellent for horses, but their price is usually too high in the South. Corn and cottonseed meal are usually cheaper and just as good or better, when grass hay is used.

If the animal is getting full feed and his condition is not as good as it

should be, considering the amount of work done, then the feed should be reduced for a time at least. If the appetite is not good, the best aid to the appetite is regular moderate exercise, a much smaller quantity, of feed. The feed should be reduced to off his feed, reduce the work and the feed. The feed should be reduced to almost nothing for 24 hours, and then the animal should only be given, say, half what he would eat, for another day or two, and then the amount increased slowly to a full feed again.

Dry, comfortable stables, stalls or sheds, regular grooming, and regular feeding on a variety of feeds that will give a balanced ration are the best conditioners, but, of course, the work must be within the ability of the animal to perform without too great exhaustion.

A mixture of equal parts of salt and wood ashes should always be kept before horses and mules, and, of course, they should receive water regularly and as frequently as practicable.—Tait Butler, in The Progressive Farmer.

ROMANTIC BUSINESS

Romance in business still lives. It may be drab to balance ledgers, arrange stock, dust counters, trim windows or look after files, but there is the other side of trade which, though little known, is as romantic and picturesque as a Marco Polo could wish for.

It's more exciting than a blood-and-thunder novel, this business of scouting for rare rugs, says C. A. Bigelow, a Chicago business man back in the United States after eighteen months in the out-of-the-way places in the Orient. During this period, as the representative of Marshall Field & Company, wholesale interested in rug research, he covered 40,000 miles by camel, donkey and automobile.

In India, where nomads turn from the driving of their flocks and weaving of rugs to banditry at night, this trade pioneer was in constant peril of shots from the snipers' guns. Even the soldiers, he says, were not safe from the bandits. The soldiers have their guns handcuffed to them but when taking a respite from their vigil, the bandits creep upon them and steal the guns by deftly removing the handcuffs. In crossing the Sind desert, Bigelow was in constant danger, not only of the bandits' bullets but the stings of scorpions and tarantellas as well. For weeks at a time, during his travels among the Hindus, he went without water, quenching his thirst only by the juice of fruits. Only a few days before his coming, he was told in one place, a convoy had been attacked by bandits and an Englishman slain.

It was in Persia that Bigelow had to comply with the peculiar customs of the people to keep in their good graces. At Ghourveh he was invited to take luncheon with Amir Afghan, a relative of the Shah and ruler of forty villages. Seated on the floor, with legs crossed in true Persian fashion, he ate a fifty course luncheon with his fingers. Persians never use knives, forks or spoons, he was told, because they believe that it is just as important to "feel" the food as to taste it.

On another occasion the Sardar Sepah, premier of Persia, took tea with Bigelow in his tent outside of Sultanbad. To comply with the customs of the people, Bigelow slaughtered a dozen lambs upon the arrival of the distinguished guest and scattered the blood over the ground. Before entering the tent Sardar Sepah touched the tip of his boot in the blood to indicate that he was bringing with him peace and happiness. The slain lambs were given to the poor.

REDUCING GARDEN LABOR BY HALF

It is not the hard work of the hoe in the garden that we object to most, but the slow work. It takes such a long time to do such a little job. If we could find some way to do this garden work in half the time it has been taking, then we could easily work a garden double the size of the one we have, or we could do the work in one-half the time required for getting over the garden we now have. Not only this, but we could do the work more promptly and when it is most in need of being done, and we could do it before the weeds start or a crust is formed.

Well, there is a way to do just these things, a way that we have found to double the pleasure of working in the garden and reducing the labor by half, some times even three-fourths. Of course, we refer to the garden wheel hoe or garden push plow, as some of us call it. This implement will do the work it is intended to do almost as fast as one can walk and do it better than any way we know of where horsepower is not used. In actual trials in which we noted the time required, it was found that four rows can be worked with the garden wheel hoe while one is being worked with the old cotton hoe. Of course, some hand weeding will be necessary at times, but even this can be so reduced when we make our rows parallel and narrow, that it is only a small item.—The Progressive Farmer.

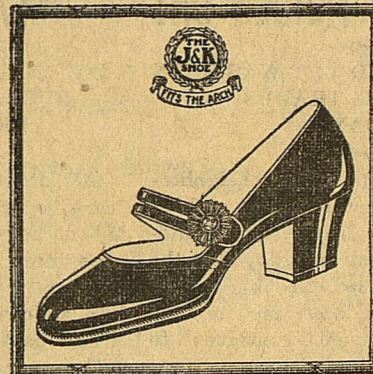
