Date For Court House Bond Election To Be September 17

## **AMOUNT OF WARRANTS TO SUPPLEMENT BONDS** ISSUED\_WILL BE KNOWN

'As Soon As Estimates and Plans Are Completed, Total Cost of New Building Will Be Announced

Date of the bond election for a new court house, set Tuesday afternoon by the Commissioners Court of Midland County, was designated as September 17; and proceedings are going forward to hold the election on that have come here within the next few Tuesday. days.

Although, as announced yesterday, the bonds to be vot-ed are for \$150,000, warrants for additional funds will be issued by the commissioners. This is explained by county officials as being necessary on account of the fact that the tax valuation in Midland County is taken at 25 per cent of the actual value of property, and the law limits issues to two per cent of the tax valuation.





Charges of murder will be filed this afternoon against King Reed, former chief of police, by District Attorney, W. R. Smith. A warrant for his arrest will be issued immediately afterward. It is expected that Reed will waive examining trial. The case, in that event, would come up in district court session, which begins September 2.

Reed, lying on his bed at the Thomas hospital, is charg ed with killing J. C. Holcombe, night watchman, with a gun, on or about the date of July 21. The two men met at the intersection of East Wall and South Baird streets. One eyewitness, Bill Chilton, was present when the shots rang out, Holcombe fell pierced by a bullet through the





As soon as the county tax assessor's roll is approved, and all hearings on tax values are completed, the exact manner in which the proposed bonds and warrants will affect the taxes of each tax payer will be made public. These figures will assist each voter in determining how the new court house will be paid for.
