

#### HALEY GATHERING HISTORICAL DATA

TOURING PLAINS IN THE IN TEREST OF SECURING HISTORY

Evetts Haley, field representative of the Panhandle Plains Historical Society, was in Midland the first of the week combining a visit home with his work collecting data to go into history of the Panhandle and Plains country.

He states that he is meeting with success and is gathering many interesting things. Following is a description of the organization which he represents:

The Panhandle Plains Historical Society was organized in 1921 for the express purpose of preserving the historical data and relics of the Panhandle and Plains country. It is gathering data relative to the development of this country, from the times of the Indians on up to the present day. Its museum serves to give a better appreciation of pioneer days, and a closer insight into the living conditions of the early builders of the West.

The historical data, old newspapers documents,, and accounts of personal experiences which are being collected, will be of great assistance to future history students who may choose the Southwest as their field.

The society is bending every effort to collect all data that has any bearing upon the development of the country, in order that a history of the Panhandle may be written. Prof. L. F. Sheffy, head of the History Department of West Texas State Teachers College, with the help of other members of that department, will compile this work. This history will be as accurate and comprehensive as it is possible to make it.

The field of this organization is not restricted to one small locality, but it is working for the best interests of this entire section of the state. It cooperates with every other organization of a like nature, wherever this is possible.

On June 27, 1924, the fifteenth anniversary of the Adobe Walls Fight, the society sponsored the marking of that historic old spot with an appropriate monument.

#### Big Spring School Taxes To Be Raised

According to an article in last week's Big Spring Herald, the school taxes are now insufficient to operate the school on the present expense, and they are carrying over a deficit of \$10,000 from last year.

They state that the valuations must be increased thirty per cent in order to raise the necessary funds, a raise of ten per cent having been made last year.

#### Good Rains Fell Last Friday Night

One of the best general rains that have struck the Midland country in a long time fell last Friday night, and it extended for many miles in every direction. It was especially beneficial in the country northwest of here, as showers had been light out that way before. From the Ratliff and Bedford country, Andrews Fasken, the C ranch, the Cummins and Cole ranches, and practically every section of the country, there came reports of good rains, starting grass on country that had been dry for some time.

#### Making Fight On Foot and Mouth Outbreak

The second outbreak of foot and mouth disease in the State of Texas within ten months was confirmed on July 29 on the same premises, 20 miles southeast of Houston, where the steps were taken by the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture and the State Authorities to eradicate the infection and up to the present time only one other infected herd has been found

Even before a definite diagnosis had been made, the Bureau of Animal Industry and the State Livestock Sanitary Board had a force of experienced men assembled so that there was no delay in handling the situation. The infected herd, consisted of 96 cattle, was slaughtered and burned on July 31, and on the same data a quarantine order was issued by the Secretary of Agriculture for the protection of Livestock and other interests. This order placed under quarntine a large portion of Harris County. The second infected herd, discovered on August 5, was within this quarantine area and consisted of only 18 head of cattle. The short course comes at a time when most farmers are not so busy but that they might "take out" long enough to spend a few days studying enough to their business.

Making Farming a Business. The small number of adult farmers at the college indicates that too much of the farming in Texs is don in a hap-hazard way—that too little real study is put into it.
