Chairmen See No Reason Why Appropriations Bills Cannot Be Completed Without A Special Session

AUSTIN, April 17 (A)—The major appropriation bills probably will be ready for consideration by the legislature next week and with those proposing new revenue, now resting in the senate, will form the chief business before the law-makers.

In the house, the judiciary appropriation bill has been reported from committee, and the education, departmental and electrosynary measures, as well as the rural aid, are in sub-committees which have about completed their work. All except the education and rural aid bills have been reported in the senate.

Tax Action Doubtful As to provisions of new revenue, if any, the course of the legislature

is doubtful to cevryone. The house of representatives has passed several important tax bills, boosting taxes on oil, natural gas, corporation franchises and sulphur, but the senate has delayed action on all.

As the week ended, it was embroiled in arguments over submis sion of a constitutional amendment authorizing a sales tax to pay the cost of all Texas' social security program, and whether higher taxes on natural resources should be substituted for the sales levy. The de-bate will be resumed next week.

One view is that the senate will pass no new tax bill unless it can persuade the house to submit the proposition of a sales tax to a vote of the people. Another is that the appropriation bills' completed, the senate will add up the total, estimale whether how manay is need-ed and then distribute a little tax here and there, probably acting on the bills passed by the house but reducing the rates.







Sloan said that most of the tills ble land between Wichita Falls, and Keyes was either in wheat or prepared for cotton. He estimated the M-K-T will handle between 4,000 and 5,000 cars of wheat the district, compared to 1,100 last year, and 7,500 in 1931.





It is further understood in connection with this provision that we will procure an agreement in writing from one of the banks of this city or from some other responsible individual satisfactory to the City Commission, that they will, upon the completion of said improvements, purchase said note and lien from the City of Big Spring and pay the City of Big Spring therefor the par value of such note and lien.





# WHEN BIG SPRING WAS FOUNDED

There was a time in the history of this community when only three families lived in what is now Big Spring. It will serve to Illustrate our point if we say they were Mr. and Mrs. Brown and the Smith and Jones families. By trading among themselves these people managed to be happy and prosperous according to the times.

But while Mr. Brown was a communityminded chap with a kindly feeling for his neighbors, he was a little thoughtless.
