

San Saba to Profit From Drouth. It is said that there is full compensation to be found for every adversity if only we will seek it eagerly enough. San Saba, with a great abundance of water going to waste, is suffering from drouth. The people have organized to dam the water and to irrigate the fertile valleys. If their ardor is not dampened by the next good rain, the drouth will prove a great blessing to them. The productiveness of the soil of San Saba county is marvelous when

plenty of water is provided, but as in most other parts of Texas, the rains are seldom seasonable even though plenty may fall during a year. Almost every stream in Texas has numerous places where its waters may be impounded without extraordi nary cost in comparison with the re turns, and we know that we cannot depend on rains to make maximum crops even in the most favorable years, but most places are too shortsighted to vote bonds for irrigation.

Following the Lead of Others.
If San Saba's irrigation project is carried through to completion, it will not be a year before neighboring counties will follow its example. Most people are ready enough to follow the lead of others, but few are progressive enough to initiate movements or to favor them where they have no per sonal knowledge of their operation. This is true as to all kinds of improvements, and applies everywhere. Having seen the great irrigation construction at Wichita Falls, people of Amarillo and surrounding country are now holding meetings to plan even a greater irrigation movement.





This years convention of your Association at Atlantic City will constitute just such an event. The American Bankers Association was organized in 1875 when there were about 3,000 banks in the country, with aggregate capital and surplus of \$850,000,000,000 and deposits below \$2,000,000,000. Today there about 30,000 banks, with capital funds of \$7,000,000,000 and deposits above \$50,000,000,000. More than 22,000 of these banks are members of your association.

The convention signalizing the half century mark will be made the occassion for reviewing the progress of banking and the service of it has endered the people of the United States. A practical token of this will be given the public in the form of a proposed educational foundation to maintain college scholarships in economics and to promote economic research. Banking serves itself best by serving others and the more economic minded it helps our people to become, the firmer it will build the foundations of its own prosperi-

"Another great opportunity will present itself at this convention for rganized banking to render signifcant public service. The present period is particularly opportune to support the administration in its economic program. Such questions as economy in public expenditure and scientific tax revision can be discussed on their intrinsic merits without the confusing factors of campaign partisanship and radical agitation. The public spirited interest of bankers in these questions can now be influentially urged.'
