West Texas News

CROSBYTON—Announcement has been made by J. J. Murphy, Park Supervisor that work will begin this week on the Crosbyton State Park. All conveniences for a modern Tourist Park are also to be installed and the tourists have free access to water wood, etc.

MEMPHIS—Memphis is to have a modern three story hotel, fifty rooms steam heat, running water, baths, elevator service, and all conveniences of an up to date hotel. H. G. Stephens who is letting the contract for this hotel says he expects work to begin by March 1st, 1926.

RALLS—According to an announcement made by Dr. P. W. Horn, President of the Texas Technological College, W. D. Wadkins Jr. of this city is the first to make application and to be accepted as a student in the Texas Tech. Other applications are being received daily and it is expected that Texas Tech will open with an extraordinary large enrollment.

HEREFORD—The biggest Hereford show in the Panhandle will be staged in connection with the Daf Smith County Fair, September 18-19. More than twenty Hereford breeders have been invited to take part in this show. The Hereford breeders are asking for no money as prizes. Only blue ribbons will be given as premiums because the big breeders here volunteered to enter the show rings just to let the world know what the breeders have here in the Hereford line.

LAMESA—The West Texas Electric Company has recently closed a deal with the City of Lamesa taking over all the light equipment and two hundred and fifty new lights will be installed in the very near future. About

twenty light posts will be around the square which will give Lamesa one of the outstanding "White Ways" in West Texas.

DEL RIO—A. W. Ewing of Duncan Oklahoma has been elected secretary of the Del Rio Chamber of Commerce and according to information received by E. K. Adams, President, Mr. Ewing has accepted the place. He will take up his duties here in a few days and expects to put over a big civic program for Del Rio and that territory.

BIG SPRING—The Big Spring Veterinary Hospital is the name of the latest institution for that city. Dr. O. E. Wolfe, surgeon is now having a building erected which will be occupied by this institution. The building will be a stucco structure, 24x40 feet and modernly equipped thru out.

CLYDE—J. N. Watts of this city is making arrangements to locate a plow factory here. Mr. Watts has invented a cultivator attachment which has proved to be of much value to the farmers and he has made arrangements to finance the manufacture of his invention and in connection with this will operate the new plow factory.

EL DORADO—A permanent Fair Association for El Dorado was organized this week at a mass meeting of the citizens. The following officers were elected who will serve as the directors: Geo. Williams, Tom R. Henderson, Lon L. Hoover, J. E. Hill, E. C. Hill, T. K. Jones and O. K. Enochs. El Dorado will have a fair this fall but the dates have not been announced yet.

CHILDRESS—The Hays lumber Company of Cotton Valley, La. have established headquarters in Childress for the South Plains territory. Construction will begin immediately on the yards and the approximate cost will be \$5,000. C. G. Cleery will have charge of this office.

Vegetables To Get Prizes At Exhibit

A new division has been added to the one day show to be held in Midland Sept. 17 for the farmers of this county. It will be known as the vegetable department.

The Chamber of Commerce is offering a prize of \$1 for the display of the biggest and best variety of vegetables. The number of different vegetables entered as well as their quality will count. The winner of second place will receive 50 cents. The prizes are small and are offered merely as a slight added inducement in helping collect the exhibits for the Dallas, Abilene and other fairs.

Included in the vegetables display are all ordinary garden vegetables, and watermelons, pumpkins, kershaws, potatoes etc will be included as vegetables.

Stanton High Line Work Progressing

All poles for the electric high line from Midland to Stanton are up, and the insulators are on.

The crew is now stringing wire, which will require another week or ten days of time.

The line follows the highway to the stock pens, then turns south and follows the lane that goes east by Stokes School. This will connect a big farming section with the power line, as well as supplying the business houses and homes of Stanton.

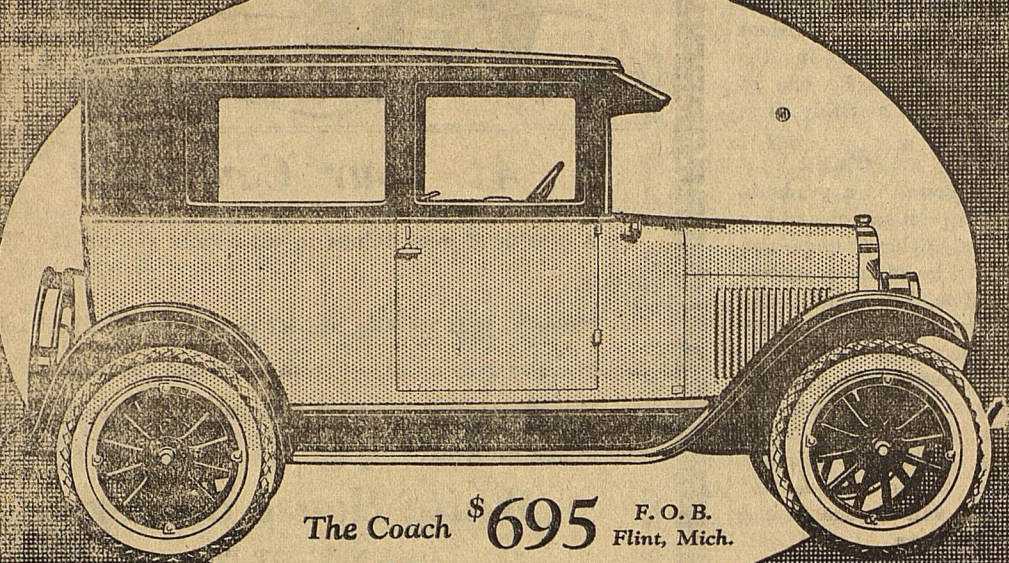

BARNUM WAS RIGHT

Has anyone ever profited by buying merchandise from peddlers? By peddlers, we don't mean those good people who come to town to sell vegetables, fruit, and the products of their own raising; but we refer to the transients who drop off in a town, go from house to house taking orders, get their money and leave.

Peddlers do not pay taxes in a town. They do not support the Chamber of Commerce. They don't help to build good churches and schools. They don't attend funerals, sit up with the sick or help the poor people in the community. Neither do the houses they represent.

As a general rule, the products they sell are inferior, at least when the price is considered; and those who buy from them can probably get a much better product for the same money from the home merchant, or can get the same product for less money.

If you bought something from a peddler, could you take it back to him if it did not prove satisfactory? No, because you wouldn't know where to find him.

One man who would quibble with the home merchant about \$1.50 shirt, paid \$12.50 for two shirts when a peddler came around.

Why did he do it? He just had the idea that there is something magic about buying from a peddler. The peddler lets him believe that he had better buy now, because he (the peddler) won't be back around soon.

Before buying from a peddler, call up the home merchant and give him a chance to show you his wares. Give the man who helps support the community a chance to make his legitimate living.

constructed in its present form.

We have only to leave the highway and travel over some of the roads in counties north of here to fully appreciate the wonderful highway we have.

To be sure, after the rains, those counties grade up the roads and put them in fine shape, but it doesn't last. In muddy weather, low gear is necessary in many instances, where speedy driving can be done on the Bankhead as it is in Midland County, and those counties connected with it.

Good roads are a good investment. Not a motorist of this county would part with the highway, whether he voted for it or against it when the bond issue was presented.

PLANT FALL CROPS

Everyone in the County, or in town, should plant something on their idle acreage or on vacant lots. There are a number of crops, vegetables, and products that will grow in the fall; and these will bring in enough revenue to pay for the trouble and to make the idle land useful.

Consult your County Agent and find out what crops will do best. Pie melons will grow, and they are going to be in demand when it comes time to poison jack rabbits.

Making idle land profitable will do more for the development of this country than probably anything the average citizen can do, and at the same time will benefit the land owner materially.

TIME TO ACT

When the Bankhead Highway Association was organized, a concentrated effort was made to get the counties on the route to vote bond issues, take advantage of the state and federal aid, and build a good road.

This effort has been continued up to the present time, and has accomplished some wonderful results. Many counties have voted splendid

When we ride on the highway through the country, we often forget the status of this road before it was

bond issues, and the state and federal governments have allotted fine sums of money to match those of the county in construction, and have taken over the maintenance.

However, several counties along the route have repeatedly lost bond issues, or have failed to promote them, or have voted bonds and allowed technicalities to prevent the actual construction.

This cripples the value of the highway through the "good counties" to some extent, as tourists must pass through all of them to get across the continent.

Other highway associations are busy trying to divert the tourists over their routes, and the "sleepy" counties on the Bankhead should wake up and act at once, cooperating with the counties that have voted bonds and constructed good roads.

NEW PICTURE SHOW TO OPEN SATURDAY

BUILDING IN READINESS FOR OPENING BUSINESS ON SEPTEMBER 5

Balconies are situated on each side of the operating room, one for negroes and one for Mexicans; and stairs are conveniently located just inside the vestibule.

Exhibit Space Already Assigned to Thirty-One Counties—West Texas Leads in Early Applications.

Although East Texas counties are in larger number than ever before this early, and are admittedly planning big things in an exhibit way, West Texas still leads in the number of reservations already made for display space in the State Fair of Texas Agricultural Show, at Dallas, Oct. 10-25.

Up to August 29, space had been assigned to thirty-one counties, of which seventeen were located in West Texas and five in the eastern portion of the state.

It is expected that a number of Texas railroads will also make comprehensive displays, independent of the exhibits by the counties traversed by their lines. Inquiries have been received from the agricultural departments of several roads, according to Superintendent J. A. Moore of the State Fair Agricultural division.

Counties assigned exhibit space among the thirty-one referred to, include the following: Foard, Donley, Lynn, Lamb, Haskell, Hale, Hartley, Lubbock, Farmer, Crosby, Randall, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Dallas, Floyd, Garza, Midland and Mitchell, in West Texas; Smith, Harrison, Gregg, Henderson, Anderson and Wood in East Texas; Collin, Hill and Eastland in North, Central and West-Central, and Colorado in Southern Texas. Early returns of contracts from Atascosa and Brazoria are expected, and Franklin county has already announced that it will have a big display, in connection with the visit to the State Fair of nearly a thousand of its boy and girl farm club members.

Entries for county exhibits will close Oct. 9 and all exhibits must be in place not later than 10 a. m., Saturday, Oct. 10. Forty-eight county premiums are offered this year, ranging from \$350 for first to \$50 each for the last thirty.

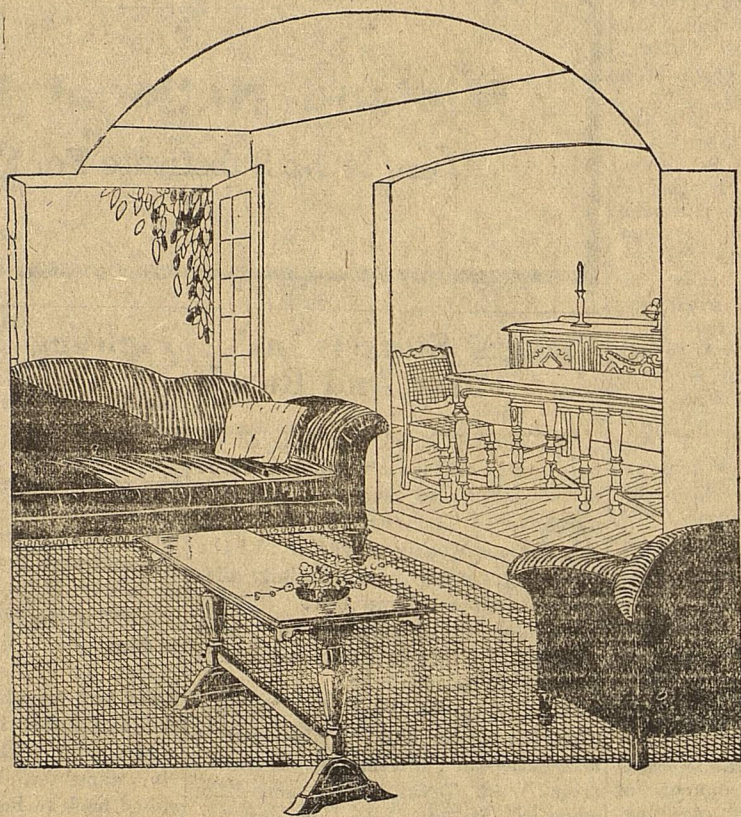

More Fruit Needed For Fair Exhibits

Neal Staten last week brought an exhibit of pears to the Chamber of Commerce which will be used in the Dallas fair and Abilene fair exhibits. Considerable difficulty is being experienced in getting fruits. Two quarts of peaches have been prepared by Mrs. S. H. Gwyn and Mrs. Andy Norwood, but five different varieties of two quarts each are required by the fairs.

Two quarts of apricots, two quarts of pears, two quarts of grapes, two quarts of apples, two quarts of cherries, two quarts of plums or any other fruits are badly needed. So far only one fifth of the fruit needed has been promised.

If some woman will donate this fruit in quart jar sizes, she will be doing a great deal to help boost her county. If so requested the Chamber of Commerce will return this fruit to the owner, and if not requested the fruit will be given to the United Charities in Dallas to feed poor hungry children, when the fair is ended.

LOCAL BANKERS HEAR FROM NATIONAL PRESIDENT

"When a business celebrates its growth from resources of \$3,000,000, 000 to over \$60,000,000,000 in fifty years it certainly is an event of great public significance in American history. This year's convention of your Association at Atlantic City will constitute just such an event. The American Bankers Association was organized in 1875 when there were about 3,000 banks in the country, with aggregate capital and surplus of \$850,000,000,000 and deposits below \$2,000,000,000. Today there are about 30,000 banks, with capital funds of \$7,000,000,000 and deposits above \$50,000,000,000. More than 22,000 of these banks are members of your association.

The convention signifying the half century mark will be made the occasion for reviewing the progress of banking and the service of it has rendered the people of the United States. A practical token of this will be given the public in the form of a proposed educational foundation to maintain college scholarships in economics and to promote economic research. Banking serves itself best by serving others and the more economic minded it helps our people to become, the firmer it will build the foundations of its own prosperity.

"Another great opportunity will present itself at this convention for organized banking to render significant public service. The present period is particularly opportune to support the administration in its economic program. Such questions as economy in public expenditure and scientific tax revision can be discussed on their intrinsic merits without the confusing factors of campaign partisanship and radical agitation. The public spirited interest of bankers in these questions can now be made more clearly understood and influentially urged."

The convention will be held at Atlantic City, New Jersey, September 28 to Oct. 1. General sessions and divisional meetings will be held on the steel pier. The Hotel Traymore will be headquarters, where delegates will register and receive credentials.

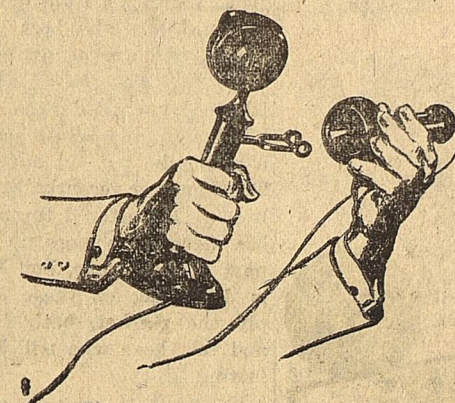

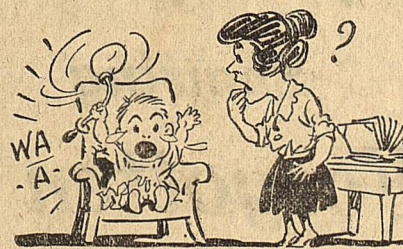


