



Actually the shot is a pitch-and-run but it is nothing like the stroke necessary if you are more than 50 yards from the hole. It is a putt pure and simple, the only movement being with the wrists, the rest of the body being held without the slightest motion, stiff as a wedge if you wish so long as you let the wrists do the work freely. If the ball is lying close in grass an inch long, better try a jigger on account of its, greater loft. You will find that with a moderate amount of practice you can be as certain of holing out in one or two strokes under these conditions as with the putter from half the distance. Then try the mashie with the putting stroke. Without trying for distance, note carefully just how far the ball will loft and how much of a roll it will have. Probably you will find that on an average you can loft the ball 10 or 15 feet, followed by a roll of the same length, by putting with the mashie. Now try the same shot over a sand trap. You can be certain of better results than by using the regular mashie stroke. By putting with the clubs as noted, you can ma-

24-Muscles Must Not Be Tense. Perhaps the worst error, certainly the commonest, in the average golf swing is the tensing or stiffening of the muscles. Much of that stiffness

is in the hands and wrists but by

far the greater part is in the legs.

There is no wish in the above to minimize that co-ordination of muscles With Celebration The Cats are on their way to El are fairly expert with the putter and that culminates in the timing, when the club and ball are in contact. There is the very decided wish, however, to emphasize the fact that tense muscles are not effective muscles when it comes to making the golf swing. With the rest of the swing going properly, there can be no such thing as what is known as "pressing." Until the forward swing is well on its way, there should be no feeling of stiffness and very little of muscular exertion. In the latter half of the forward swing, with everything going right, no harm will be done in using every particle of your available strength. The harm comes in applying muscle too soon; often on the back swing, where there is no need of exertion other than to

lift the club back into the right posi-One of the reasons, then, for a player's staying in the average class is that there is a misapplication of muscular force, oftenest evident in tense muscles. And the worst offenders are the legs. Careful examination of the stroke by going through it slowly is a self-cure for this fault. You do not need a ball nor to be outdoors. After a few practice swings, sole the club and go through the whole swing very slowly. Nine chances in ten you will be able to locate one or more muscles that tense themselves involuntarily. Now begin again with the club soled and relax everywhere, especially the knees. If you can look into a mirror during this relaxation, you may note that the top of your head is a fraction of an inch lower than it was. Now take the club back regularly, keeping the knees relaxed, not bent, and go through the whole swing again. You may locate other tense muscles. If se, try the swing over and over until they are all re-laxed. Gradually increase the speed of the swing with the certainty that there is no tenseness and you have removed the greatest stumbling-block in the way of golf progress.

One must develop a good swing and have an excess of muscular power to get the best results out of the modern golf ball. It is too heavy and too small erage skill. Nearly all women and any man until his golf swing is well along will do better with a larger and lighter ball. Even the floater type is better for these players than the socalled standard ball.

The manufacture of golf balls now has been perfected until all balls on the market must be good. The core must be well and truly wound, must be glued firmly to the cover and the cover itself must be tough, yet thin enough to permit the resiliency of the rubber core to be effective. The markings are a matter of taste. All have been tried out thoroughly before being put to use, and all lend themselves to true flight. As a rule, Americans prefer the dimple marking and the

British prefer mesh marking. British prefer mesh marking,
But while all balls are fairly good,
it will be found there is a considerable
difference between balls out of the same box. Supposedly all of them have been tested for sphericity, but balls not perfectly round sometimes pass the severest test. If the ball is not round it will not roll straight. Also it will not roll straight nor fly straight if its center of gravity is not exactly in the middle. A rough test can be made by rolling the ball with straight overspin on a billiard or other flat table. A ball is round and centered correctly if it does not roll off when it comes almost to rest. An expert will not use a ball that does. If it wabbles at all in play, another ball is put in play at the next tee. On the contrary, if the ball seems to be absolutely true, it may be used for a full round or more. Al Watrous scored a 64 at French Lick. In the previous round he used fourteen balls on the tirst fourteen holes. On the fifteenth the ball worked perfectly. He used it on the remaining four holes and the full eighteen of the record round of 64. A ball which has proved its worth has often been used on more than a aundred holes. There may be a slight loss in resiliency but not enough to be noticed by the average player.

### BANKERS HELP

The banks of Linn County Oregon. are showing more enthusiasm than ever this year in behalf of a county corn exhibit similar to that held last year at the Linn County Fair. Last year's exhibit was the result of a conest for a prize offered by a number of local banks. This was so successful that this year ten out of the eleven banks in the county will subscribe to

The Agricultural Committee of the Alabama Bankers Association has recommended that a scholarship fund be established for the education of worthy young men and women along agricultural and home economics lines. It is estimated that if each bank in the state were to contribute 25 cents per thousand capital, five to six thousand dollars per annum would

The Agricultural Committee of the Oklahoma Bankers Association, in its eport, recommends that the bankers see that a competent agent is appointed in each county and that he has a degree from some agricultural college. They believe that the agricultural possibilities of the state should be better advertised and that each county bankers association should do some work along that line.

Searcy County Bankers Association, Arkansas, entertained as its guests recently some seventy-five farmers and business men. The result was the organization of the North Central Arkansas Agricultural Association. Its purpose will be to co-ordinate the efforts of the farmers and business men in promoting a better agriculture. Searcy County bankers are giving 100 settings of purebred eggs for distribution to the boys' and girls' clubs in the county.

H. S. Mowrer, chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the New Jersey Bankers Association, together with H. J. Baker, director of extension work in the College of Agriculture, made a complete tour of the state this spring, calling on the county agents and agricultural committees of the various county organizations to get a definite line-up on the work done and the plans for the coming year. 



tendance. This shows that both parents and children in Texas are awak-Thousands of parents are making great sacrifices in order that their children may be equipped for better living and better service, and scores of organizations of many kinds are rendering assistance to students who might otherwise have to stay out of school. Say what we will about the frivolity of youth, we must confess that the young people of today are getting a better education than their parents have, and there is every indication that this generation will go far ahead of the last in attainments of every kind. Texas seems deter mined not to stay behind.

Better Roads in Texas

From all sections of Texas the newspapers bring reports of increased interest in road building. A session of the State Highway Commission at Austin now draws nearly as many people as a legislative session. These are petitioners for State aid, highway contractors, and politicians who thought to have some sort of a "pull." Immense sums are being invested in roads, and counties are figuring in terms of million dollar bonds that a few years ago would have been frightened at a \$100,000 bond issue

There is one danger, and only one, in all this good roads movement. Officials and people alike may become extravagant and wasteful. There are already rumors afloat that there is much waste and that Texas roads are costing too much money for the kind of roads that are being constructed. s up to the people to see that they get full value for their investment in roads and up to the officials in charge of road building to protect the people.

Make Aviation Safe.

Colonel Mitchell, of the aviation service, stationed at San Antonio, has drawn to himself much commendation and criticism by his statements in regard to inefficiency in the aviation service. The people are largely in accord with him, and the officials in aviation say his charges are without foundation, and that Mitchell is just trying to get in the spotlight. Whether Colonel Mitchell is right or wrong in his charges, there is a feeling that there is much unnecessary loss of life in the aviation service, and it is hoped that his criticisms will result in improvement. Every parent who has had or has a son in the service is praying that Mitchell's complaints may se cure immediate action looking to safer flying.

Music a Part of Education.

When the parents of today were in school, music was regarded somewhat as a needless acquirement for chil-There was a kind of regard for music, for people have always loved melody, but to study it in school was regarded as a waste of time. Those who gave their lives to it were classed, along with poets, as somewhat queer and freakish-hardly responsible citizens. There were a few piano play ers everywhere, a few fiddlers, a few song leaders, but most people did not think it worth while to study music beyond a few lessons at a "night sing-ing school," and these were largely excuses for the boys and girls to get together in a common meeting place. Music has come into its own, and is a recognized study in the public schools. Children without love for music are the ones now classed as Every school that can afford it-and most of them can-now em ploys its music teacher, who is an important member of the faculty.

Comal River to Furnish Power. Five dams are to be constructed along the Comal river from New Braunfels to a point five miles below Seguin and the water will be used for furnishing power to industrial plants. The time will come when all such streams in Texas will be used in menufacturing. In a few years more Texas will become as noted for manufac turing as it now is for agriculture and Texas comes to appreciate its water and to conserve it.

Texas Technological College.

The Technological College at Lub beck has started with a splendid attendance of students, largely from that part of the State. In time it should become a great school, and if it is made a technological school in fact as well as in name, its influence upon the future of Texas will be immeasment to make Texas the greatest texthe manufacturing State in the Union.

Paper igues County History.




