



Date For M. & N. W. Hearing, Jan. 13

---0---Oral argument on the application of the Texas & Pacific Railway Co. to dismantle the Midland & Northwestern will be heard before the Interstate Commerce Commission in Washington, D. C. Jan. 13 at 10 a. m. according to a communication received Tuesday by the Midland Chamber of Commerce, one of the intervenors. The first hearing in this case was held in Midland last January before Examiner W. A. Disque. Oral arguments were heard in Washington a few months later and the I. C. C. declined to assume jurisdiction, whereupon Ernest May of the Texas attorney general's department filed suit to compel operation of the road. The T. & P. again applied for permission to dismantle the road. The hearing was set for Dec. 3, but was indefinitely postponed till announcement was made this week that the



# **Quarantine Changed**

As a result of the re-appearance of the pink bollworm in the region about Carlsbad, New Mexico, the quarantine regulations for the control of the movement of cotton lint and linters' have been revised by the secretary of Agriculture, the amendment having been made effective November 25th.

This section which is described as Amendment No. 5 to Second Revision of Regulations Supplemental to Notice of Quarantine No. 52, forbids the interstate movement of baled cotton lint and linters grown in a regulated area in which the pink bollworm has been found, unless the cotton has been disinfected satisfactorily under the direction of an inspector of the United States Department of Agriculture. This applies not only in a region where the present crop has been found infested but also where either of the two preceding crops was found to be infesed with this insect.

There is one exception regarding such interstate movement. Baled cotton lint and linters may be moved interstate under permit from one regulated area to another regulated area for disinfection, under such safeguards as shall be required by a department inspector.

Previous to this amendment the novement of cotton lint and linters from New Mexico was permitted without the requirements of disinfection.

COTTON PROBLEMS

(From annual report of Secretary of Agriculture.) The Cotton production outside the United States has increased rapidly in the last two seasons, as a result, no doubt, of the stimulus of favorable economic and weather conditions rather than of concerted effort, through there has been much of the latter. A further increase of foreign production will bear careful study, since it may lead to a competive situation in which the adtions, the shorter staples grown in

this country would probably feel the competition of cotton grown with cheap labor in India, China, and elsewhere.

The Department of Agriculture is iving close attention to the possible competition which foreign cotton proluction may force upon our short staples. It is particularly concerned with cotton breeding and testing, so that a more genial production of prolific cotton of high spinning quality may be facilitated. 


#### Clearing the Atmosphere.



#### 32-Removing the "Hitch." From the beginning golfers should

adopt a plan which many an expert has found to be of the greatest value, but which seems never to have been a subject for the writers. This plan is to "slow motion" your stroke almost daily.

There is not an expert in the world who has seen his swing in the slowmotion pictures but has been surprised, and many of them horrifies, at the swing as it actually was made and its being so different from what he thought he was doing. Don't attempt to hit a ball when making your own slow-motion observation of your own swing. Simply take a few practice strokes until you are "loosened up" and you feel that you are making the swing correctly. Then go through the same swing again and again, watching the stance, grip and every inch of the swing. Of course, pay no attention to the ball or the spot where the ball would be. Alternate with the slow motion and regular speed stroke but pay particular attention to the looks of every part of your body while going through the slow motion. As often as not, you will find there is a hitch somewhere. You apparently are exactly duplicating every thing in the slow motion that you did in the regular swing and find there is no hitch with the fast motion. Very probably there is no perceptible difference and the hitch of the slow motion is absent from the fast solely because the fast motion overcomes the friction which causes the hitch of the slow motion. Locate the part of your body where you feel the tenseness that causes the hitch. It may be This you can overcome by letting them just clear the body in the backward and forward swing. If the hitch comes from the legs it may be overcome by changing the stance the merest trifle. Experiment by half-inches
