Midland's Great Office Building Has Great Amount of Material In It

The task of estimating the almost stupendous amount of material which went into the construction of the Petroleum Building would almost be analogous to figuring the foot-pounds of work done in building Cheop's Great Pyramid.

When it is considered that, relatively speaking, there was little brick construction in the great building, but that even then, more than a quarter-million units went into the walls-one can realize something of the immensity of the structure.

Of sand, there was a total of 5,000 cubic yards used in construction of plaster, concrete and floor work, exclusive of the brick work, which alone required 18 carloads.

Twelve car loads of millwork, which included interior trim and exterior frames, were received. More than 48,000 sacks of cement went into the building.

A half million common face brick and 68,000 universal units (tile for back-up work), and 40,000 3-12-12 tile for partitions, were employed.

Eighteen cars of stone, two cars of granite, 4,000 yards of crushed rock, 322 tons of reinforcing steel, 70 tons of structural steel, three carloads of ornamental iron finishing and miscellaneous finishing work, eight cars of form lumber, 7,800 sacks of plastering, 320,000 pounds of marble chips for Terrazzo floor work, and six cars of wainscotting marble for interior decoration make up some of the other shipments of material which went in to the structure which is the pride of the Southwest.

The above figures, while not including nearly all the material used, merely give the layman some idea of how engineering methods of the modern age can erect a building requiring unusually large shipments of material and finish it in a minimum of working days.

THE FUTURE OF THE DIRIGIBLE






