

Haynes has been deputy sheriff under A. C. Francis, sheriff of Midland county, for over a year. He came here from Big Spring, and lived formerly in Lampasas. Sheriff Praises Officer

Sheriff Francis said today that Haynes had made an exceptionally good officer, and he is glad to see him get this recognition and promotion from the city. Haynes goes about his duties

quietly, and has conducted his law enforcement in a "cool headed," fearless and strict manner. He is young enough to stand the heavy physical strain on an officer, but old enough to have the conservatism necessary for a successful enforcer of the law.






