HUSBAND IS RELEASED ON \$10,000 BOND AFTER SHOOTING AFFRAY

BIG SPRING, March 24.-Mrs. Dee Griffice is dead and her husband is at liberty under bond of \$10,000 as a result of a shooting affray seven miles west of Big Spring Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.

According to information obtained from officers here Mrs. Griffice was riding in a car on the highway leading to Midland with R. C. Dale of that place when the shooting occured. Two shots from a 30-30 rifle were fired, one of which struck Mrs. Griffice in the left breast. Dale escaped with slight abrasions on the face and arm which were caused by splinters cut from the coupe window frame by the bullets.

Dale drove the car with his court wounded companion to J. B. Thomas, Ned Watson, J. N. house here. Mrs. Griffice died just as a physician arrived Griffice surrendered to officers immediately after his wife's death.

At a preliminary hearing held at five o'clock Tuesday afternoon Griffice was granted bond totaling \$10,-000 which he furnished immediately. The bond was set at \$6,000 on a charge of murder and \$4,000 on an assault to murder charge.

MIDLAND AWARDED

LOSS RATIO FOR PERIOD OF THREE YEARS IS ONLY .267 PER CENT

Fire insurance rates in Midland are to be reduced practically fifteen per cent on all policies written since March 1, 1926, extending to March 1, 1927, according to an announcement from the fire insurance commission last Friday. Local fire insurance agents are refunding the reduction on all policies written since March 1st. The local fire department deserves great credit for this reduction, as they have kept fire losses to a low per cent. They have not always put out the fires, but they have prevented further spreading, and have saved all property possible. This is a fine record for a volunteer fire depart-

The reduction is based on the fire insurance premiums collected and the losses paid by the companies writing business in the city of Midland for the last three years. The ratio of losses to premiums was only .267 which is favorable in comparison with almost any town in Texas.

Local fire insurance agents sent in their reports shortly after January 1st, and the credit was allowed last week. After March 1 next year the credit will be obtainable again if losses are kept sufficiently low during 1926.

The Bureau of Standards was only mentioned calling attention to the ability of testing machines many laboratories to record the force required to crush a stone wall ten feet thick or that required to crush an egg shell. The Government Printing office, always an interesting subject was made more so as presented by Mrs. Rowe. Mrs. Elliott Cowden gave the history of our Congressional Library which proved most instructive, from the struggles after the three fires to the handsome, adequate building that it is today. The fact that the forty artists-sculptors, painters and decorators were chosen from among the American group to decorate the beautiful structure added zest to the enthusiasm for our Government buildings. But of all the Government buildings perhaps none hold quite as much interest as the National Capitol itself. Mrs. Hill brought out some of the intimate details connected with the routine at the White House, presenting an invitation issued by Mrs. Coolidge to a garden party. The program as whole proved very instructive although of necessity many interesting subjects were omitted.


