Carter, publisher of the Fort Worth Star Telegram, and Henry Zweifel, formarly United States district of Texas, now in Washington have made a location in the northwest corner of Andrews County, three miles from the Texas-New Mexico line. The test will be in the southeast corner of section 8, Block A-55, public school lands.

. M. CALDWELL GROWS COTTON WHILE WAITING ON CALF CROP

(By M. R. Martin In The Progressive Farmer.)

Joe M. Caldwell, Jr., of Midland, Texas, a "book farmer' since he was rearspent one day on a farm until he finished college. His father a very successful lawyer, did not attempt to influence Joe's choice of a vocation. A large number of "father lawyers" oftimes want their sons to adopt their vocation. Joe finished A. & M. in the class of 1921, majoring in animal husbandry. It is very gratifying to find young men who have graduated from the A. & M. College of Texas that have gone back to the farm, and are making use of the knowledge gained in successfully solving farm problems. It is even more gratifying to find a town reared boy who has graduated from the college and is succeeding on the farm by using the information gained while in college. Since Midland is known everywhere as a "cow town" and since ranching has been the chief occupation in that section ever since there has been a Midland, we suppose that Joe just naturally absorbed some of the ranch-

ing atmosphere, which has been very evident out there during all these years. Anyway Joe majored in animal husbandry, and when he finished school, he had a very definite ambition to put into practice the information which he had secured. Joe's ambition was to own some of the best Herefords in Midland or any other county. Without these 100 acres in farmng, Joe would have found the going rather heavy and uncertain these past ive years due to the uncertain and rather low prices which have prevailed, and to the extreme dry weather luring two of the years.

Joe estimates that the entire overnead per cow costs about \$8 each year. This includes the repair and ipkeep of the windmills, the cake which he buys to feed weak cows during the winter, the lease price on the ranch, and a charge of 2 per cent on depreciation. The past year his calf crop showed a net profit of about \$12.50 per cow. He had been marketing the calves at 8 to 10 months of age when they usually weigh about 400 pounds average.





A. C. Parker, minister at Oak Cliff Church, Dallas, Texas, stands foursquare before the world after such a trial as has befallen few preachers of the Word. A quiet, consecrated, unassuming minister, every one who knew him rejoiced in 1920 when some lands he owned became suddenly the center of one of the most remarkable oil developments in the Southwest. Maintaining Public Roads.

With few exceptions there is general complaint about the upkeep of Texas practice of letting contracts for maintaining the roads to individuals or cor porations. It is impossible to deter mine whether a road is being kept up mine whether a road is being kept up to the right standard, and it is but natural for contractors to give themselves the benefit of the doubt and to make all the profit possible out of their contracts. In this way some have come to regard a road contract as a sort of private snap, if reports are to be credited. In other words, some contractors are tempted to do as little work as possible for the pay they receive. Some counties are now asking that they be allowed to bid on the maintenance of their own roads in order that there may be a sense of local community responsibility for proper road upkeep at the lowest cost to tax payers.

In all campaigns the people come to think of the election of their candidates as essential to the public welfare and candidates themselves are likely to regard their personalities as of great importance. to the right standard, and it is but


