Soy Beans Satisfactory
Soy beans proved a satisfactory sub-
stitute for meat scrap for laving hens
at the Missouni experiment station
at the Missouni experiment station
The basal waxsi consisted of equal
tharts of bran, shorts and corn meal
To this was added 30 per cent soy-beana
meal and 5 per cent mineral, the re-
mainany 65 per cent consisting of the
miginal mash. The results of a two-
year period have been very satisfac-
cory.
When soy heans are used in the poul-

eral was used, the produrction was only
70 eggs per hen per year. The mineral
Is not expensive being composed of one pound of sait and four pounds of
ground bonemeal. All pens had access to oyster shell samd grit.
