Men who violate city ordi nances are not necessarily criminals, and even if they were the basest vilprotection while in the toils of the law and in charge of officers. This year special efforts are being made to get Denton and perhaps some other counties seeded to bluebonnets. The movement to gather and distribute Texas flower seed has gradually extended to other flowers than bluebonnets. There is now at San Antonio a club of girls whose purpose is to gather and dis-seminate throughout Texas the many wild flowers to be found in the State,

The Press and Its Readers.

Will Allen White thinks that the daily press, with its pages of comics, its emphasis on crime, its poorly written sex stories, its general light diet, is underestimating the mentality of the reading public, which "should be given more of the sentiment and the philosophy and the facts that are pregnant with the fate of human so-The light and even the foolish things of the daily press may be all right in their due proportions, but the press is under obligations to feed the mentality of those who desire better things than these, and who look to the newspapers largely for their intellectual and literary improvement. The press can not undertake the elevation of public mentality as its sole purpose, but it has obligations in this direction that should not be ignored,

So long as Texas is without sufficient railroad facilities the roads should be allowed the greatest liberty in making extensions into territory they think may prove profitable. No restrictions should be placed around agencies that want to assist in the development of the State other than these that guarantee honesty of purpess and fair treatment of the public. FARM FLOCK STILL ILLINOIS SIDE LINE

Although Illinois is one of the foremost states in value of poultry and poultry products, the business is still considered a side line on most farms of the state, according to John Vandervort, poultry extension specialist of the college of agriculture, University of Illinois. Poultry is kept to utilize waste grain and furnish eggs and poultry for the family. Some profit is realized from the average farm flock, but the income is distributed in small amounts throughout the year. The farmer, therefore, often does not realize how profitable his flock is.

There is a great need for educational work to encourage farmers to adopt better management methods. To this end, the flock management is being stressed in the poultry extension is being carried out for the three-fold purpose of: (1) encouraging better management methods for farm poultry flocks in Illinois, (2) encouraging the keeping of records as a basis for studying the efficiency of farm flock production, (3) developing leaders who will follow improved poultry practices, as far as practical, in order that their flocks may serve as demonstrations of profitable poultry management in their respective communities.

This flock management project is becoming more popular each year. Groups of co-operators in 40 counties started records at the beginning of 1925 and it is expected that similar records will be kept in nearly fifty counties in 1926. The record itself is of much value to the individual, but it is felt that more good will eventually be derived from the development of flock demonstration farms that will demonstrate better management practices to farmers in communities near these farms.

Seventy farm poultry records were completed in 1924. The average size flock on their farms was 183 birds, the average egg production was 112 eggs and the average profit was \$1.24 a bird. The best one-third of the farm flocks showed an egg production of 128 eggs and a profit of \$2.88 a hen while the poorer one-third of the flocks showed a production of 96 eggs, and a loss of 21 cents a hen. These records bring out the fact that low, egg production can be an important factor in causing low profit.

#### **Dust Wallows Essential**

A dust bath is as essential for the health of chickens as a water bath is for humans. By its use fowls are able to rid themselves of many lice, as well as to remove the scales and scurf from the skin.

#### Lack of Proper Feed

If you own a flock of Rhode Island Reds or Barred Rocks that don't seem to be producing as many eggs as your neighbor's Wyandottes or Leghorns, don't make the mistake of wanting to raise the same breed as your neighbor. You probably are at fault in the care, feed and method of feeding. If given proper management your flock would probably be able to produce as well as your neighbor's. The average farm flock does not receive the feed needed for egg production.

#### Time to Caponize

The time of the year to caponize is of little importance as the capon recovers from the operation regardless of the season. However, there are certain other considerations that are of importance. First in importance is the age and size of the cockerel. The best time to caponize is when cockerels weigh from 11/2 to 21/2 pounds at from 2 to 4 months old. Three-Fourths of Females Are Left for the Production of Beef.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Half of the beef calves dropped each year are heifers. Out of this number only 25 per cent are needed for replacements in the breeding herds. That leaves three-fourths of the heifer calves for the single purpose of beef production. Unfortunately the dis-posal of these females has represented the most losing proposition with which the ranchman has to deal. Furthermore, he has not had the benefit of as

#### and palatability of meat. Light Heifers Favored.

At the present time light heifers sell fully as high as steers of similar breeding, condition and weight. Heavy heifers are never wanted except at a discount, and there have been times in the past when all heifers have been severely discriminated against. Packers are frequently accused of being responsible to a large extent for this discrimination. As near as can be ascertained, a part of this discrimination is due to prejudice and a part to actual inferiority of heavy heifer beef. Heavy heifers frequently carry too much external fat, a great deal of kidney suet, and make carcasses which need considerably more trimming than those of steers of similar weight. Although there is often no discrimination against lightweight heifers, and not infrequently a premium is paid for them as compared with steers of similar weight, those in charge of experimental work feel that trials should be

#### Sow Sweet Clover Early

in Spring Is Best Plan Sweet clover may be sown on wheat in the spring about the same as red clover seed would be sown, but it is more important that the sweet clover be sown early. The sweet clover will start to grow better if it is sown early enough to have a little freezing weather after seeding, as many of the seed will grow better after having been soaked and frozen. It is more important also, that there be limestone in the soil for the sweet clover than for red clover, unless there is considerable humus in the soil. If sweet clover is being sown on the land for the first time the seed should be inoculated with the proper bacteria, which can be secured in the dirt from where sweet clover or alfalfa has been grow-

# HAD BY BAPTISTS

Convention at Houston Heard Many Gratifying Reports on Work. Evolution Denounced.

\$9,000,000 GOAL IS SET

This Objective for Missions and Benevolences to Be Sought By Co-operative Program sion for 1927.

Following an unusually good record in the work of the local churches and large achievements on the mission fields, there has just been held at Houston, Texas, one of the most successful sessions of the Southern Baptist Convention in fecent years. The session was marked by unusual unity, definiteness of purpose and determination to carry forward the work of the Co-operative Program.

Following the re-election of Dr. George W. McDaniel, Richmond, Va. as president, he sounded in his inaugural address a conviction on the theory of evolution that was promptly and unanimously adopted by the Convention as its own sentiment. Dr. McDaniel said:

"I am happy to believe that this Convention accepts Genesis as teaching that man was the special creation of God and rejects every theory, evolution or other, which teaches that man originated in, or came by way of, a lower animal ancestry." With the evolution question disposed of, the Convention was able to proceed with a consideration of its great missionary and benevolent

Here are some of the outstanding developments of the Convention:

GOAL OF \$9,000,000 SET UP 1. In the hope of enabling the mission boards and other agencies of the Convention to take care of their indebtedness gradually without having to too greatly curtail present work, an objective of \$9,000,-000 for missions, education and benevolences was set up for 1927, on recommendation of the Co-operative Program Commission. This money will be applied to foreign, home and state missions, Baptist schools, orphanages and hospitals and ministerial relief, thus taking care of both the state and Southwide Baptist work. It is hoped the Southwide portion of the budget will amount to at least \$4,000,000.

An effort will be made to enlist 500,000 tithers during the next

8. The Foreign Mission Board reported 18,269 baptisms on its fields during the year, a gain of about 1,000 over the previous year. The board has 1,215 churches on the foreign fields with 140,488 members, 3,247 out-stations where preaching services are held from time to time, and 528 missionaries and 2,644 native Christian workers employed in 17 countries:

4. Among the results for the year reported by the Home Mission Board were 833 missionaries employed, 19,744 baptisms, 35,226 additions to the churches, 100 new churches and 458 Sunday schools organized, and 402 church houses built or improved DENOMINATION GREW DURING YEAR

The Sunday School Board reported total business receipts for the year of \$1,710,471. Of this amount \$380,344 was put back into the general work of the denomination. A total of 89,038 awards in teacher training were made, 403 churches were aided by the Architectural Department in drawing plans for new houses of worship, the number of standard Sunday schools reached 546.

With the gains for the past year the main figures of the denomination are now given by the statistical secretary of the Convention as follows: 26,467 churches, 19,908 ordained ministers, 3,649,330 church members, 21,760 Sunday schools with 2,681,828 pupils, 20,965 church houses, 3,197 pastors' homes, \$165, 909,278 invested in local church property \$30,771,574 contributed to local church objects, \$8,255,435 to missions and benevolences and \$39,-027,099 to all purposes during the past year.

The time is now ripe for a distinct Baptist advance all along the line and especially in a support of the great missionary and benevolent enterprises fostered by the Cooperative Program, the Convention caders believe.

### THIS IS THE PROPER WAY TO SHEAR A SHEEP Read Clockwise While slight modifica-The pictures, with tions in the directing of printed instructions illustrate and describe the strokes taken with the briefly a system of shear-ing sheep that has been developed by the thou-sands of professional shearers of America and shear are made by different shearers, the beginner should follow the instructions as closely as possible. sheep is here shown as it is ing finished. Shearer, if he ishes, can drop onto his right knee, but sheep's head should be held over against its right side, and hind leg kept straight by pressing hand in flank as shown. As mentioned before, hind leg should never be pulled out for shearing. If this is done the sheep will start to kick. With leg held straight as shown in this picture sheep cannot yank leg back against combiteeth, The sheep's right foreleg is folded and held under your right knee, leaving sheep further back on its rump. Remove belly wool with strokes nearly straight around across belly. Hold shear loosely in the hand, with rear end well out from sheep's body to bring points of comb teeth down on sheep's skin. Make strokes carcially, with comb cutting full width. Be sure that teeth of comb are down on skin as stroke is ended, to overcome the necessity of making second This picture shows how the shearer has put the sheep in position for shearing right hind leg by raising its head and moving his feet still further back to let sheep settle down on to its left side. In shearing the right hind leg, strokes should start near the back bone and run well out on leg. As shearing continues towards tail, shearer lets sheep down flat on its left side and takes position shown in next picture. As this picture shows, the sheep has gradually been brought to a nearly upright position again as shoulder is being shorn. Sheep's head is lying down on its left side, which curves its body stretching skin tight where shearing is to be done. Sheater continues with strokes from near the back around across right side, with sheep in this position until wool is removed down side to right hind leg. As last stroke is being made on side shearer should raise sheep's head letting its body down on side. Now turn sheep a little to stam and lean it further back on its family to shear inside of right hind leg. Hold sheep's left fore leg under arm. With palm of hand towards sheep's right hind foot, grasp a handful of skin and wool on fron side of sheep's hind leg at flant Joint. Twist this wool and skin with arm held rightly straight to keep sheep's hind leg in position for shearing. Never hold sheep's hind it is for shear to keep sheep's hind leg in position for shearing. As last long stroke is taken up back ending near sheep's right ear, bring your right foot forward close up to sheep's back even with shoulders, leaving sheep lying flat on side and without lifting sheep more than to raise its head. This picture shows the position having shorn right side of sheep's head and ready to shear right side of neck with strokes running down to shoulder. As the neck is being shorn, move both feet back, first one, then the other in short steps holding sheep firmly between legs and rolling it into a more upright position as you shear towards the shoulder. The leg is kept straight by pressing in flank the same as is shown in picture No. 4. Now put sheep in position for shearing outside of left hind leg by moving feet back to allow sheep to be partly on its right side. In this position strokes can be run from left hind foot in to flank. #### Sheep Eradicate Weeds

and Improve Fertility Most weeds seem to be ice cream and cake for sheep. In a list of 200 weeds, sheep will eat 175 of them, including cockle, the young shoots of Canada thistle, dandelion, pigweed. foxtail, ironweed, horseweed, whitetop, ragweed, wild mustard, winter cress wild morning glory, sow thistle and many other species that represent the worst pests. And the more weeds sheep eat the less is the cost of their upkeep. Fields, fence corners, roadsides and farm waste places generally can be kept tidy with sheep, all the while improving the fertility of the soil and yielding a comfortable profit. Pastures can be kept clean by the use of sheep, while the cattle carrying capacity can be increased in the mean-



NOW IMPENDING

The increasing shortage of horses on the farms of the United States makes the growing of colts especially attractive to some farmers. Some foresighted men are already growing more colts and are receiving good prices for them.

According to Prof. R. S. Curtis of the animal husbandry department at the North Carolina college, there has been a decrease in the number of horses on the farms of the United States of 16.3 per cent in the last five years. On January first of last year, there were 16,536,759 compared to 19,-767,161 horses five years before. There is a decrease of 11 per cent in oung horses foaled in 1923 and 1924. Mules show an increase of 5.5 per cent during the last five years, but young mules foaled during 1923 and 1924 show a decrease of 44.5.

"Those who have good mares producing good horses and mules have increased the production of colts,' says Professor Curtis. "Those who have been producing inferior animals have received such poor prices for the colts that they have been discouraged and have about quit the business. This is exactly as it should be and encourages the production of good horses. Competition with mechanical power requires not only the use of lorses in more efficient ways, such as larger teams, but also the production (7) The glib-talking promoter is of better horses and mules, capable of

doing more work in a given time." Professor Curtis states that those who have farms well equipped for the production of live stock, with plenty of pasture and hay crops, should investigate the possibilities of producing colts for market.

New Disease of Cattle

Due to Spoiled Clover A new disease in farm cattle, apparently due to the feeding of damaged or spoiled sweet clover hay and silage, has been under close observation for some time by A. F. Schalk, veterinarian, North Dakota Agricultural college. Doctor Schalk, after personal study, observations and reports received from farmers who have had similar cases of this disease, concludes that certain specimens of moldy, spoiled or damaged sweet clover hay and silage cause a definite

nemorrhagic disease in cattle. "There is no evidence of such disease from feeding on good, clean, wellpreserved sweet clover hay and siage," says Schalk. He also has found that not all specimens of spoiled sweet clover hay and silage cause the disease. The kind and degree of mold or spoilage, as determined by ordinary inspection, do not determine whether a specimen is or is not dangerous for cattle, he believes.

Safeguard From Infection

Before the sow is put into her pen it is well as a safeguard from infection to drive her into an unused pen and there brush or wash from her udders any filth which might be adhering. This sort of a procedure gives the pig a chance to nurse from a clean udder and start life free from infection. This act is being quite generally practiced by progressive swine raisers. Where sows farrow out on the pasture it may not be quite so essential.

Sow After Farrowing For 24 hours after farrowing the sow

does not need any feed and none should be offered to her. She should have plenty of fresh water warmed sufficiently to take off the chill. The same next day (24 hours) after farrowing. or middlings, bran, and ground oats or barley, made into a thin slop and fed sparingly, is good.


Soy Beans Satisfactory

for Egg-Producing Hens Soy beans proved a satisfactory substitute for meat scrap for laving hens at the Missouri experiment station. The basal mash consisted of equal parts of bran, shorts and corn meal. To this was added 30 per cent soy-bean meal and 5 per cent mineral, the remaining 65 per cent consisting of the original mash. The results of a twoyear period have been very satisfac-

When soy beans are used in the poultry mash, the mineral supplement is very essential. In pens where no mineral was used, the production was only 70 eggs per hen per year. The mineral is not expensive, being composed of one pound of salt and four pounds of ground bonemeal. All pens had access to oyster shell and grit.

Becaues the soy beans are lower in protein content than meat scrap, it is considered necessary to substitute one and a half pounds of soy-bean meal for each one pound of meat scrap.

RAISING GEESE IS DEPENDENT ON FEED

The goose is a careful and constant mother, but her love for the water must be restrained until the goslings are a few weeks old, for many dangers, in the form of muskrats, snakes, turtles, etc., lurk at the water's edge.

Goslings do not require much exfra feed, if they can get all the fresh and tender grass they want, and unless this can be supplied, breeding geese is not profitable. For the first few weeks some food must be given; this should never be corn meal, for the various kinds of domestic fowls can readily be traced to feeding corn meal. Cottage cheese, or dry curds of sour milk in which red pepper (cayenne) has been sprinkled, is a very good food, and a quantity of fresh onion-top, chopped up fine, is relished by them. Stale bread soaked in fresh milk makes an excellent food for all young birds, and the way they develop when fed liberally with it will estonish anyone who has not before tried it with his fowls.





#### Poultry Ideas Held by Breeders Tested

Considerable Divergence of Opinion on Questions.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

To determine the soundness of various ideas held by commercial poultrymen, the United States Department of Agriculture has conducted experiments leading to rather conclusive results. From a practical standpoint it is highly desirable for poultrymen to improve, if possible, the hatchability of eggs, to distinguish pullets from roosters at an early age, and to obtain other similar information commercially important but baffling. There has been considerable divergence of opinion on most of the questions.

Hatchability, says the department, probably is best improved by testing breeding birds for bacillary, white diarrhea, and eliminating affected

The size of eggs has no significant effect on their hatchability.

There is no significant correlation between either shape or weight of egg and the sex of the chicken hatched from it. Therefore, from a practical standpoint, poultrymen cannot expect to influence the sex of chicks hatched by selecting eggs according to either shape or size.

While there is a fairly definite relation between the weight of eggs and that of the chicks hatched from them, there is no significant difference in the weight of either sex, and it is highly improbable that pure-bred tendance at the Idlehour Theatre is chicks can be separated according to Male chicks grow faster than the

Is Important in Winter According to dairy authorities water is the most important part of the dairy cow's ration, since water represents atleast seven-eighths of the material which goes into the milk pail. A shortage of water will cut down the milk supply more quickly than a shortage of any other part of the ration. Experiment station tests show that a cow will consume from three to four pounds of water to each pound of dry matter eaten. The average animal in the herd will drink around 12 gallons per day, while one cow on test at the Missouri experiment station, giving 110 pounds of milk daily, consumed 65 gallons of water in a day.

No cow should or will drink as much ice water as she needs for heavy milk production, nor can she drink enough at one time. Hence the importance of water bowls, which keep the water before the cow at all times, and of some method of taking the chill off the water.

Apply Manure to Garden

Any Time During Winter Neighbors all wonder at a good gar-den. They often ask: "Why isn't our garden as good?" The only secret of having a good garden is to make a heavy application of good stable manure. This manure may be applied any time this winter. It should be as free from weed seed as it is possible to get. A load or two will not be one b!! too much to apply to the garden, even though it is less than a half acre.

Stable manure furnishes several important essential elements that are necessary for the plant-growth. Besides the food for plants, and humus material added to the ground by the application of manure, there is the additional crop of beneficial bacteria. These little plants are necessary for other plant growths. They decompose, tear down, and make the food in the soil available for the larger plants.

If one will realize that stable manure is rich in nitrogen and contains large amounts of potash, but is low in phosphoric acid, he will readily understand that 50 per cent of acid phosphate applied for every ton of stable manure applied, will return high dividends in an increased crop production, earlier crops, and a much better qual-
