AMARILLO, May 4 (P)—Thomas Walton, 20, was shot today in the office of R. H. Hamilton, an attorney, and Hamilton was taken into custody. Walton died an hour later at a hospital.

Shot By Wife's Father

AUSTIN, May 4.—(AP)—Thomas Walton, Jr., fatally shot in Amarillo in the office of R. H. Hamilton today, married Hamilton's daughter, Theresa Hamilton, in Austin February 12, according to records of the county clerk in Georgetown, where the license was obtained.

Wife's Whereabouts Unknown Justice of the Peace Bryan Blacklock said he performed the ceremony. Walton and the girl were University of Texas students.

LIONS GIVING EXAMINATIONS TO STUDENTS The local Lions' Club has raised a fund of several hundred dollars with which it is providing an examination of the eyes of children of the Midland public schools. A committee was appointed by Presi-

dent Homer Rowe to make the arrangements for this inspection, and two doctors of the Lions' Club, Dr. W. G. Whitehouse and Dr. Thomas Bobo, have offered to give this inspection. J. E. Hill, president of the Midland school board and superintendent W. W. Lackey have been enlisted and are heartily supporting this work of the Lions. The inspection has been started in the South Ward school where Dr. Bobo has already examined many of the children. This work is a special feature of service that is being fostered by

the Lions' International. This has provided a hospital in Oklahoma and many children have been sent to this institution from many parts of the country. The work of the inspection of eyes has become customary in the larger cities and has proved very helpful. The city of Dallas supplies a physician and nurses whose sole labor is that of inspection. The doctors doing this service will simply make a record of each child and the condition of the eyes, which information will be filed in cards, and where glasses or other

help is needed the parents will be given this information. All of the service and inspection is voluntary, simply being a service that the Lions Club feels should be rendered, and the club hopes to co-operate with the parents in helping every Midland child. With two doctors working it will require perhaps weeks to complete the examination. Through the co-operation of Miss Derryberry, the home demonstration agent of Midland county, and Judge Hill, there will be an examination of the eyes of the rural school children immediately following the one in the city schools. GERMANY AND U.S. REACH AGREEMENT PARIS, May 4 (AP)—German and American reparations delega-

tions have reached an agreement on settlement of the reparations problem. It remains, however, for the Americans to win the French and Belgian delegates to their plan. Owen Young, American delegate, is today conferring with delegations of other creditor nations to this end. The British and Japanese delegations stated that they have tentatively approved the settlement, leaving France and Belgium particularly, and possibly Italy, dissenting.
