Capablanca, who has claimed for years that chess needs evision because the experts have solved all its possible combinations, has suggested and demonstrated some changes. He has enlarged the size of the board, so that it contains 100 squares instead of 64. Each side has four new pieces; two new pawns, and two composite pleces, one of which combines the powers of the rook and the knight, while the other combines the powers of the bishop and the

Chess lovers will doubtless be eager to see how this new game works out. For the ordinary man chess still contains unnumbered riddles. It may be, however, that the masters' tournaments will contain fewer monotonous draws if Capablanca's suggestions are adopted.




