The situation inthe Philippines, thanks to the wise administration of Governor Generals Wood and Stimson, has improved immensely in the last few years. The demand for independence is no longer the sharp, acrid thing it was a short time ago. More and more the Filipinos have come to realize that the retention of the islands by the United States will work to their own advantage.

To slap a stiff tariff on Philippine sugar would be to end this happy situation and bring back the old dissatis-faction. Overnight the "Philippine question" would be-come vexations again. The painstaking work of conciliation would be undone.

Things grow old quickly in this modern world. In Chicago, a matter of 35 years ago, was built the world's first skyscraper—the Tacoma building, 14 stories tall, erected on a new principle which made a stell framework carry all the weight.

For years it was a marvel. Architects studied it, and the lessons it taught led to construction of the towering buildings that mark every American city.

But now it is being torn down-after a scant 35 years of life. It is out of date-too small, too cramped. In its place will rise a building three times as high.
