That challenging question heads an advertisement reently published by a committee that is seeking contribuons to relieve famine conditions in Bessarabia.

Forty thousand families, says the advertisement, are ctually dying of starvation in Bessarabia. Unless outside eld comes many more will be in the same plight.

So the appeal is broadcast in America—and the averge citizen, who thinks himself abused if he has to go ithout his lunch, is asked if he knows what it is like to be

The question is rather too easily answered. We don't now what it means to starve. Furthermore, most of us on't know where Bessarabia is, nor do we care greatly. orty thousand families are starving there, but it doesn't ouch us. It's too far away, too unreal.

We read, also, that there is a dreaful famine in China. million people-or is it two million?-are dying of arvation in some vague province in the interior. But it all extremely remote. Besides, the Chinese are inexplicble people at best. So, while a few committees and church rganizations struggle for funds, most of us never give e matter a thought.


